NA, The broad, milk-chocolate tail band and dark trailing edge of the primaries seem to indicate Thayer's Gull. Without a description of the size of the bill, or shape of the head, it is difficult to say this was definitely Thayer's either.

NA, First, it is refreshing that not everyone feels that they must conclusively identify every different gull that flies by. Unfortunately, it leaves me in the difficult position of trying to identify a bird that the observer was unsure of. I believe that the observer is correct that this was either an Iceland or a Thayer's but I feel uncomfortable trying to be more specific. Zimmer ("Birding", Oct. '91) has several illustrations of second year Icelands, etc. Even Zimmer has trouble with their identification and considers some to be possible intergrades.

NA, Iceland Gulls are generally smaller than Herring Gulls not larger. Other details such as bill size and shape are not mentioned and make it hard to eliminate Glaucous Gull.

NA, More complete description of primaries and secondaries is necessary to separate second-year lceland and Thayer's. The milk chocolate tail band does not necessarily preclude Iceland since the whiter rump in a second year bird creates greater contrast. The observer is probably correct in his determining this is a Iceland-Thayer's type; but at 150 to 350 yard distance, this is one to be left unidentified to species.

NA, The tail, bill, and body are consistent with Thayer's. I'm confused about the wing tip -- "did not show any black on the primaries when the bird was sitting." Was it brown? Trailing edge of primaries dark in flight doesn't fit anything.

NA, The description sounds like a combination of both a Thayer's Gull and Iceland Gull and does not attempt to eliminate one or the other species. It does appear to be a 2nd year bird based on the field marks given. Light brown in back and mantle and milk chocolate broad tail band more suggestive of Thayer's with little to lead me to conclude that this was an Iceland Gull.
