My first thought was a crow when I saw the large black bird, but then suw its long, thin, tapering bill and head, and the long tail, Kind of fanning out at the end. I could see it had bright yellow eyes. He sat there about a minute flaffing his feathers and "chacking", rather tame I thought, in light of the dogs sniffing around below him. Then he flew off by the barn out over an open ag. field and out of sight. Summary: Grackle-like bird, nearly crow sized, yellow eyes, long tail widening at the end, head and bill very thin and streamlined, song of loud and sharp whistles and rattles, Similar species and how eliminated: Common grackle - this bird was nearly crow-sized, longer tailed, with the peculiar whistles and rattles. Boat-tailed grackle - song was wrong. Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification?
