Subject: addenda to IOU summer report

You may be aware of this, Jim, but a couple of birders reported a Red-shouldered Hawk on the Maser farm woods, just north of Kettleson Hogsback on 7/6/92. I got the information second-hand, but was told that the birders included a Dennis Thompson of Des Moines (IOU member??) and a retired biology professor from U. of Illinois. Perhaps you can glean this from other reports that come in, but if not, I thought it would be of interest to you.

I happened to mention this sighting to Lee Schoenewe, and he stated he saw what he thought was a Red-shouldered Hawk in the same location this spring, but he was afraid to tell anyone lest they think he was kidding. After I told him about this, he said he might try to recall the sighting and report it to you, so you may want to check his report when it comes in.

As you're aware, we have about 110 acres of woodlands between the lakes at the Kettleson Hogsback area, with the Maser farm directly to the north having another 80 acres or so of timber, for a total approaching 200 acres. Is that enough to support a red-shouldered hawk or pair?

Anyway, it's an exciting occurrence if correct. I've not had time to go up and search for the bird (or birds) yet myself, but I hope to make some time in the near future. I'll let you know if anything turns up.
