Red-shouldered Mawk. 1 in Dick Mooney's yard on 1 Jan. Another reported by Geo. Thompson in n.w. part of city.

Bald Eagle. 18-20 on Saylorville L. mob

Red-breasted Nuthatch. 3 at Lurene Warters' feeders 15 Jan.

Pheasant. Gene Armstrong's feeding attracted ca 90. Subsequently reduced to ca 75. Heavy mortality suspected because of depth of snow.

Short-eared Owl. 3 visible from Armstrongs' window for several days.

Long-eared Cwl One seen briefly in same tree as last year. Mear Armstrongs'

Brown Thrashers. 1 at Warters' for 1 day. Several other reports of attempted wintering.

Townsend's Solitaire. 1 in Glendale Cem. from 21 Dec. to 31st

- Yellow-headed Blackbirds. one on 12 Dec near Polk C. by Keith Wiggers, a visitor from Wash. Another on 21 Jan. at Cummings, south of Des M. by James Wilson
- Eve. Grosbeak. Several scattered reports of individuals. Evidently none remained.

Purple Finch. Armstrongs had as many as 15. Most other reports of very small numbers. Never more than 1 at our feeder

Redpoll. Dr. Edmund Burke (my urologist) on farm near Adel saw "an occasional one" One other reported to Gene Armstrong.

Siskins. Small numbers at several locations. 3 the most at ours.

Goldfinch. 75 at Armstrongs' the largest concentration

Chipping Sparrow. 1 at Maxwell, north of D.M. on 18 Jan. Larry Link

Lapland Longspurs Dick Mooney saw 40 on 8 Dec. near Grimes. Gene Armstrong reported a flock of ca 50 mixed Longspurs and Snow Buntings.

Snow Buntings. 11 at Armstrongs' feeder.
