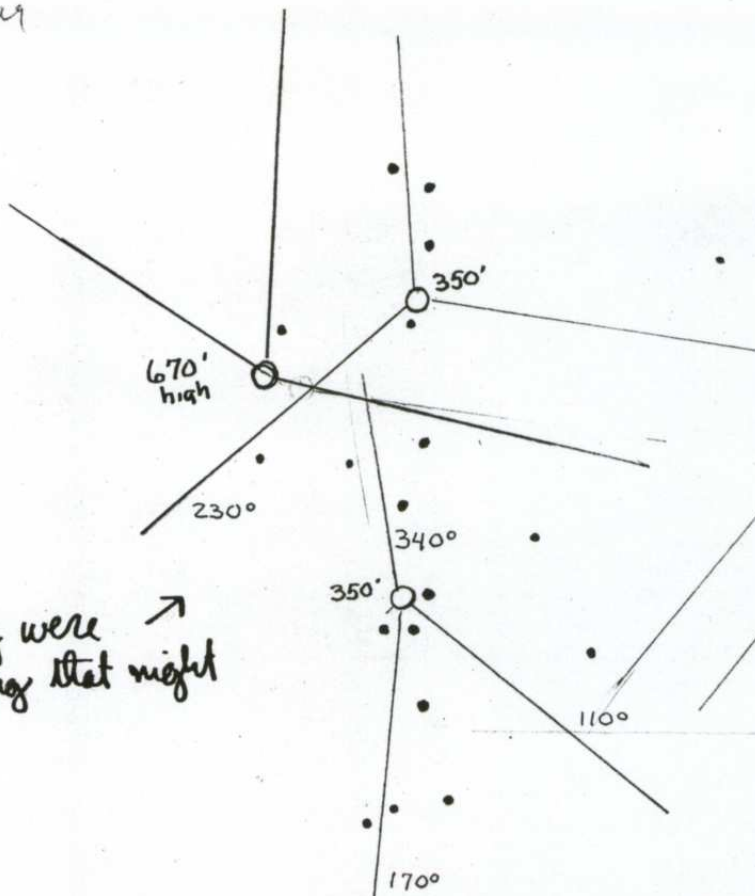
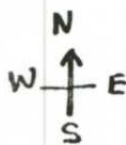

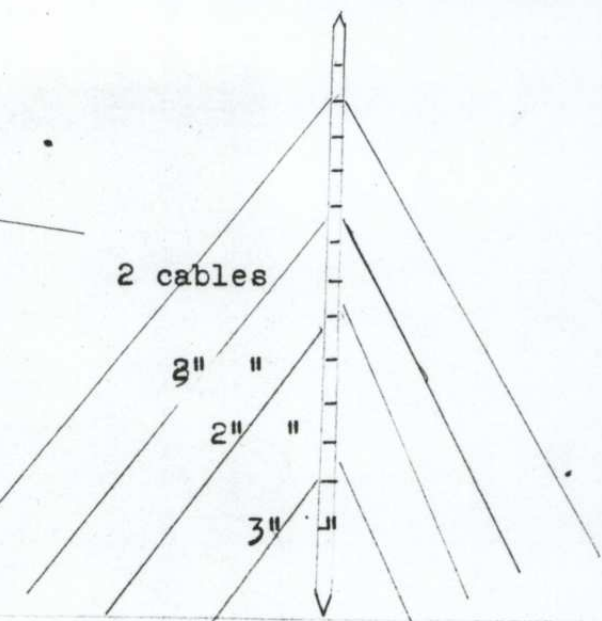


Figure 2. Side view of tower showing 2 of the three wire groups and number of cables in each level.
