Description of bird: The bird was about robin-sized, but slimmer. The bird was mostly medium-gray in color with slightly darker wings and tail. The bill was short and black. The bird also had an obvious light eyering. In flight, the bird showed a small buffy patch at the base of the secondaries and white outer tail feathers. The bird was actively feeding on cedar berries during the observation.

Similar species and how eliminated: Northern Mockingbird eliminated by the short bill, eyering, buffy wing patch, and overall darker color.

Viewing conditions and equipment: Viewing conditions were good with the sun behind me. Estimated viewing distance was 30-40 feet most of the time. I used Nikon 8 x 23 binoculars.

Previous experience with species: I have seen one other Townsend's Solitaire in Iowa plus several in some western states.
