A number of species seemed less abundant than usual this spring, mostly species that pass through the Iowa City area in late April or the early part of May: ruby-crowned kinglet, myrtle and palm warblers were low, and I did not see any of the following: winter wren, golden-crowned kinglet, fox sparrow. Later migrants that seemed low in numbers included magnolia, black-and-white, and Nashville warblers, and Northern waterthrush (the scarcity of the latter may be explainable on the basis of the very dry conditions). Other species missed entirely were bank swallow and eastern bluebird. Species that seemed slightly less abundant than usual included the brown thrushes and most of the other warblers. The early, dense foliage may explain the seeming scarcity of warblers, together with the heat that inhibited song early in the day.

Species that seemed more abundant than normal were turkey vulture, most shorebirds, vesper sparrow, and rufous-sided towhee.

Bell's vireos returned to their usual breeding sites in the Iowa City area (Hickory Hill park, Cou Falls, Williams Prairie). Kent Park was not visited so the status of those birds is not known.

Cliff swallows continue to breed in good numbers on the Iowa City bridges.
