
Calendar of Events Continued...

Chapter News

Osprey Nest Platform Project

Two 40' poles with 30'x30' nest platforms have been installed in our area in the hopes that osprey will begin nesting here. Both of these poles are in areas where birds have been observed during previous years: one sits on the northwest corner of highway 52 and Poleline road, on Luther College property. The pole is visible on the north side of Poleline—look for it along the hillside. The second pole is located to the south and a bit west on the Jewell farm property. There are many who deserve heartfelt thanks: Luther College and the Jewell family were kind enough to allow the nest platforms to be installed on their property; Hawkeye Electric provided the poles and installed them, in addition to donating time and equipment for the project; Dave Kester, Bob Chapman, and Rick Thorton donated time, energy and expertise. Bob Anderson, who oversaw the project and deserves the greatest thanks, has plans to erect a natural stick nest in a tree in an area which also appears conducive to nesting. Anyone sighting Osprey activity around these poles should contact Bob Anderson at the 382-6300.

Birding Highlights

Red-breasted Nuthatches and Purple Finches were unusually numerous during the past winter. A Gray Catbird appeared at LeRoy and Susan Anderson's feeder on November 19th and was last seen on January 23rd. LeRoy fed it cat food. Beverly and Loren Clark hosted a Varied Thrush that appeared at their home in NW Allamakee County on January 25th and was present until February 15th. The Anderson's found a flock of 11 White-winged Crossbills at Springfield Lutheran Church near Calmar, on January 11th. The crossbills were seen by other birders as well. The mild February weather produced early arrivals of Eastern Bluebird, American Robin, and Red-winged Blackbird, late in the month. The strong south winds of March 25th brought 16 species of ducks to Cardinal Marsh, also an early Tree Swallow.



Teaming with Wildlife—a natural investment

Teaming with Wildlife is a proposal for federal legislation that will put a small user fee in the form of an excise tax (from 1/4% to 5%) on outdoor-related products such as field guides, binoculars, birdfeed and camping equipment. The purpose of the user fee is to provide stable and adequate funding for wildlife diversity programs in all 50 states who are responsible for wildlife conservation, education and recreation. The money generated through this user fee will be returned to the states earmarked specifically for the above mentioned purposes. The goal of this legislation is to expand and improve existing wildlife programs and establish new ones protecting all wildlife species, especially nongame, and their habitats.

Teaming with Wildlife if modeled on the user pay / user benefit system established by hunters and anglers on their sporting gear. The user fees collected from the sale of hunting and fishing equipment have been directly responsible for some of conservation's biggest success stories—restoration of fish and wildlife populations that once were critically low; conservation of millions of acres of wildlife habitat; and countless hours of recreation on America's land and waterways, to the benefit of all of us.
