A-D, This sighting is a strong record with everything I like to see in a sighting. 1) They got a good close look for a length of time. 2) The species with which it could be confused was present for direct comparison. 3) The bird was sitting and flying. 4) Good details.

A-D, All black bill, size of Thayer's, coloration, faint tail band good for Iceland.

A-D, Size, light primaries, and faint tail band convincing. A-D, Comparison with "Thayer's" helpful. This bird apparently pale enough for ID as "Iceland." Seems certain birds seen were the same.

DOCUMENTATION OF RARE BIRD

SPECIES: Iceland Gull (First-winter)

LOCATION: Lock & Dam #15, Davenport (Scott County)

DATE & TIME: 5 January, 1996 (8:45-9:20 AM)

OBSERVER: Jim Fuller, 6 Longview Knoll NE, Iowa City, Iowa, 52240

OTHERS: Seen two days later by Chris Edwards, Eugene and Eloise Armstrong, and Pam and Reid Allen.

DESCRIPTION: This bird was seen flying below the lock and dam in downtown Davenport, and at the same time there was an adult Lesser Black-backed and a first-winter Thayer's Gull. Good comparisons bewteen the Iceland and Thayer's were possible. When the Iceland disappeared above the dam, I walked the bike path around the dam, and found it sitting on the ice only about fifty yards away. I could not determine that the Thayer's and Iceland were any different in size, but the Thayer's was an obviously darker bird in general. The Iceland was a very light tannish-white overall, but there was a very faint tan subterminal tail band. The back and head were finely streaked with tan, and the upperwing also was light tan, except for the primaries, which appeared to be a silver-white color. The Thayer's, however had silver-white primaries and secondaries on the underwing only, and otherwise was a darker brownish-tan. The Thayer's also had a relatively wide brown tail band. Both birds had all black bills and a dark eye. The Iceland had a grayish-pink leg color. I could not see the legs of the Thayer's.

SIMILAR SPECIES: Comparisons to Thayer's Gull have been made in the description. First-year Glaucous Gull is larger, and has a two-tone black-tipped bill.

OPTICS & CONDITIONS: The birds were observed for the majority of the time with Swift Audubon (8.5 X 44) binoculars, but I did watch the Iceland flying briefly and sitting on the ice with a KOWA TSN-4 (20 X) telescope. Distances were 60-300 feet for the flying birds, and about 150 feet for the sitting Iceland. Viewing directions were east to southeast and the sky was clear.

REFERENCES and FIELD NOTES: Field notes were made in the car after the viewing, and National Geographic Field Guide, and Harrison's Seabird Guide were viewed that evening. This form was typed on 8 January.

Slightly smaller than nearby Herring Gulls. Bill entirely black. Eye dark. First winter plumage; whitish overall; upperside of primary tips whiter than remainder of wing; no secondary bar; very light brown subterminal tail band.

The bird was seen flying and briefly sitting on the water.

Similar species; how eliminated: Glaucous Gull is much larger and has a large, bicolored bill. Thayer's Gull has a broken secondary bar and brown primary tips on the upperside of the wing.

Did anyone disagree or have reservations about the identification? No.

Viewing conditions: Full sunlight, 50 yards away. Viewed with 8×40 binoculars and 15x - 45x telescope.

Previous experience with species and similar ones: No experience with Iceland Gull; very familiar with Herring and Ring-billed Gulls.

References and persons consulted before writing description: None.

How long before field notes made? Ninety minutes. How long before this form completed? Six hours.
