Rock Doves !diving! at Owl being mobbed by other birds: On 2 January at the State Forest Nursery, I saw Crow} Blue Jays and Cardinals 'mobbing' a Great Horned Owl, and was surprised to see a small flock of Rock Doves (4 or 5) dive in at the owl and fly off. They did this again and flew away. Then the owl flew by me on down the row of trees and landed with the crows and jays in pursuit. I was really surprised to see a flock of about 35 pijuns (Rock Doves) fly in and 'dive' the owl. This flock 'dived' the Horned Owl three times before the owl flew off into some low brush under a cottonwood tree. The flock never got closer than 3 or 4 feet from the owl. On 9 January I saw three pijuns as a flock do the same thing to a Great Horned Owl at the Nursery. Crows, a Blue Jay, and some Starlings were also 'mobbing' at the time. I don't know if this is unusual or not, but I'd never seen pijuns do this before.
