



ACTIVITIES OF THE I.O.U.

Iowa Birdline provides a recorded message of Iowa bird sightings that is updated each Monday and allows callers to report their unusual bird sightings.

Iowa Breeding Bird Atlas is a five-year project, co-sponsored with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, to systematically survey the breeding birds of Iowa. The project provides an excellent opportunity for I.O.U. members to gather scientific information through birding activity in their own communities.

The Winter Feeder Survey, also jointly sponsored with the Department of Natural Resources, documents the bird population at feeders in mid-winter across the state. This is a popular project with hundreds of feeder watchers contributing.

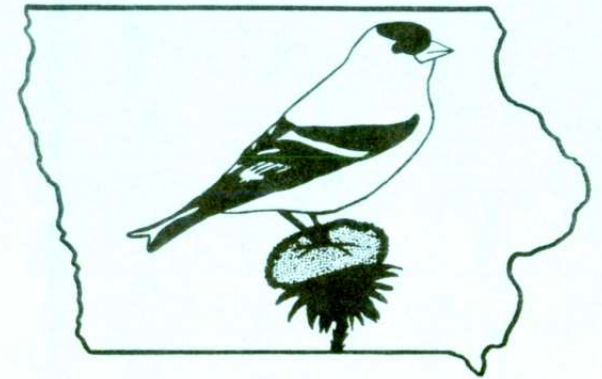
The Christmas Bird Count brings out over 600 birders in over forty 15-mile-diameter areas to count as many birds as possible for one day during the two-week Christmas period. These counts are lots of fun and provide a good opportunity to meet other bird enthusiasts and to improve birding skills.

The Spring Big Day Count is a friendly competition among Iowa's most hearty birders who count as many species as possible in one day. Teams may confine their efforts to one county or cover as much of the state as they wish.

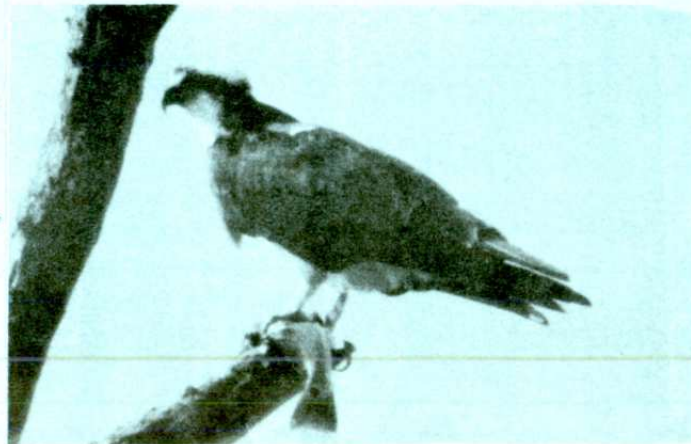
MEETINGS

Annual spring and fall meetings of the I.O.U. are held at good birding locations across the state. A typical meeting weekend includes an informal get-together on Friday night, field trips on Saturday and Sunday mornings with sharing of experiences over lunch at noon, a Saturday afternoon program of identification workshops, popular presentations on birds and birding locations, and business meeting, and a Saturday night banquet with featured speaker. These meetings highlight many members' birding calendars.

PUBLICATIONS

Iowa Bird Life, our quarterly journal, features profiles of Iowa's birders, bird-finding guides, articles on identification, articles of general interest, original research on Iowa birds, notes and articles on rare and unusual sightings, seasonal reports of Iowa bird sightings, Christmas Bird Counts, and reports of I.O.U. meetings.

I.O.U. News, our quarterly newsletter, provides notes and short articles of general interest and announcements of meetings, field trips, and bird counts sponsored by the I.O.U. and local bird clubs.

Field Checklist of Iowa Birds, a pocket-sized folded card listing Iowa's regular and casual species, provides a convenient list for keeping track of species seen in Iowa. The list is updated periodically.



PURPOSE

The purpose of the Iowa Ornithologists' Union is to encourage interest in the identification, study, and protection of birds in Iowa and to unite those who have these interests in common. Our members, most of whom are from Iowa and surrounding states, vary in their level of interest in birds. Many simply enjoy birds at their backyard feeders, others actively pursue field study as a hobby, and a few are professional ornithologists. The I.O.U. serves as a forum for exchange of information and ideas about field identification, birding locations, habitat, distribution, and other topics. It provides an organized outlet for birding activities and bird study projects. Additionally, the I.O.U. provides a repository for records of Iowa birds.
