one of former graduate students (Ellen Snyder) saw a Black-billed Cuckoo on 7 May in Ames. She saw it well and got a good look. She used to teach bird study for me so I am confident that she knows what the bird looks like. That is a fairly early date for the species.

Bird notes

House Finch--Erv Klaas had a male and female House Finch at his bird feeder at home on 2 and 3 April.

Yellow-headed Blackbird--a male was seen clearly by Darryl Kroeker and the bird study class on 30 March at Anderson Lake. The bird was seen well and the yellow head and black body were both noted. The bird was seen through a spotting scope and seen well by many in the class.

Ruffed Grouse--a male Ruffed Grouse has been seen for several days north of Stratford (near the Boone Forks area) by Clayton Swanson. Swanson said the bird was quite pugnacous and approached him closely with feathers erect, etc. He saw the repeatedly in late March and called me about it on 6 March.
