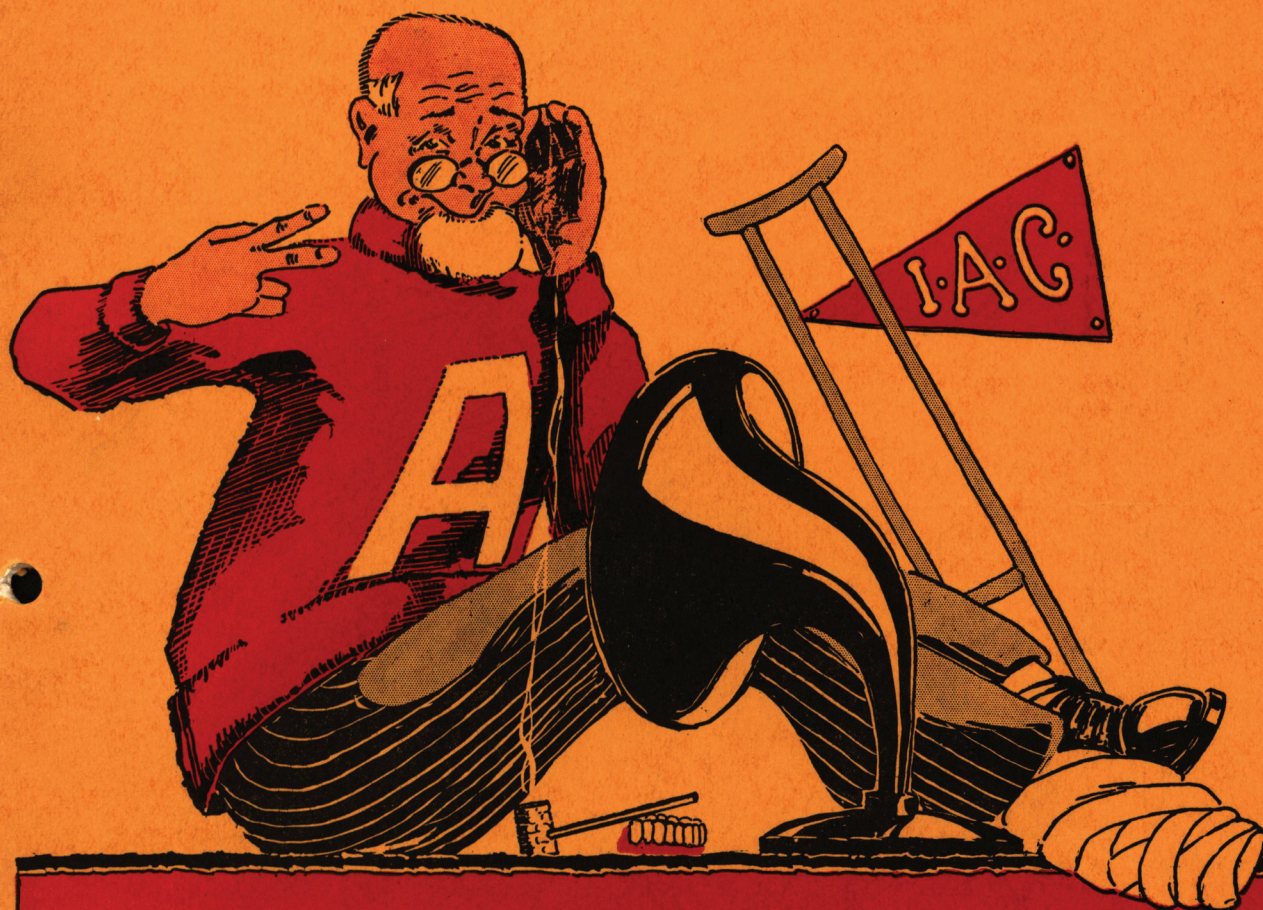

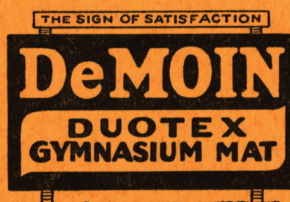

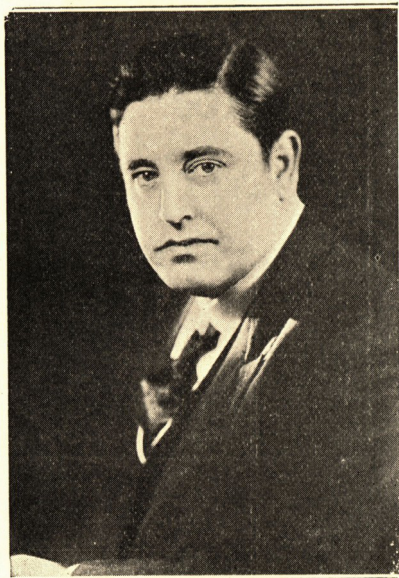

WALT WEISS

The visage here presented is the likeness of Walt Weiss, Iowa State's stellar quarterback and the captain of the football crew. Weiss played under the famous "Shorty" Boyd while at Denison. Following his football escapades in western Iowa he came to Iowa State, playing as an understudy to Johnnie Behm in his sophomore year. Last year he was outstanding in his return of punts, especially on cloudy days, when his would-be tacklers could not see him. He also has a little trick of sneaking up to the line and casually wriggling under and thru, with the ball, of course. This clever bit of workmanship won the game from Washington last year, the sneak being good for 20 yards.

Against Nebraska Saturday he made several good returns of punts, and gained thru the Husker line. One of the humorous sights to be seen at every Iowa State game occurs when some 190-pound tackler downs the Cyclone captain, only to be assisted to his feet by Weiss.

They say that occasionally, when Weiss is the bottom member of a pile of 14 members, he can carry on an interesting conversation. At any rate he handles the team as it has not been handled for some time, and his 134 pounds are equal to about 170 pounds of average player.

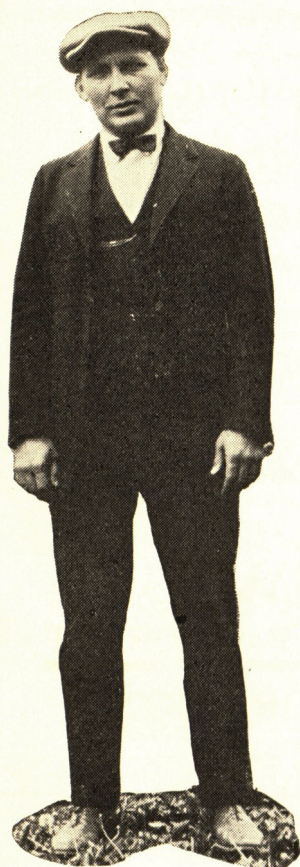

WORKMAN vs. WORKMAN When Family Relations Cease

COACH NOEL "DOPEY" WORKMAN

is starting his second season at the helm of the Iowa State football teams. Last year, altho hampered by geen material and injuries, Coach Workman produced one of his typical fighting teams.

Coach Workman received his football start with the Huntington, W. Va., high school team, playing end and quarterback for three years. In the fall of 1917 he entered Bethany College, making the first team, where he played quarterback the entire season. It was about this time that America entered the argument in Europe, so Coach Workman took it in. Following his discharge in 1919 he matriculated at Ohio State. In his first year in the Buckeye camp he won a numeral as quarter and end. Then in 1920 he played end on the greatest football team that Ohio State has ever boasted. While Noel Workman played end his "kid" brother Harry, now the coach of Simpson, played quarter, and the famous Workman to Workman pass was the talk of football. Again in 1921 Workman was a member of another of Doc Wilce's better teams.

Following graduation he became head coach at Simpson College, where in his three-year stay he turned out three Iowa conference championship football teams. In the three years the Methodists lost but three games, two to Iowa State, non-conference tilts, and one to St. Ambrose.

It is always a privilege to watch a Workman-coached machine play for you never know what trick it will pull next. And they pull plenty of them, as our neighbors at Drake will testify.

COACH HARRY "HOGE" WORKMAN

the pass slinging end of the famous Workman-to-Workman combination of 1920, now head football coach at Simpson. Last year, his first with the Methodists, his team rated second in the conference.

Harry Workman of course claims Huntington, W. Va., as his home town, and it was here that he won his first football laurels as an all-state quarterback in 1919. The next year we find him as a freshman at Ohio State and a numeral winner. In 1921 Harry Workman and our "Dopey" made things unpleasant for everyone in the Big 10 by their super-passing game.

In 1923 Harry Workman was selected as all-American quarterback by a majority of critics. Following his graduation in 1924 he took up the coaching assignment at the University of Redlands, Redlands, Cal. Here he made a good record, piloting a team of mediocre ability against the best in southern California, and winning half of the games. In 1926, "Hoge" Workman succeeded "Dopey" Workman as athletic director and head coach at Simpson College. Last year, his first, his Simpson team was runner-up in the Iowa conference after one of the hottest races staged for several years.

RUBLE

This is Mr. Ruble from Simpson, a 194-pound guard. Ruble is also playing his fourth year for the fighting Methodists, so he ought to be able to give either Kern, Fischer, Ours, Roe, or Schlenker, or all five of them something to think about. If you want to watch him work just keep an eye on 71.



HOGENDORN

Still another Simpsonite that participated in the last game, Hogendorn of Colfax, a right half. Hogendorn is playing his third year of college football and rates high in his conference. Whenever he tucks the ball under his arm and gets his 161 pounds in motion Simpson falls heir to some yardage, and every so often a touchdown. Hogendorn is number 68.



CAPT. MCCOY

If you want to do a little worrying this afternoon just keep the weather eye peeled for Simpson's number 62, a young fellow by the name of "Chick" McCoy. McCoy was a member of the Simpson team of 1925 that absorbed a 28 to 0 defeat, and that game has been a sore spot with him ever since. McCoy has been the Methodist quarterback for four years, and received his first football instruction from our own "Dopey" Workman, which makes him a bad customer to handle. McCoy happens to be the Simpson captain, weighs 167 pounds and is one of the best players in the state.

YOU can't always tell from the Campus

THIS is a plain tale of a regular, every-day American undergraduate—an engineer from the University of Cincinnati, with a college record much like that of thousands of other students.

He got a kick out of playing varsity basketball. He caught on the baseball team. When Cincinnati won at football, he celebrated with the rest. For a year he supervised the student cooperative bookshop. He was president of the Engineering Tribunal, the student governing body. In a word, he did the things well, that college students everywhere like to do.

But of the specialization which he was to undertake at Westinghouse—there wasn't a clue.

The case of W. E. Thau is another example of unforeseen opportunities afforded by such an organization to a man with a healthy aptitude for getting things done.
