Diurnal Raptors:

Turkey Vulture- We located one roost along the Raccoon River

and at one time counted 28 individuals, in-

cluding immatures.

Red-shouldered Hawk- We say one immature in early July

Sparrow Hawks- Very few were seen

Cuckoos

Black-billed seemed much more common than last year, with five nests found. Yellow-billed were about the same.

Owls

Barred Owls extremely common

Short-eared- Saw one on 7/7 along a channelized ditch.

Woodpeckers

Red-bellied Seemed down from last year

Hairy Uncommon but regulat.

Flycatchers

Acadian Several territorial males

Least One singing male on 7/1

Wrens

Mimics

Carolina One in early July

Mockingbird One in early June

Thrushes

Veery One singing in late June

Bluebird Seemed somewhat more common than last year.

Cedar Waxwings

There were several around all summer, may be breeding

Shrikes

I saw none where I saw them last year, I recorded none all summer

Vireos

White-eyed-

Bells-

We saw a singing male on two occasions in early June One was present on the edge of Panora all summer

and we saw three at Sheeder Prairie

Warblers-

Black and ?White-

One singing male in mid-June in its reported breeding

Yellow-

Were present on only one of twelve plots. Three of

four nests were parasitized.

Orchard Oriole-

We saw only one in early June

Finches and Sparrows-

Dickcissel-Grasshopper Sparrow

Vesper Sparrow Lark Sparrow Very common, it seems to be a boom year for them Were common in hay fields and pastures with a

good crop of grass.
