

Lake Red Rock + Red Rock Refuge

Lake Red Rock back to permanent pool Sept 1, wheat planted, Refuge beautiful with birds, Oct 3, flood waters halved over Refuge + from cliff to cliff 15 miles North. A mess! Finally back to permanent pool in mid Nov. Goose + duck migration poor, Shorebirds were unprecedented!

Common Loon on Oct 30, first one I'd seen at Red Rock

A. C. Cormorants - first 6 on Sept 9, peaked at 234 thru Oct, all used same roost each night.

Great Blue Herons - began building up in Aug, peaked at 228 + thru Sept. Oct flooding caused most to move out tho 30 + 40 seen in Oct, 2 as late as Nov 10.

Little Blue Herons (rare here) immatures thru Aug to Sept 8.

Great Egrets - greater numbers than ever seen before in Red Rock. Peaked at 105, moved out with Oct flood. Only 2 seen thereafter.

Black-crown Night Herons - 3 a. + 6 i. on Sept 3, 4 a. on Sept 22; 4 a. + 5 i. on Sept 29.

American Bittern peak of 12 in Refuge Sept 26.

Cattle Egret - 1 i. in Refuge Sept 23 to Oct 3. Associated with Great Egrets in roost + fed with cattle at edge of Refuge.

Canada Geese - 185 by mid Sept, early, but almost no more after Refuge again flooded Oct 3. (about 70 - 4000 in Nov.)

Snow Geese - peaked at 2000 (1970-12,000)

Ducks - in general poor migration.

Mallards peaked at 20,000 in Nov. (but had 20 to 50,000 in past years)

Turkey Vultures - In the Elk Rock Bluff roost (a summer roost) 50 to 100 thru late Sept to mid Oct. at Red Rock Bluff (also a summer roost) peaked at 160 one evening Oct 6, 53 to 69 each eve thru Oct 15, then 10, + last 8 on Oct 20.

Bald Eagles - 1 i. arrived Sept 28, peaked at 9, first a. on Oct 28. (Previous early date for a. Nov 5, 6)

Marsh Hawks - Only 2 seen all fall, usually are numerous in Refuge when not flooded.

Owlprey - only 3 seen on Sept 16

Peregrine - 1 to 3 present for 4 weeks (last 3 wk. Sept 1st week Oct) 1 was an immature.

Kestrels - peak of 11 seen on Sept 27. Scarce otherwise.

Semipalmated Plovers - 1 to 6 seen during 5 weeks of Sept + Oct.

Piping Plover ~~seen no great~~ ^{only} seen on Sept 8

Amer. Golden Plover - present all of Aug + Sept + 3 weeks of Oct. Highest counts for single days were 50, 75, 91, + 139.

Two still in summer plumage on Sept 9. Usually we have few Goldens in fall.

Black-bellied Plover Present last 3 weeks Aug, all of Sept, + 3 weeks Oct.

High counts for single day ranged from 9, 12, 20, + 35.

Ruddy Turnstone ~~rare migrant~~ ^{seen last week of Aug and 4 weeks of Sept.} High Count of 5 on 1 day. (Rare here)

Common Snipe - few seen - 3 weeks of Aug, 4 weeks Sept + 3 weeks Oct with 1, 5, 7 per day.

Brants ~~seen no great~~ ^{rare migrant} seen last week Aug, 4 weeks Sept, + 2 weeks Oct. Ranging from 1, 4, 7, 17, 26 per day.

Least Sandpipers - Peaked in Oct with 150 seen on Oct 13, last 3 to Oct 18.

Dunlin (uncommon migrant) present only during last 3 weeks of Oct, ranging from 16, 24, 53 per day.

Savitchers ~~seen no great~~ ^{rare migrant} present all of Aug, Sept + 2 weeks Oct. Ranged from 8, 15, 23 per day.

Still Sandpiper ~~rare migrant here~~ seen all of Aug + Sept + 2 weeks Oct. Ranged from 18, 30, 39, 85, to 150 per single day!!

Western Sandpiper ~~rare migrant here~~ present 1 week of Aug, all of Sept + 1 week Oct 1 to 5 birds per day.

Buff-breasted Sandpiper ~~rare migrant~~ present throughout Aug + Sept and the weekend of Oct 13. Counts ranged from 5, 17, 21, 23, 35, + 52 per day.

Feeding in short grass field near lake.

Marbled Godwit ~~rare migrant~~ Only 1 seen on Sept 22 + 23. Same bird, had a crooked leg.

Sanderlings ~~rare migrant here~~ present 3 weeks of Aug, all of Sept + first 2 weeks Oct. Ranged from 1 to a high of 23.

Amer. Avocet (rare casual, a western species) 13 seen on Oct 14.

Wilson's Phalarope - 7, 13, 15 first 3 weeks Aug and 11 in Sept

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Northern Phalarope (rated Casual here)

1 on Sept 8 and 1 on Sept 15

Farster's Tern - 2 on Sept 8; 3 Sept 29; 8 Oct 6 and
10 Oct 13

Common Tern (uncommon migrant here)

1 on Sept 8; 3 Sept 22; 2 on Oct 6 + 4 on Oct 13

Caspian Terns (uncommon migrants here)

present Sept 12 through Oct 13 peaking
at 21, 64, 75 per day.

Olive-sided Flycatcher (uncommon migrant)

2 on Sept 1, 12, + 22.

Eastern Bluebirds - Scarce. A few small
flocks seen during migration. I think we had
a major kill in our April 9 blizzard.

Water Pipit (uncommon migrant)

7 on Oct 13; 11 on Oct 14; 20 on Oct 22; 30 on Oct 28

Northern Shrike (rare winter resident)

positive identification by Bill Cramwell + me,
half an hour study w/ binoculars + scope!

I on Oct 27 + 1 on Oct 28, same bird in
same locality. (I very rarely ever see
a Northern Shrike in this area. I have observed
carefully also on early date, Oct 27, 1970.)

Pine Siskins - (uncommon winter resident)

a flock of 25 on Oct 27. Usually I see only
1 or 2 associated with Goldfinches.

Sparrows very scarce here this fall.
With all the flood plain covered with water
there are no moist weed fields this fall.

Le Conte's (uncommon migrant)

1 on Oct 9 + 3 on Oct 20.

Juncos + Tree Sparrows, our most
common winter residents, are far
scarcer this fall than usual.
