Dear Tom,

Just a few notes of explanation.

You may notice a lot of different observers in this report.

George Gage is the Refuge Manager at DeSoto Bend, and Dave Menke is an excellent birder on the staff there. Andy Saunders is the Chief Naturalist at Fontenelle Forest Nature Center, Omaha. Rick Wright is a fine birder, now at UN-L. Mark Lund and Kelly Clark have been birding for several years, and I believe are careful and accurate. However, as they are not known to me personally, I have only included their sightings when they were also seen by another birder. Mark and Kelly also reported a Northern Phalarope which they flushed and saw the dark rump and tail on October 10 at Lake Manawa. (Oops, make that a Red-necked Phalarope!) The rest of the observers I think you know.

All of the late shorebird sightings were from the new dredge ponds at Lake Manawa. There are four ponds behind high fences and (sometimes) locked gates. So far we have not been thrown out. The rumor is that after the dredging is completed, the dikes will be bulldozed and the ponds covered over. Still, it should be super at least for next spring.

The trip we made to Forneys on August 22 was done by canoe. That probably accounts for the higher numbers of night herons. Forneys is a lot bigger that it looks from the road!

The general feeling among birders here is that this was one of the worst migrations in years. (Without the Ruff, it might have been THE worst:) Almost all numbers of birds were down. I do the Eastern Nebraska report for American Birds, and this fall I had four reports—total of nine birds—of all the brown thrushes: The waterfowl migration was about three weeks late and except for Mallargs there were no duck species in numbers.

Vireos and Warblers also down in numbers, some common species such as Blackpoll and Palm were not seen at all. Savannah sparrows which are usually seen in the hundreds were seen in ones or twos.

On the Plus side, an incredible 23 Com. Loons were seen in one day at Site 11, Omaha. We had two Goshawks in Sarpy County, Ne, in late Oct. We also had four sightings of Connecticut Warbler-all by experienced birders--in Sarpy county in late August. And Blue-winged and Golden-winged Warblers in Fontenelle Forest on the same day--August 29--rather unusual here. Good numbers of Purple finches arriving in late October but so far no other winter finches.

Don and I and B.J. did see the Ruff--wasn't that great:

## ORCHARD ORIOLE NESTS

While camping at Lewis & Clark State Park, Monona County on August 6-8, I observed two Orchard Oriole nests. Both were in the campground.

The first was in a small Green Ash, approx. 10 feet up. Both male and female were feeding young.

The second was in a medium sized Box Elder--approx. 15' up. On August 7, the female was feeding young in the nest and earrying off the fecal sacs. The young were calling--a churring note. On August 8, there were still young in the nest(I believe 2) and a fledging cowbird on a nearby branch. When the female approached with food, the cowbird would begin calling insistently. However, in 9 out of 10 trips that I observed, the female first fed the young in the nest. No male was seen near this nest.
