A-D, Despite brevity of the documentation, this appears to be a correct record. Not only do the field marks support the ID, but the observer has some experience with the species, and the date falls within the expected migration interval.

NA, I must vote NA on what was not seen in this case. It seems to me that with the look described it would have been hard to miss the Junco like white outer tail feathers. I suggest this bird could have been a Gray-cheeked Thrush.

A-D, All gray bird with thin white eyering and orange colored

wing-bars or markings diagnostic of this species.

A-D, Good, distinctive details noted for an adult Townsend's Solitaire.

A-D, as for comments white outer feathers were noted document is sufficient for me.

A-D, The observer does mention "white on outer tail feathers" in his documentation. In addition, Gray-cheeked Thrush would be unlikely to show "orange-buff wing bars...more noticeable when flies" or an upright posture.

A-D, The only one who missed the white outer tail feathers was the N.A. voter. Quoting from the documentation, "...white on outer tail feathers."

A-D, The white outer tail feathers were noted, and I therefore change my vote to AD.

A-D, Documentation does mention white outer tail feathers.

A-D, Good, distinctive details were provided for an adult Townsend's Solitaire. The white on the outer tail feathers was noted. I don't know how the one reviewer could think this was a Gray-cheeked Thrush with the details provided for this bird -- nothing indicates a Gray-cheeked Thrush.
