I observed this bird, the male, in a wooded area approximately 5 to 15 feet above the ground(the female was also around but I only watched the male). This was a small bird with a narrow, thin beak and the colors of a warbler. This bird had a yellow face patch, through the eyes, surrounded by a black hood that extended from the top of the head down the side, around the neck back up the side to the crown(see drawing). The remainder of the bird was yellow with a light olive color on the wings and back. I was not aware of the white on the tail. This bird was in the same area as the blackpoll warbler and black-and-white warbler. From what I saw of the female, it appeared to be yellow about the head, breast and belly and light olive on the wings and back. I did not see any crest on the side of its head. Neither bird sang or made any calls.

Similar species and how eliminated: The bachman's warbler and the Kentucky warbler are somewhat similar, however, neither species has the distinct hood and yellow face, therefore, I ruled these species out.

If yes, explain:

Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment:

I was in the woods where it was shaded, fortunately I was only about 25 feet(estimated) from the birds and had Bushnell 8 x 30 binoculars.

Previous experience with species and similar ones: I have seen the hooded warbler on one other occasion - in Arkansas and I have seen the kentucky warbler, References and persons consulted before writing description: also in Arkansas.

Referred to Peterson's field guide, but was already sure of identification How long before field notes made?
