We were alerted to the bird by its repeated songs coming from the mature trees close to the clearing where we waited, The ascending zee-zee-zee-zee-zee-zee-zee-zee--" was reminiscent of a Parula's song, but each note was separate + distinct rather than an ascending frill of a Parula, Soon if flew out into the clearing to a small shrub about 20 feet away, perching 1/2 a minute 2 feet from the ground, flew to another bushy sapling, & then away. It sang from a distance a few times. Half an hour from the first sighting we saw + heard it again 25 yards away, in sumac + brush next to the forest, flitting around from 1 to Tfeet from ground, On each sighting I saw the yellow undersides, the black streaks on sides of neck + body, the two black face marks - through the eye dalong the jaw, two pale yellow wing-bars, + olive-green back, Once as it flew I saw white in its undertail.
