NA, It seems to me that Am. Crows could have fledged by this date. In addition, details are lacking and sighting time was only about one minute.

A-D, I have trouble with a description as a "small crow" since even on the coast where they are an expected species, size is impossible to determine on an individual bird, but call is right for Fish Crow. Date is probably marginal but location is good.

NA, I don't think we should at this time accept records of this species based on a weak call heard twice and reported by only 1 of 2 observers. To do so, would be to open a can of worms.

NA, Due to discussions I have heard about this species and concerning the call of juvenile birds of the American Crow in their second year I think we need to look at this species more closely. It has been discussed that the juvenile American Crow may still be giving a call that is basically the same as an adult Fish Crow. Can we find any more information on this to see if it is true or not?

 $\mbox{A-D, While description barely adequate, I also will concede that this probably a Fish Crow.$

REVOTE: 6 NA, 1 A-D

A-D, Size is very difficult to judge without a comparison, but the description of the call, made by an experienced birder, indicates Fish Crow.

NA, It seems to me that Am Crows could have fledged by this date. In addition, details are lacking and sighting time was only about one minute.

NA, Juvenile American Crow should have fledged by this date.

NA, With current discussion of calls being confused with young American Crows, I suspect we will need a more thorough description of physical characteristics for an accepted record. Need more discussion of this species.

NA, nothing to add to my previous comment.

NA, Further discussion needed on this species in Iowa.

NA, I am totally perplexed by reports of this species. I would like to return to "square 1" and re-evaluate what we have. At this time I feel we need a diagnostic recording or of course specimen or even a photo which could be measured proportion-wise.
