Description of bird: These birds were sparrow-like birds with a horizontal, thrush-like posture as they ran across the mudflats picking at the mud. They had solid, dark grayish-brown head and upperparts with a bit rustier color to the mantle. On the dark face was a distinct buffy supercilium. The bill was thin and sharply pointed. The underparts were primarily light buff with heavy dark streaking on the upper breast creating a black necklace effect. We were unable to ascertain leg color. Neither bird called during observation.

Similar species and how eliminated: Sparrows and longspurs were eliminated by bill shape and posture. The rarer Sprague's Pipit was eliminated based on the relatively plain back and darker face.

Did anyone disagree or have reservations about identification? No

If yes, explain:

Viewing conditions (lighting, distance, optics): The sun was in front of us and to our left at about a 75 degree angle to our line of vision. The birds were an estimated 100 yards away and seen through scopes at 25x-45x.

Previous experience with species and similar ones: More experience hearing them than seeing them, but Jim, Beth and I have all observed American Pipits on numerous occasions.
