We first heard it singing in the mature trees behind us as we stood at the edge of the clearing. It has a very distinctive songan ascending "gee" that Kind of sounds tinny. It sounded like the middle portion of a N. Parula song to me. Very shortly it came out 20 feet away from me and then flew to a small bush 30 yards away. It had a yellowish throat and undersides, black streaks on its yellowish sides, and was greenish in color on its back and topsides. It was a tail wagger and had a black eyeline and black circle around the eye. It showed white tail spots when it flew on the underside of the tail. Later we found it along the edge of the mature trees and in

Some sumac bushes about 25 yards away. We only saw one bird at a time but wondered if possibly two birds were present and one was a duller-looking female. The bird appeared duller but also was in shadows at times. Similar species and how eliminated: A Kentucky workler lacks the black streaks on the yellowish sides. A cape May warbler has chestnut cheeks, a yellow rump, a patch of yellow behind ear, and should be far north of Jowa in summer. Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? No
