No vote indicated: I could accept this bird as detailed only, not documented. As far as early migration date I feel a single bird could be an overwinter bird. Several pipits have been reported on past Christmas counts.

NA: A bit unfair really as the observer apparently was not intending this to be a complete documentation. The details available were reviewed at request of seasonal field reports editor. Possibility of something like an odd longspur is a reasonable consideration and prevents ready acceptance of record.

A-D: This bird looked, sounded and acted like an American Pipit but from the description given, I cannot say with certainty that it was an American Pipit. Single call note may serve to separate from much rarer Sprague's Pipit. Date is just marginally early, however, and I am inclined to accept.

NA: This record is very possibly correct. I think a big problem here is with the Records Committee lack of direction to observers regarding whether a full documentation should be submitted, or simply details of identification. In spite of this, the bird was not well seen, and there is potential for confusion with other species such as lonspurs which would be far more likely this time of year. We should probably take the conservative view on this one.

A-D: Details are sufficient and time frame is not that out of place for a bird, which according to National Geographic, over winters in central Missouri.

NA: Call not should be a two syllable call not a single note as mentioned in the comments. By the brief description this could possibly be a Vesper Sparrow, which was not eliminated in the comments.

A-D: Adequate details for field reports comment from a good, knowledgeable birder. Whitebreast Rec. Area would be a good pipit area like the beach areas at Saylorville are in migration.
