Hope everything is going well for you and that you saw plenty of good birds this spring. As you know my family and I are still in Iowa. After quitting my job as a naturalist, I found employment with one of the many manufacturing companies here in Ida Grove. Unfortunately this has cut into my birding. Hopefully things will slow down a bit this summer and fall and I can spend a little more time in the field.

The cold weather really concentrated some of the species here in Northwestern Iowa. The number of warblers especially Blackpoll, American Redstart, Mourning, and Cestnut-sided were amazing. On May 24 I saw 16 Mourning Warblers, which is more than I usually see for an entire year! Of course the cold weather brought many of the tree top dwellers down to ground level. I had my best views ever of Blackburnian, Bay Breasted and Cape May Warblers.

The oddest behavior was on May 12 in Cherokee at a park called Spring Lake. If I remember right it didn't get above 45 degrees. I drove around the park and for some reason stopped near a wood chip pile. After a couple minutes, I could not believe my eyes. First one then two and finally three male Cape May Warblers had strategically positioned themselves on the pile. Each one defended a small territory on top of the pile. They seemed to tolerate each other, but gave chase to any other bird - especially Yellow Rumped Warblers - that approached. They must have enjoyed the heat and bugs rising from the wood chips.

Surprisingly most birds returned within several days to a week of normal. Though for the most part these early arrivals were small in number, usually 1 or 2 birds.

From my list I see that I might have several late and one early date. As none of these are casual species I was hoping that I could give you a brief description of each. If there is any problem drop me a note. We have bought a house and now have a different address The new address is 407 Court, Ida Grove Iowa 51445.

A pair of Red Necked Grebes was at Blackhawk Lake on 5/24/96. The grebes were large with a long, thick, yellow bill. The bird had a white throat/cheek patch that was triangular in shape. The back of the neck was dark while the front was red.

A White-winged Scoter was at Blackhawk Lake on 5/24/96. The duck was black in color with a small white patch by the eye. The bill appeared to be covered by feathers over most of it leaving the tip of the bill exposed - orangish in color.

A Buff Breasted Sandpiper was in a flooded field south of Tomahawk Marsh in Sac Co. on 5/26/96. Pectoral size, small

rounded head, short black bill, short neck, buff color appeared almost orange and was located on face, throat and breast.

A Lincoln's Sparrow was at Moorehead Park in Ida Co. on 5/28/96. Finely streaked breast and sides washed in tan, gray crown stripe bordered by reddish stripes, gray eyebrow. three basic colors, grayish head, red/brown back, white belly.

A Great Tailed Grackle was observed at a marsh area south of Lake View on 3/16/96. The bird was grackle shaped, with a lone tail, yellow eye, body color was black with an iridescent purple on the head.
