First heard song, a rather continuous buzz, distinct from blue-winged warblers which were common in the vicinity. Bird first appeared low in ~10 St. red codar. Black streaks through gellow breast and head is along with generally gellow/blive
gare positive identification. I watched the bird for approximately 15 minutes from close range, trying (unsuccessfully) to find evidence of nesting. Amber flecks on shoulder were conspicuous.
Similar species and how eliminated: Black streaks on breast and through head, along with song, eliminated yellow warble Absence of conspicuous wingbarn eliminated cape May and Blackburnian; light (glipe) colored back eliminated magnetian yellow throated + others.
