Dear Dr. Kent,

As requested on the Iowa Bird Line, here is a portion of my Field Reports for this Fall. I am enclosing Cuckoos on. I hope you'll excuse the typing. I was going to retype it, but really didn't want to take the time.

As you can see, I provided you a whole lot more information than you will probably need. I figured that since I had the data, I might as well send it and let you do the editing.

Again, I only reported those species for which I was certain of the identification, and in all counts conservative. I realized early in Sept. that I was not equipped to distinguish Bay-breasted, Blackpoll, and Pine Warblers, and so generally didn't attempt to report these. On Sept. 6 I found literally 100s of these, presumably Bay-breasted. I did report a last date on a Bay-breasted simply because it was obviously one of these(bay on sides).

Regarding the Yellow-bellied Flycatcher details. I based this identification as much on behavior as appearance. You can do what you want with it--my skin is thick and I know this species is a problem. I saw several others that I would have called Yellow-bellied, but didn't have the energy to write details.

I hope rumors are true that you are submitting a proposal for editing"Iowa Bird Life". I wrote a letter to Jim Dinsmore(not for publication) urging the change. I really like Pete and all that, but regarding the editorial quality of the journal, Iowa needs to put a better foot foreward. Best of luck.

Also, enclosed is the Ill. Heron Count results, which may be of intrest to you. Several Iowa colonies are identified.

Finally, I am planning to do an X-mass Count here in Keokuk, probably on a Sunday. Tentatively, J. Sandrock and Francis, among others are coming. It would be great if you and Dr. Sandrock came down together--I would happily give you and Francis the best route. I think it could be an excellent count with enough good observers. The Crow roost alone, if like last year, can make the

whole trip worthwhile. Unfortunately, this will not be included in Am Birds. I sent my proposal in the first week of Oct., then a month later received a letter saying it had been received too late (it was due Oct. 15). It pissed me off, but what to do? Anyway, I can still include it in "Iowa Bird Life".

I will send in the remainder of my Field Reports probably early next week.
