## 1987 Fall Field Reports

### Details of Unusual Sightings

#### 1. White-winged Scoter - Nov. 1 - Saylorville Res. - 3 birds

All three large, dark brown scoters showed two spots on the side of the head - one just behind the bill and the second behind and under the eye. When they flew, the white speculum was easily seen on each duck.

#### 2. Black Scoter

Nov. 11 - DeSoto Bend - The bird was an adult ♂. It was slightly larger than ruddy duck and was all black except for a very small lighter colored spot at the base of the black bill.

Nov. 15 - Saylorville Res. - ♀ - seen by many at Fall 10K.  
Small dark scoter with very definite whitish cheek patches.

#### 3. Surf Scoter

Nov. 1 - Saylorville Res. - (1) - with three white-winged scoters. Dark brown scoter with two white spots on side of head. No white patch in wing when all four ducks flew.

Nov. 11 - DeSoto Bend - 5 birds - all were ♀'s or imm. ♂'s with the two spots on the side of the head and no white in wing.

#### 4. Merlin - Nov. 11 - DeSoto Bend -

Small brownish falcon with dark barred tail (fairly short) and heavily streaked breast. The bird flew rapidly up the river staying only 2 to 3 ft. above the water.

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### Details of Unusual Sightings

5. Sharp-tailed Sparrow - first on Sept. 21 - Snake Creek Marsh - mob - one to two were found during at least 4 trips between Sept 21 and early Oct. -

Field marks I like to see before I ID -

1. Yellow-orange eyebrow, face, upper breast, and sides
2. Grayish cheek patch
3. Gray, unstreaked nape
4. Brownish crown with light gray median stripe
5. Some dark streaking on sides
6. Usually white streaks (4) seen on back (scapular area).

6. The "probable" Black-legged Kittiwake on 29 Nov. on Des Moines River just north of Saylorville Res. was viewed from extremely long range with only <sup>10x40</sup> binoculars. The only reasons that led me to think of a kittiwake are as follows: 1. very noticeable white triangles could be seen in the wings - These seemed to be formed by dark primaries bordering on one side and a dark carpal bar on the other. ~~and~~ 2. The bird was almost as big as the ring-billed gulls it was with - I think Bonapartes would have looked smaller even at the distance. and 3. bird had a dark terminal band on tail. That's it - I didn't or couldn't see a spot on the head or a bar on the hind neck bar. I don't think I could justify a documentation with so few field marks - I was ashamed to document the other <sup>Saylorville</sup> kittiwake except that I did see the ~~the~~ neck bar on that one. Can't do with this report as you see fit - it won't go on any of my lists.
