This bird was a typical Dendroica warbler size and shape. At first I thought I had just another Blackpoll or Bay-breasted Warbler but when I got a good look at its back and saw that it was plain without streaks I took a closer look. On the back and head it was a greenish-olive color, without streaks on the back. There was a yellowish broken eye-ring with a definate blackish stripe through the eye area. The bill and feet were black. The throat, breast and sides were a lemon yellow color with indistinct dark spots on its sides. The undertail coverts and belly was white. The upper tail coverts were the same color (or close to it) as the back and median wing coverts and on the edging of the tertials. The bird was actively feeding in the pines and I watched it continuously for about four minutes before it flew into one of the pines and I could not find it again.

Similar species and how eliminated: Blackpoll and Bay-breasted Warblers can be similar colored but have some extent of streaking in the feathers of the back. This bird did not.
