First saw male bird in full view. Large size, black with irridescent sheen, long tail with large, deeply Keeled end. Common grackles were nearby, affording a direct size comparison, fellow eye, large beak.

Female bird also in plain view. Large size, light colored (beige) breast, throat, chin and face. Dark, diffuse eye stripe or check patch contrasted with face. Large, but smaller than male's, tail. Brown-black dorsum.

Juvenile bird. - another bird with buffy breast, throat + cheek. Similar size to C. grackles but heavier bodied. Nearby juv. c. grackles more uniformly colored, lacking the contrast between breast & back. Dorsum of g.t. grackle uniform brown-black; that of juv. c. grackles brown-black with contrasting black tail. Smeller than the & great-tailed grackle. (OVER)

Similar species and how eliminated: Common grackle- direct size comparison; pale color of \$\$ + juv.
