tail, legs, feet). Also mention voice and behavior. Observed about fifty longspurs feeding on gournd. Most birds were clearly Lapland Longspurs, both male and female in winter or early breeding plumage. Approximately 20 of the birds were observed as follows:

Same general shape and size as Laplands. Back and top of head streaked brownish color, entire breast and belly a uniform buffy or yellowish wash, side of face was light brown in background with a faint but distinct dark brown-grey triangle surrounding a central lighter spot on cheek. Wings generally brownish with faint suggestion of white shoulder patch

on some of the birds. <u>Full</u> white outer tail feathers on bird in flight. Also heard a distinct "ticking" or "winding watch" call as birds would fly. Unable to determine if came from Smith's or nearby Laplands.

This description is more a blending of observations of several birds rather than a description of a particular individual. There was variation in shade of buff on breast and in the completeness and distinctiveness of face pattern.

Similar species and how eliminated: Other longspurs and Vesper Sparrow elimanated by distinct buff colow of breast and by face pattern.
