It will give you time to send samples for inspection, analysis or test to the State Seed Inspector or to the Agricultural Experiment Station. Our stocks will stand the closest scrutiny and we are ready to be judged accordingly.

THE ADDITIONAL PARTS OF OUR ESTABLISHMENT

THIRTY-TWO GREENHOUSES erected during the past few years are devoted to growing plants for the mail order trade, and contain a greater variety of plants than any other greenhouse establishment in the west. They are located convenient to the electric car line, fronting five blocks on 31st street, from Center street north to Kingman Boulevard, one of the finest driving streets in the city. Here we devote fully twelve acres to flowers, making the finest display to be found in the west.

WHOLESALE BUILDING is located at 208-210-212 South Eighth street, about eight blocks from our store. The railway tracks beside the building give us excellent facilities for handling carload lots, and we are centrally located between various freight depots so that all shipments can be made promptly. Our machinery is operated by six electric motors, and our mills for cleaning seed cannot be surpassed. Most of our employees have been with us many years, and no "green hands" handle bulk seeds.

THE WAREHOUSE on South Fifth street we have occupied for many years for storage purposes only. Large lots of seed which come in after harvest are thoroughly cleaned and then put away in this building for the spring trade.

SEED CORN HOUSE.—We have a very large trade in seed corn and to care for it properly we erected a large building on our seed farm at Altoona. We now have capacity for 25,000 bushels of seed corn, every ear of which can be given the personal inspection of an expert.

GRAIN ELEVATOR.—At Altoona, with 12-bin capacity, for caring for our seed grain, the demand for which is expanding to enormous proportions. Photograph on page 37.

SEED FARMS.—It requires the seed crop from about 8,600 acres to supply our trade and the farms are widely isolated so as to avoid any mixtures. Some seeds cannot be grown to advantage here, and we contract with practical seed growers elsewhere to grow for us.

He places the contracts, inspects the growing crops, superintends the farm operations in summer and during the busy months in spring he gives personal oversight to the order filling department.

SEEDS BY PARCELS POST

BE SURE AND ADD ONE POUND ADDITIONAL TO COVER WEIGHT OF PACKING

Many of our friends will prefer to have their seeds come by parcel post rather than by express. There is not much difference in the cost of transportation by these two methods, but if you want the seeds to come by mail you must send postage, because it must be prepaid. We submit herewith a table showing the postage per pound to each state. This is figured in the way to be most easily understood by our friends. The only thing to remember is to add one pound over the actual amount of seeds you order to cover the weight of packing. For example, you live in Alabama and you order three pounds of Gradus peas by parcel post. You will add 24 cents to the price quoted in the catalogue. If you live in Illinois and want a peck of peas by parcel post, add 64 cents to the price in the catalogue.

If the postage you send is more than is necessary the surplus will be returned to you inclosed in a small envelope within the package. If you do not send postage we will take it for granted you want the goods forwarded by express or freight.

Remember that we pay the postage on garden seeds ordered by the packet, ounce, quarter pound or pound, no matter what the cost; but on larger quantities postage must be added if we are to send them by mail.

SUGGESTIONS TO CUSTOMERS

Our constant aim is to make the highest quality the first consideration, and next to put our prices as low as good seed can be sold

Order Early: The best time to order is just as soon as you receive this catalogue, as we can always give your orders more of our personal attention if they come in before the rush of the spring trade. Please use the order sheet, as it makes it more convenient for us in filling orders. You will note there are two order sheets enclosed; one for seeds, tools and miscellaneous goods, and the other for plants, bulbs and nursery stock. If you will use them as intended, it will greatly facilitate the execution of your orders. Terms are invariably cash with order, as we keep no book accounts in our mail order department, and the expense of sending goods C. O. D. is quite large. Postage stamps received the same as cash.

Shipping: There are five express companies and fifteen railroad lines at Des Moines, so that quick shipments can be made to any town in the United States.

Charges Prepaid: All Vegetable and Flower Seeds, Bulbs and Plants, except those noted, are sent prepaid by mail or express by the quickest and most direct routes, unless ordered otherwise, and we guarantee the safe arrival. Seeds sold by the peck or bushel, Field Seeds, Potatoes, Implements and other heavy goods are sent by freight or express, customers paying charges. Remember seeds go at special rates by express.

Seeds by Mail: Seeds, plants and bulbs may be sent by Parcel Post. The table of rates above gives amount of postage required on quantities over one pound. Miscellaneous merchandise may go by Parcel Post, and mailing weight is given on items of this kind.

Delivery: The point of delivery of all goods is on cars at Des Moines. When we quote a delivery price it means simply that we prepay the freight, express charges or postage.

Many of our former customers live at railroad stations where there are no agents. In such cases we must request them to send sufficient money to prepay freight charges on heavy shipments; and in cases where perishable or other goods are ordered to be sent by freight or express to such great distances that cost of transportation will nearly or quite equal the value of the goods.

Discounts: We have this year made the prices in this catalogue as low as our high grade seeds can be sold, and we can give no discounts. In ordering seeds in bulk you may deduct ten cents per pound on vegetable seeds, such as are listed prepaid, if you are willing to have them sent by express or freight at your expense.

Premiums: Each year we put up thousands of packets of new or particularly desirable varieties of seeds for free distribution to our customers. We will send these out with the seeds ordered by you and will treat you liberally in this respect. We shall also try to please our plant customers by adding something to their order when shipping it.

Our Responsibility: As this book will probably go into the hands of some who are unacquainted with us, this question will naturally arise, and in answer to same we refer you, by permission, to the People's Savings Bank of this city, to the postmaster, or to any express company.

What We Guarantee: That all money sent to us for seed shall reach us if sent us by registered letter, postoffice or express money order, or bank draft, made payable to our order. That your order will be filled promptly and well. That goods ordered will reach you safely. Keep a copy of your order. Sometimes persons think they have ordered articles which they have omitted, and blame us for not sending them.

About Warranties: We thoroughly test all our seeds and nothing is sent out which we do not believe to be good in every respect. When it is considered how many are the contingents on which the success of any crop depends, such as sowing too deep or too shallow, too wet or dry soil, unfavorable weather, insects, etc., our customers will readily see that it would be sheer folly for anyone to warrant seeds to produce a perfect crop, and we want it plainly understood that while we exercise great care to have all seeds pure and reliable, and also true to name, we do not give any warranty express or implied as to description, quality, productiveness, or any other matter of any seeds, plants or bulbs we send out and we will not be in any way responsible for the crop. If the purchaser does not accept the seeds on these terms and conditions, they are to be returned at once, and the money that has been paid for same will be refunded. No officer, agent or employee of this company is authorized to make any warranty whatsoever. However, we have so much confidence in our seeds that we hereby agree to refill any retail order for vegetable or flower seeds free of charge should they prove otherwise than as we represent them. We know of no responsible seed firm in the world which guarantees seeds any further than this. Compare with other seed catalogues and you will see that we are right.

Market Gardeners and others who buy vegetable seeds in bulk to the amount of \$5.00 or more are requested to send their list of seeds wanted to us and let us make special quotations.

Plant Orders: Orders for plants will be filled as early in the spring as we consider it safe to send them. If ordered for immediate shipment in severe weather they will be sent at purchaser's risk.

Small Orders: We take pains to fill orders promptly and correctly, no matter if only for but one packet of seeds, but we request that plant orders amount to at least 25 cents, and nursery stock to at least 50 cents, as otherwise they are filled at a loss to us.

ASPARAGUS

(One ounce will sow forty feet of drill. For roots, see page 38.) Easily grown and such a large quantity is produced on a small plot that every garden should contain a bed; ten feet square, requiring 50 plants, will give abundant supply for any ordinary family. Soak the seed four hours in tepid water; sow early in spring in rows a foot apart; keep clean by frequent weeding and hoeing. Ask for free circular giving instructions for making an asparagus bed.

COLUMBIAN MAMMOTH WHITE.—New and entirely distinct; produces shoots which are white and stay white as long as fit for use. Is more robust and vigorous, throws up larger shoots and fully as many as Conover's Colossal. Pkt. 5c, oz. 10c, ¼ lb. 20c, lb. 60c.

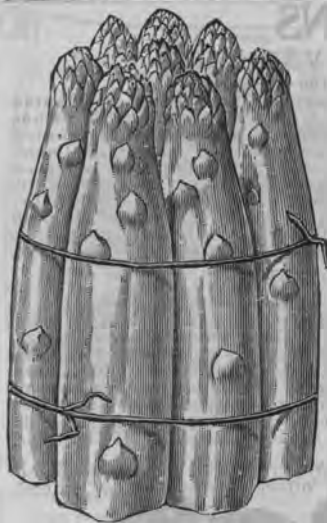
PALMETTO.—Stalks frequently measure 2 inches in diameter, and even when 12 inches long are perfectly tender when cooked. Pkt. 5c, oz. 10c, ¼ lb. 20c, lb. 50c.

ARTICHOKE

A great delicacy. A perennial producing large flower heads, which are the part eaten, the second season thereafter. The young stalks are also tied and blanched like celery, but are not equal to the flower heads. Cook like asparagus. Sow seed early in hotbeds or when weather becomes warm in rows 4 feet apart and 3 feet in the row. Started early sometimes blooms the first year.

(One ounce will produce about 3,000 plants.) Growth and habit like cauliflower, except more hardy, and heads are not so compact; not desirable for warm or dry countries, but is of special value in the North. Cultivate and use same as cauliflower.

EARLY LARGE WHITE.—The most popular sort. Has medium sized, creamy white heads. Pkt. 5c, oz. 35c.

BORECOLE, OR KALE

(One ounce will produce about 3,000 plants.) Hardier than cabbage; excellent greens during winter and spring; splendid food for poultry. Cultivate like cabbage.

CHUFAS

A nice little ground nut greatly liked by children. Its flavor resembles the coconut. ALPINE STRAWBERRIES.—If sown early will produce bearing plants first year. Grown in Europe, where they are ever-bearing, producing all summer. Pkt. 10c.

FRENCH SORREL.—Grown for and used as "greens." Has large light green leaves with mild acid flavor. Fine for salads. Pkt. 5c.

EGYPTIAN LENTILS.—Largely used in oriental countries as a principal article of diet. It was from these that the dish of pottage was made for which Esau sold his birthright to Jacob in Bible times. Pkt. 5c, oz. 10c, ¼ lb. 25c, lb. 75c.

CATERPILLARS.—Prostrate creeping plants with small yellow flowers, changing into "Vegetable Caterpillars." Grown as curiosities; put into salads or pickles. Pkt. 10c.

SNAILS.—Another singular variety having most oddly twisted seed pods resembling snails. Pkt. 10c.

COTTON.—Grown mainly as a curiosity in the North. Start seed early and transplant to the field about May 15. Has showy, large flowers, followed by boll of pure white cotton which interests everyone. Pkt. 5c, oz. 10c.

CARDOON.—A plant grown for its large, thick leaves. Blanched and used like asparagus. Pkt. 10c.

MARTYNIA.—Also called "Devil's Claw" and "Unicorn Plant." A large ornamental plant, bearing beautiful flowers which are succeeded by large seed pods which when young are fine for pickling. Pkt. 5c, oz. 30c.

SEA KALE.—Is grown and used like Chard Beets, except it is perennial and when established can remain for years without renewal. Pkt. 5c, oz. 30c.

SCOLYMUS.—Grown for the roots, which are used like salsify. Roots often 10 to 12 in. Can be dug and stored for winter. Pkt. 10c.

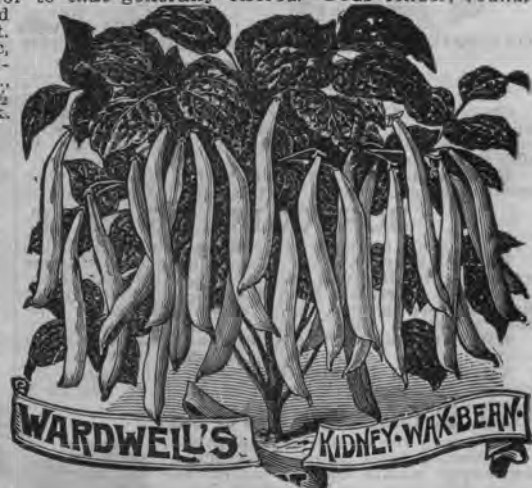
Dwarf or bush beans require no support and should be planted in drills an inch and a half deep and drop the beans three inches apart in drills. Beans are tender annuals and cannot be planted until danger of frost is past. A sandy loam is the best. Packages contain about 1½ oz. of wax beans, and about 2 oz. of green pod sorts. Prices include postage at pound rates. Larger quantities than one pound to go at customer's expense for transportation. If wanted by parcel post, add postage according to table on page 2. All varieties of beans are scarce.

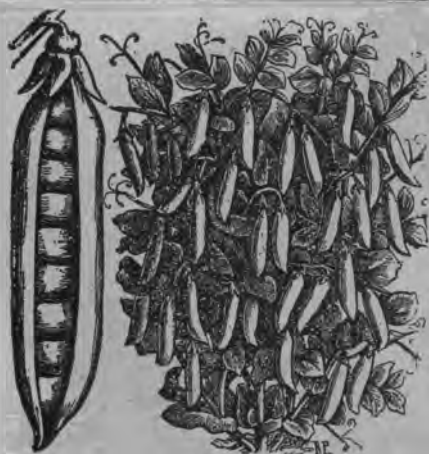

PEPPER

(One ounce will produce about 1,800 plants.)

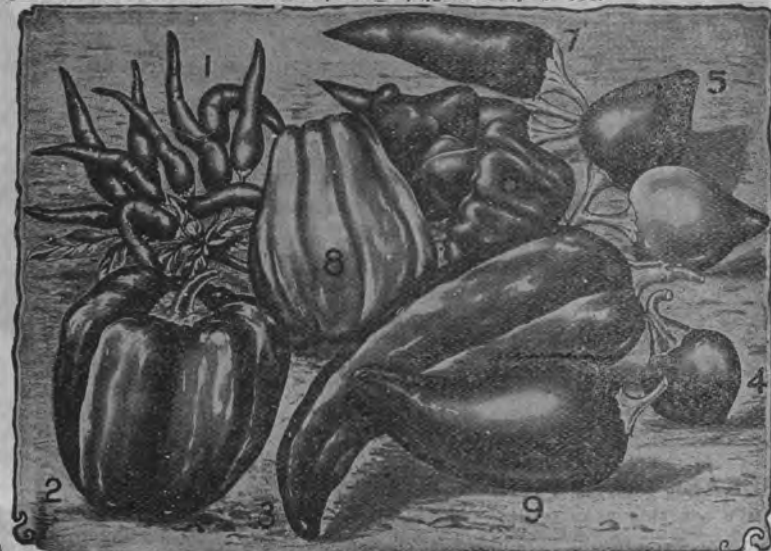

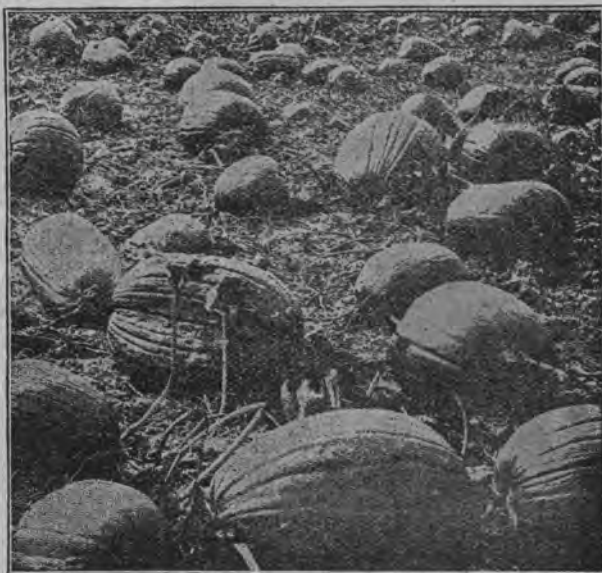

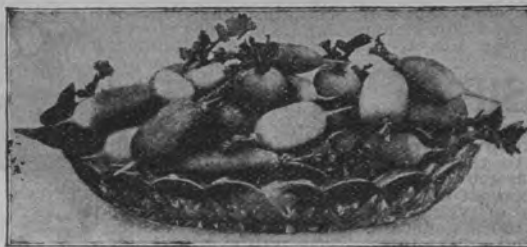

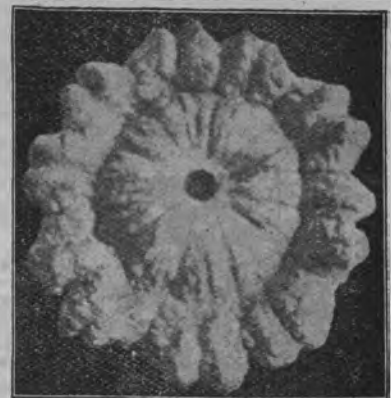

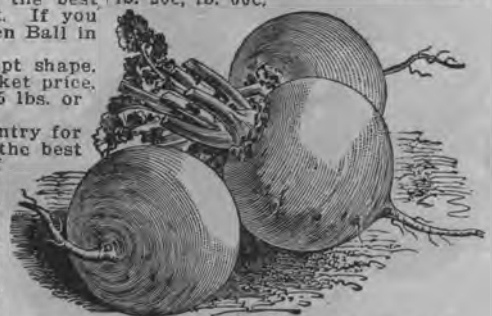

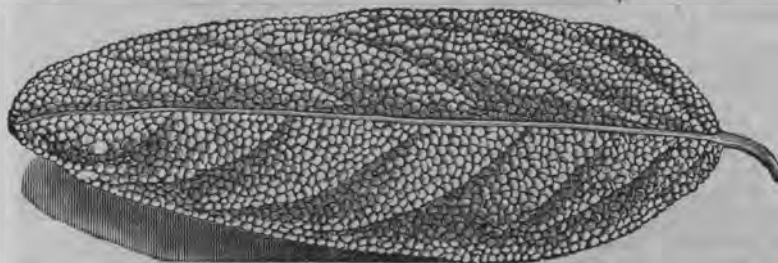

It is very highly recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture, who brought it to this country from the Egyptian Sudan, in 1909, and since growing it upon our own farms we give our recommendation and urge our customers to try it.

We offered Sudan Grass to our friends last year without our recommendation, because it was a comparatively new plant and had not been grown in Iowa. It was widely advertised, and we offered it in deference to inquiry from our friends. We purchased seed from growers in Texas and planted a small plot of a few acres at our Altoona farm. It grew so splendidly and made such a magnificent crop of hay that this year we are urging our friends who need an annual hay crop to plant Sudan Grass, believing it will produce more tonnage per acre than any other grass now grown. We know that it thrives in Iowa and from the

short time required for maturity we believe it can be grown anywhere in the United States with satisfactory results.

We recommend Sudan Grass to take the place of the millets as a summer hay crop. This in our judgment is its most valued place in the agriculture of Iowa. It will do as a substitute for sorghum for fodder or Kafir, Milo and Feterita as a forage plant, but we do not consider it as valuable in any form as if only for hay. In quality it is far superior to the millets. It does not get "dusty," nor is it so "seedy" as millet hay, while it will yield much larger quantities per acre than any variety of millet generally grown. The seed is not expensive, and when the small quantity required per acre is considered, you will see that you can grow a crop of it at less cost than any of the millets. It costs more to produce Sudan Grass seed in Iowa than in the South, hence we are asking a higher price for home grown stocks. We will send whichever you prefer.



Prof. Jas. Atkinson, Editor of the Iowa Homestead, in the field of Sudan Grass at the Iowa Seed Farm

Sudan Grass belongs to the same family as the sorghums, and the Kafir corn, and like plants, but does not grow so coarse, while producing fully as much leaf growth in proportion to the crop. It grows to a height of seven or eight feet, and the stalks vary in size from that of a lead pencil to a half inch in diameter. It is not difficult to cure, and it is claimed by those who have fed it to live stock to contain a great amount of food value.

Owing to the great similarity of Sudan Grass and Johnson Grass, care has to be taken in the selection of the seed. Johnson Grass is a perennial—that is to say, when once established it is hard to get rid of, as the winters do not destroy it. We have not offered Johnson Grass for a number of years because of this fact, and because it was unpopular with our farmers. The Sudan Grass, however, being annual in its nature, does not survive the winter and is not obnoxious nor difficult to get rid of.

Sudan Grass may be planted in cultivated rows, in close drills, or broadcast. If in cultivated rows, we recommend they be made 36 inches apart, using about 3 lbs. of seed per acre. It stands wonderfully if given room; this planting will produce a tremendous crop. Sometimes as much as fifteen or twenty tons per acre is produced. In the dry regions this is the best planting process. Usually the crop can be cut twice during the summer, making a second growth from the roots when the first cutting is removed.

Where there is plenty of rainfall, it may be sown in drills 18 inches apart, using 6 lbs. per acre, or it may be sown broadcast, using 15 to 20 lbs. per acre. Either method makes a solid mass of hay, but in our judgment the broadcast method produces finer quality hay, although not so much tonnage.

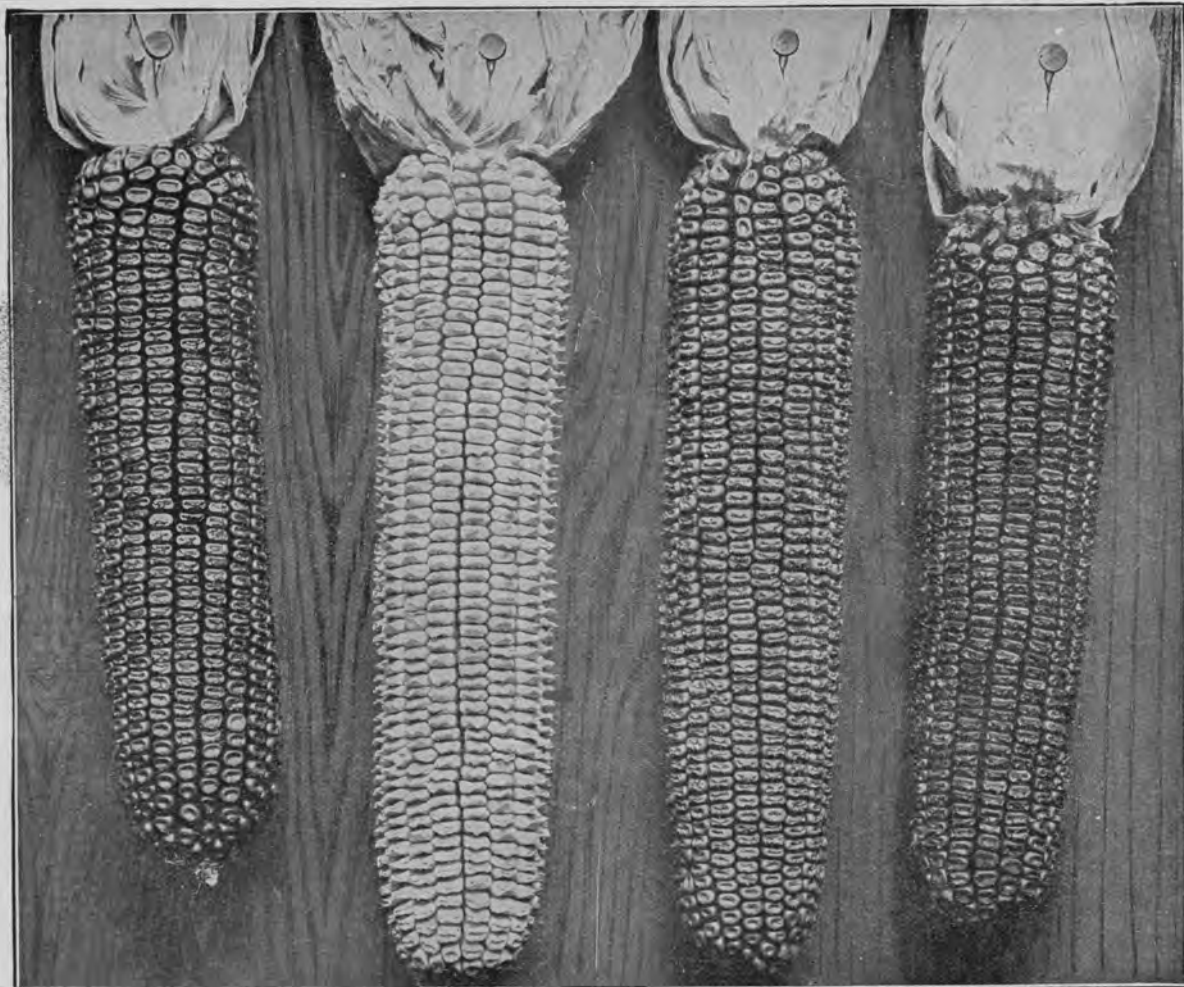
By the broadcast method recommended we mean either seeding and harrowing, or using the grain drill as in sowing rye or other small grained cereals.

As with millet and cane and other plants of similar nature, we believe in heavy seeding for Sudan Grass, because what is lacking in quantity is more than made up in quality, and if sown thickly as suggested in the last paragraph, live stock can consume the entire crop.

Because it belongs to the millet and sorghum family, it is not to be planted until the ground is thoroughly warm. Our recommendation is early June. In some seasons it might be started at corn planting time in May, but we believe as good results can be obtained by sowing after the corn has been planted, and is out of the way.

A GRADING MACHINE

It also separates clover from timothy and takes weeds out of grass seeds that cannot be removed by the screen and wind process of the ordinary fanning mills.

THE HESS GRAIN DRYER

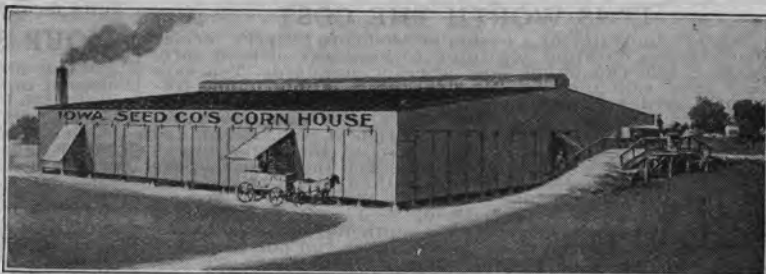

The interior arrangements consist mainly of very narrow high cribs with ventilators running through the entire length of them and narrow passages between the cribs. There is a very extensive system of steam pipes underneath which are used as needed for drying the corn and also to keep out moisture during foggy weather and to protect it from freezing.

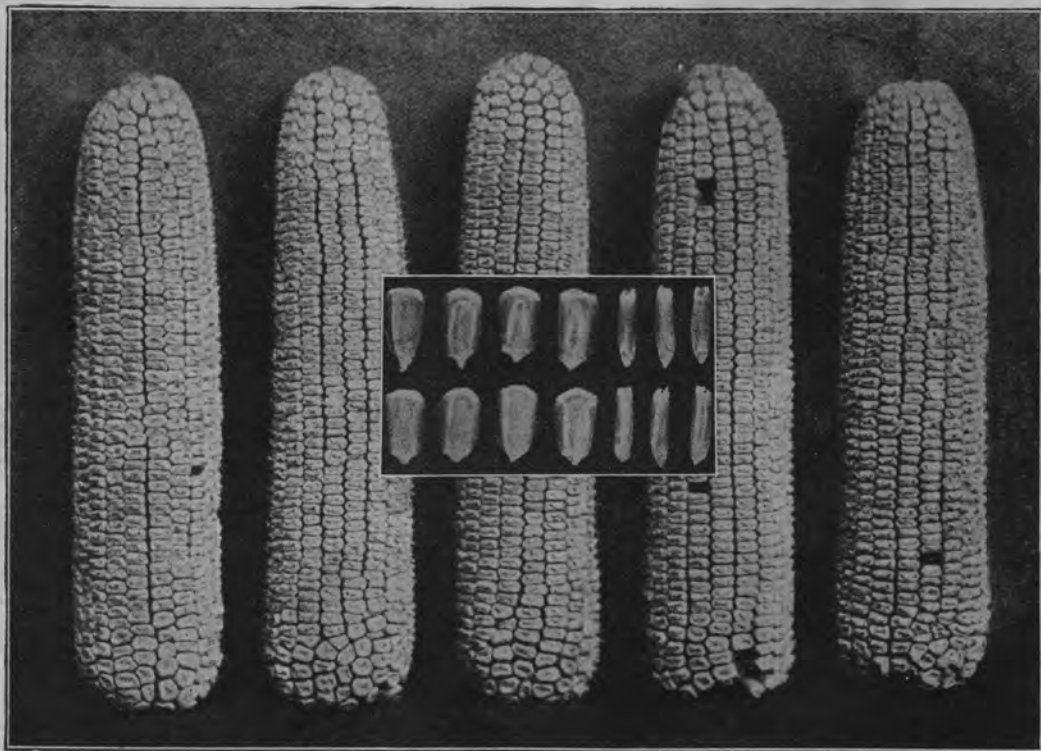

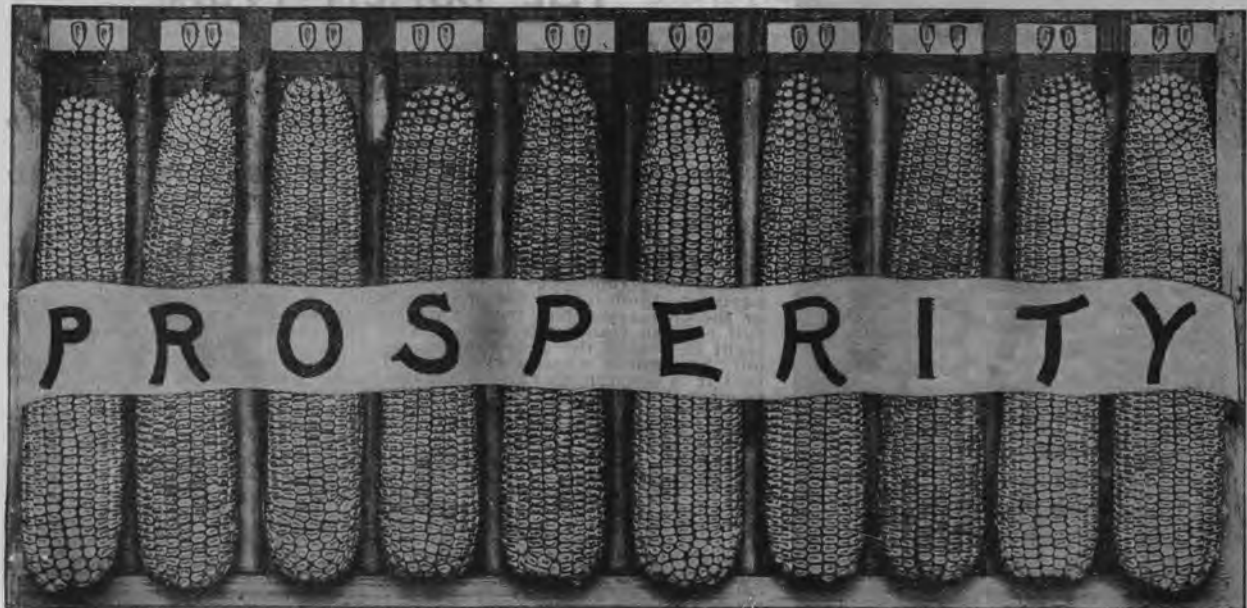

In a short season or a wet fall this fault is most pronounced and results in much waste and loss. The Prosperity is of a rougher type than the ordinary Reid's Dent. The grains are slightly hackled and are not so compact on the cob. This habit of growth permits the cob to dry more readily and avoids much of the loss by mold. The cob averages smaller and dries much more quickly so that Prosperity will mature earlier than Reid's Dent and will be sound and dry in seasons when a large proportion of the common type will spoil from dampness or early frost. We believe our Prosperity to be a real improvement in practical results, and it is for practical results we breed seed corn. The history of the Prosperity Corn goes back to 1893. There is no hard and fast rule that will govern the planting of any variety in a certain locality. Last season was so far from normal that even the earliest varieties did not make a crop in northern Iowa and none of the varieties planted in their usual location succeeded very well. There were exceptional fields planted extremely early, situated on favored plots, that did fairly well, but conditions were so unusual that results of last year are not to be taken as the real test of any variety. Our selections and recommendations above are based upon normal weather and soil conditions, and the varieties named will give splendid returns in ordinary years. In good seasons like the summer of 1914, most of the large varieties might be moved north fifty miles with good results, but we are content to make our recommendations as stated, believing it better to be conservative rather than lead our friends to plant large late corn in unsuited sections. The extreme north district named above is intended to include South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin and parts of the corn belt north of our Iowa line. The other districts are in accord with the division of Iowa as accepted by the Iowa Corn Growers' Association.

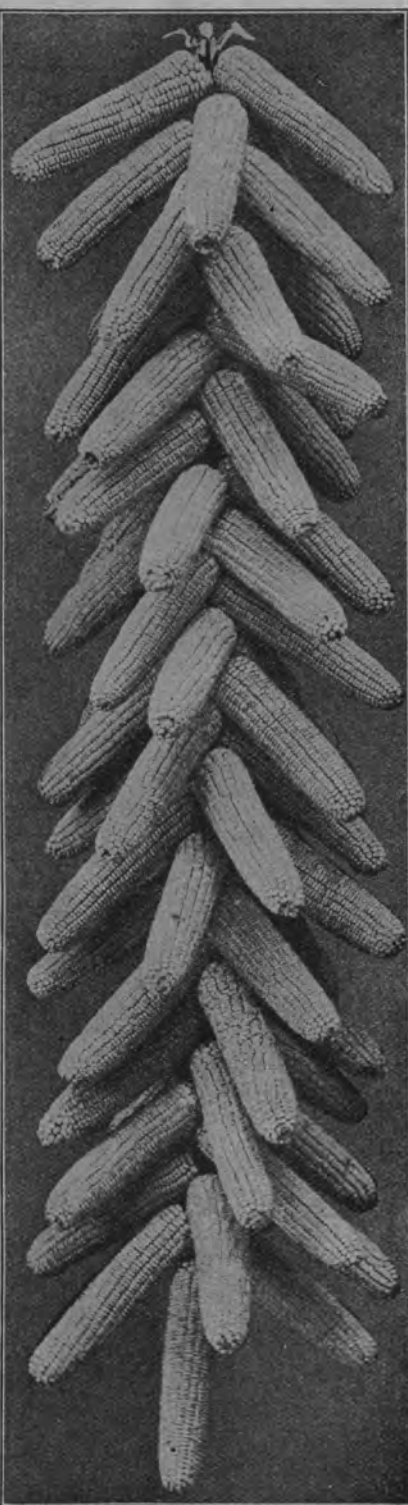

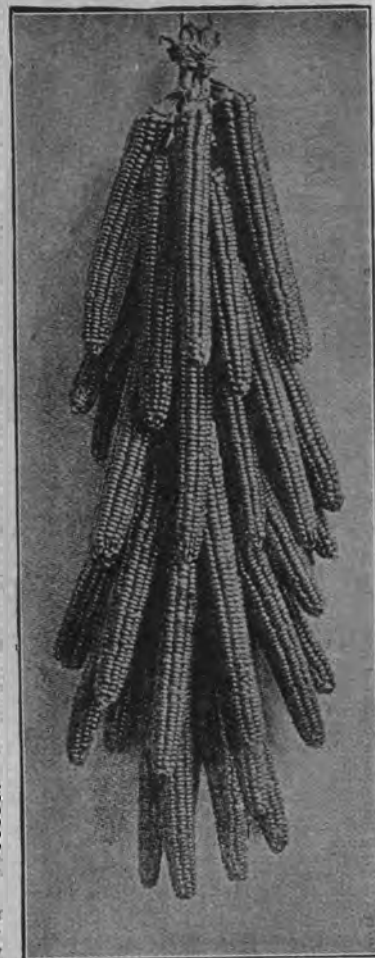

Ames, Ia., Oct. 16.—(Special).—A strain of oats, "Iowa 103," developed under Iowa conditions by the Iowa agricultural experiment station, proved itself worthy this last year in a number of sections of the state under practical farm conditions. At Oakville, Louisa county, one large field seeded with this strain outyielded the best local varieties by 20 bushels per acre. Other fields in the vicinity did nearly as well. In other counties "Iowa 103" also showed heavier yielding qualities, though not so much better than local sorts as in Louisa county. These facts are contained in reports to Jno. Buchanan, of the experiment station, secretary of the Iowa Agricultural Experiment Association, which is distributing the new varieties of seed developed at Ames. The Oakville test was conducted by F. E. Jamison, who got his first shipment of seed in 1913. Then he grew an acre of "Iowa 103" which produced 77 bu. of choice seed. He planted the entire 77 bu. last spring on $26\frac{1}{2}$ acres, from which he harvested this fall 1,800 bushels. "My field yielded 32 bushels per acre, by weight," says Mr. Jamison, in his report. "That is 20 bushels better than the next best field of oats in this entire section. Our neighborhood has reason to thank the co-operative association and the plant breeders at the experiment station for 'Iowa 103'."

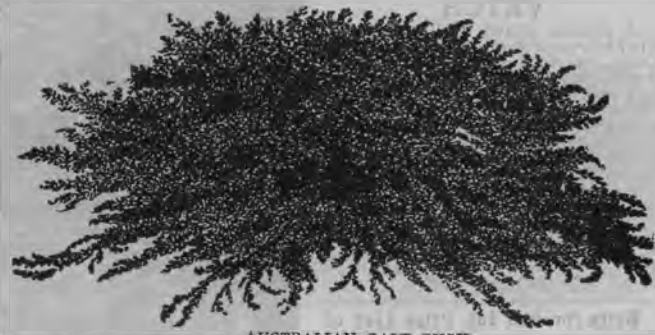

Sweet Clover has become a standard crop throughout the country. It is grown in every state in the Union. So great has grown the demand for seed that production has not been sufficient to keep prices down to low figures.

It is now being used in spring sowing exactly as common red clover. Some farmers seed it with small grain for nurse crop, while others are sowing it alone in early spring and securing both pasturage and hay the first year. The handling of this crop has passed the experimental stage. We have ceased to handle seed in the hull, as we now have machines to hull and clean it, so that we offer it in as high quality and purity as any clover. SCARIFYING THE SEED.—One great difficulty with sweet clover in the past was slow germination. In the natural condition the seed has a very hard hull and the germ does not start quickly. Sometimes spring sown seed would not sprout until fall, and at best only about 70 per cent germination might be expected. Prof. H. D. Hughes, of the Iowa Agricultural College, at Ames, Iowa, has perfected a machine to scarify the seed, and kindly permitted us to install one in our warehouse so that we can now supply our customers with seed that will show a high percentage of germination. The process of scarifying results in rubbing the seed against sandpaper, so that the hull is very thin, while in other respects the seed retains its normal condition, except that the grains are a trifle smaller. The shrinkage in size, however, is not perceptible. Of course it costs a little more to add the extra cost of labor, and the loss by shrinkage is considerable, but you get value received. A bushel of scarified seed will give you 25 per cent greater germination than untreated seed, and is really worth that much more to the planter. Use 12 to 15 lbs. of scarified seed per acre. This gives a heavy stand resulting in hay of fine texture and quality.

Sweet Clover belongs to the family of leguminous plants, and adds greatly to the fertility of the soil on which it has been grown. The same bacteria which live on its roots thrive on the roots of alfalfa and therefore it is claimed that alfalfa will do much better on land where Sweet Clover has previously been grown. It roots very deeply, therefore opens up the soil so as to adapt it for all other kinds of crops, making it not only more rich in nitrogen, but allowing the roots of other plants to penetrate more deeply.

HOME FLORICULTURE

By Chas. N. Page, formerly President Iowa Seed Co.

DIRECTIONS FOR SOWING, ETC.—The conditions and requirements of the several species as to soil, moisture, heat, etc., should be studied and observed in culture. We give a few general instructions though more complete directions are printed on seed packets. The soil best adapted to most flowers is light, rich loam, containing enough sand to make it porous. If there is some clay with it the colors will be brighter. Make surface smooth and fine as possible; sow seeds in rows, covering each sort of seed in proportion to its size (a good general rule being to cover twice the diameter of the seed) and press the soil down firmly over it. Do not plant any seeds when the ground is wet. Many varieties, such as pansy, verbenas, daisy, hollyhock and the fine greenhouse plant seeds, should be sown early in shallow boxes in the house, in soil consisting of equal parts of fine sand and rich, mellow loam well mixed together and sifted to remove all gravel and lumps. Sow as before directed. Covering the box with glass helps to retain the moisture and keeps the temperature even. Be careful not to keep too wet, and when large enough to handle, transplant to boxes from one to two inches apart to remain until put in permanent beds.

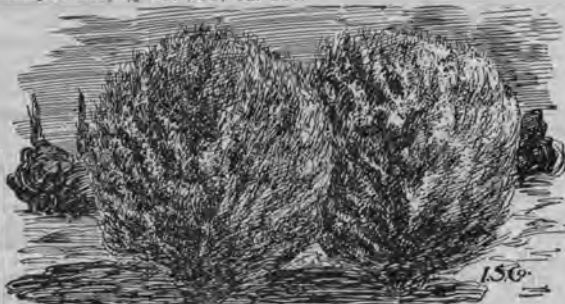

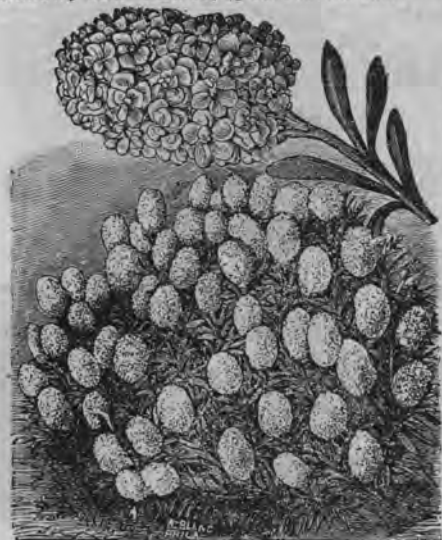

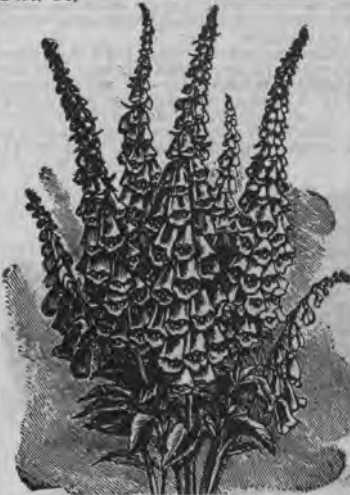

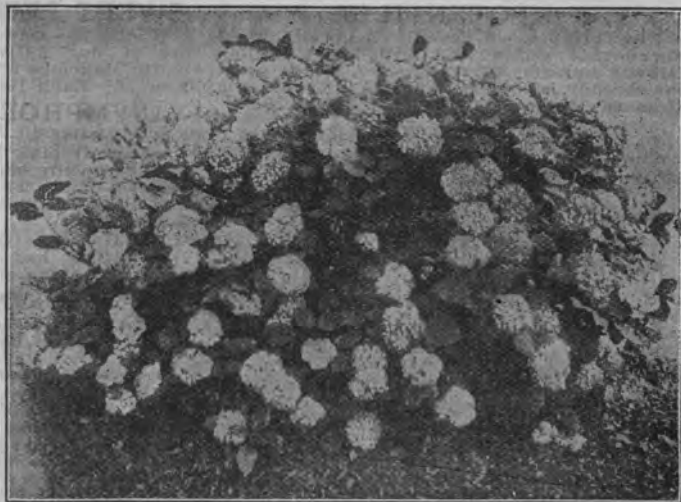

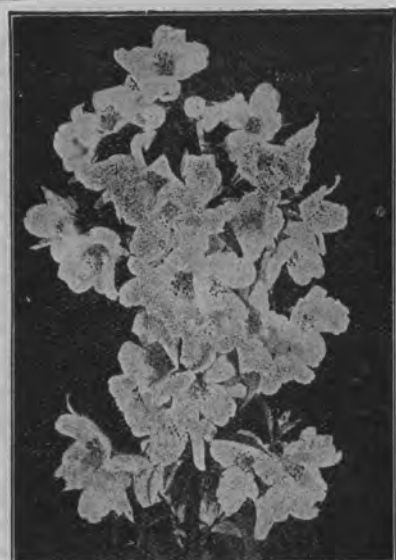

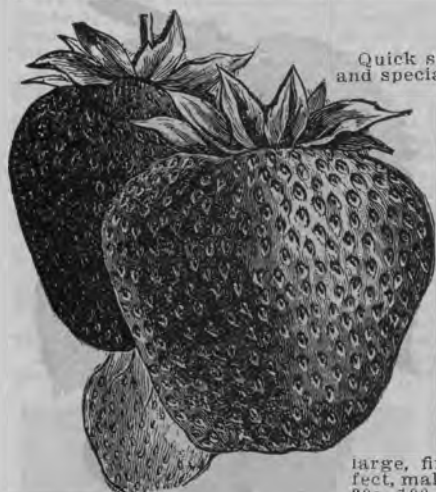
FALL BEARING STRAWBERRIES

These are a new race of strawberries that produce ripe fruit in October and November, generally lasting until hard, killing frosts. 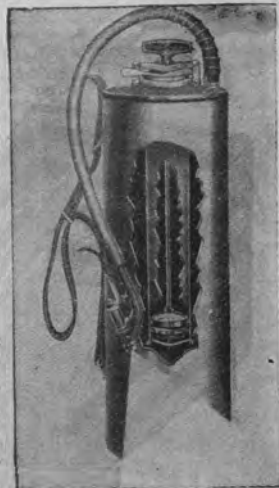
