A small sparrow, strinked underneath. There has a prominent wing bar on each wing. The central tail feathers were dark and the outer couple of feathers were white. Distinct light brown streaking on upper breast gradually faded to an unmarked lower belly. The chin was wheth. The bird had a prominent white ring around each eye. Bill was pinhish at base, dark on distal portion. Legs were pink. On the ground, the bird had a very creet posture and ran and hopped rapidly along the road. The flight was undulating and very reminiscent of a Horned Lark. The upperparts and rest of wings were brown. The bird lacked a central to breast spot. The undertail was white.

Similar species; how eliminated:

The white eye ring, tail pattern, lattern of streaking on the breast, and habitat climinates other sparrous, especially Savanuah, Sous, and Lincoln's.

Did any one disagree or have reservations about the identification? <u>No</u> If yes, explain:

Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), optical equipment.

Sky cloudy to partly doudy, but light was still excellent. Bind neved from as close as 15 feet. I used Buschwell 7x 35 binoculars.
