UPLAND SANDPIPER 23 July 16 6:30-7.00 P.M. (TWENTY-THREE)
This is a post-harvest count of birds feeding in a 30 acre clover field nn my farm located in Sec. 32, Bloomington Twp., Decatur County, Ia.
After nesting is over this species likes to feed on a meadow from which the
hay has been recently harvested and removed from the field. There is an abundance of insects of many kinds. The young are getting mature by this time and range with the adults.
In this instance, there were several fields of meadow, mostly alfalfa, which had
already been harvested in June and were now 12 to 18 inches high. My clover field was
harvested late and so at that time was the only freshly harvested field within a mile in several directions. Also had a 100 acre pasture nearby.
This clover was mowed July 2 and July 7, baled July 5 and 9, bales moved out of field
July 11, bird count July 16. Jeff Livingston is a licensed bird bander now. We drove carefully all
over the field in his topless jeep, many times approaching within 100 feet of birds.
We were careful to note where the birds flew each time and not double count. The birds were in two's and three's scattered all over the field. Usually gave
the friendly 3 syllable call note both on the ground and in the air.
For a number of years we have made what I call the post harvest flock count. Usually see from 8 to 15 birds, closer together in a small area of the
field. They may flock up clover slightly later before migration.
My farm is located only half mile from the 100 acre lake that is the
Lamoni, town water supply. Also there is about another 100 acres of grass around the lake that is neither moved or pastured. Also a 100 acre pasture on another side of
my farm. So the birds have good nesting habitat. I believe I can say that I see
and hear the Upland Sandpiper every day during months of May, June and July.
