8.9.	Description of behavior: Sparrow-like hopping at side of gravel road, eating seeds of dandelions; short flight when approached but staged in open road or field and did not try to his Habitat - general: At side of gravel road
10.	specific: gravel road on East side of Sweet Marsh; road bordered by grasses and many dandelions in bloom and a lot of them already in seed stage. Similarly appearing species which are eliminated by questions 6, 7 & 8. Explain: Male Bobolink seen same day; Bobolink has white and yellowish color on head and back and white scapulars not white secondard upper-wing coverts.
11.	Distance (how measured)? approximately 35 feet 12. Optical equipment: 7x35mm bt L at closest point.

Light (sky, light on bird, position of sun in relation to bird and you): Sun was to my right as I faced North while sitting in car, bird sometimes on left and sometimes on right side of road at point where gravel met grass; very good lighting with strong filtered sonlight - bright overcast after brief early A.m. rainshower.
