## Spring 1984 Report

<u>Meterological conditions</u>: Spring never did arrive in NW Iowa it seemed. Winterlike conditions continued until early May. The lakes, ponds, and lagoons retained a snow and ice cover until late April. The abundant snowfall, cold weather, and later rainfall however, did create many shallow temporary ponds on agricultural land that were frequented by the migrating waterfowl. Warmer, drier conditions finally prevailed in mid-May, enabling agricultural work to proceed except for numerous wet terraces, hillside seeps, and poorly drained low areas. As one would expect, the spring flora in the prairie and forest tracts also appeared several weeks later than usual.

## General Notes:

Waterfowl frequented primarily the flooded agricultural land and rivers during this migration since lakes and ponds remained ice-covered so late this year. There also appeared to be an exceptionally large number of of Lincoln's sparrows this year.
