Start 63rd Grid Season

The sixty-third football season—that's the greatest significance of the 1953 opener. Just 63 seasons ago a disorganized collection of Ames College students played a Nebraska team and scored a 22-0 win.

There hasn't been a break in that skein of grid seasons since. In World War I the season was cut to three games by the army and the flu epidemic of 1918. In World War II the Navy provided most of the playing talent but the game went on.

So today starts the sixty-third season. In that time the Cyclones have won 246, lost 210 and tied 32. In that time the Ames College squad gained its nickname in the now famous game with Northwestern. For the one or two in the stands who may not have heard the story, here it is:

The summer and early fall of 1895 saw dozens of cyclones hit Iowa and the rest of the middle west. The Ames (and that's a story, too) football team was scheduled by Northwestern as a breather—a prep game for its tougher competition. The Iowans failed to understand their role and blew Northwestern out of the game, 36-0.

In headlining the game in the next issue of the Chicago Tribune the streamer read: "Iowa Cyclones Hits Evanston Town, 36-0". And thus the Cyclones came into being.

Today the Cyclones and their fans are going to get a quick look at what three weeks of practice has meant to the squad. Coach Abe Stuber and his staff started the drills on Aug. 30 and there has been no let up in preparing for the Coyotes of South Dakota.

Nineteen lettermen dot the Cyclone squad and only letter winners will be in the opening lineup. Still it is a team that needs much in the way of experience—especially on the defense. With the throw-back in the rules to what might be called the stone-age of football, most squads are left with a lot of 1-way players. Iowa State this year has only one back who played more than briefly on defense in the past two years—Max Burkett. That means Stuber and Cap Timm have labored long and hard to indoctrinate the secondary.

In the line there are several defensive players but no ends who have had previous college experience when the other team was carrying the ball.

Of the 52 men listed on the 1953 roster 28 are sophomores. That means a lot of eagerness and extra willingness to play but it also means a lot of inexperience. Stuber is mighty pleased with the desire and morale of the 1953 squad but will be a bit more relaxed when the testing period is over.

South Dakota, under Harry Gamage, is readying another small but select band of Coyotes for its North Central campaign. There are 28 men on the South Dakota roster and that ought to be cause for moaning but not on the part of Gamage. The former Illinois star took 23 men not too many years ago and won the North Central so he can figure guality and forget the quantity.

Gamage has developed three loop champions and always comes up with a dangerous team. Key player will be Ordell Braase, touted for Little All-America tackle honors this fall.

Today's game marks the sixth encounter between Cyclone and Coyote teams. Iowa State has won them all, starting in 1899 with an 11-6 triumph. Other results were 23-0 in 1903; 22-0 in 1906; 26-0 in 1908 and 27-0 in 1941.

Next home appearance of the Cyclones will be Oct. 10 when Kansas State will be the guest team for the Faculty Day contest.

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
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Oklahoma - - Again!

It is going to be the same old story all over again if the experts are to be believed. Oklahoma—again! That's the way the news men and radio sportscasters figure the 1953 Big Seven football race.

Bud Wilkinson is doing a masterful job of trying to direct attention toward other teams as more deserving of the role of favorite. He hasn't yet insisted that Kansas State and Iowa State rate above the Sooners but such a story in the next week or two would surprise no one.

True, Oklahoma lost Billy Vessels, Buck McPhail, and Tom Catlin, all all-Americans, and several other all-conference stars. But no team had more depth than the Sooners. The games might be a little closer this year but the final outcome will be another link in the long chain of victories forged by Wilkinson at Oklahoma.

Missouri gets most of the voting for second place. The Tigers were a surprise team last year with a rugged defense and an improved offense. Although some fine players departed, the Tigers are coming up with the finest gang of sophomore talent since the war—and they've never had weak recruiting results in Tiger-town at any time.

Don Faurot, pappy of the Split-T, may be ready to re-teach it to some of the upstarts who have slapped him around with it. At any rate the Tigers shouldn't be any easier this year.

Kansas, Nebraska, and Colorado get a lot of attention for the No. 3 spot. Depending

upon which expert is doing the talking, each has backing for the third place finish.

Kansas denies the ability to get there because of a lack of backfield experience. The line at Kansas will be as tough as that at Oklahoma and the sophomore ball carrying talent was well above par. Jules Sikes has always had a terrific offensive club and the 1953 edition will be no different. The defense will be tough and that will make Kansas dangerous every Saturday.

Nebraska has reverted to the single wing and with John Bordogna and Jim Smith as the big horses will be as dangerous as any team in the loop.

Colorado sent its great teams of 1951 and 1952 through the graduation lines last spring. That ought to drop the Buffs but any team that still has Carroll Hardy can't be dropped. The Buffs will operate the single wing in the right style again, the experts say.

That brings us to the two "State" teams. The Wildcats and Cyclones are again slated to battle for sixth place when they meet in Ames on Oct. 10. The Kansas State team ought to have its greatest year since before 1940. There is depth, speed, power and experience on hand as it has never been there since the pre-war championship team.

Iowa State will field a young, eager team that hopes to make high morale and fine conditioning cover up for inexperience. The Cyclones, themselves, are not counting in trading spots with Kansas State.

Honor High School Bands

Nearly 3,000 musicians from more than 42 high schools will be on hand to entertain Cyclone football fans here today. The bands will be the guests of the department of music and the athletic council.


The occasion is the third annual Band Day, directed by Alvin R. Edgar, head of the music department. The occasion has grown in size from some 20 bands three years ago to the point where the arrival of 50 bands today would not be unexpected.

The parade of bands into the stadium

started less than an hour before game and at intervals of 45 seconds a band marches to its position around the track. Some 250 baton twirlers are also going to "strut" their stuff.

At the half the massed bands, under the direction of Edgar and Band Director Frank Piersol, will play three numbers.

The flag raising ceremonies will be handled by the Iowa State freshman band. The band had two rehearsals before appearing before this opening day crowd.





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
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
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"The Voice" of WOI

But his love of sports and his knack for accurate, precise description of all sporting events, has brought people to think of him only as the sports editor of the stations. Actually he does that part of his job as a labor of "love" while devoting his major time to his farm editor's job.

During the course of a normal year Dale will cover nearly 100 games of football, basketball and baseball. All this in addition to playing a mighty mean game of golf and handling the extensive farm interests covered by Station WOI.

For the second straight year Dale will be the voice of the Cyclone Sports Network blanketing Iowa and surrounding states with his play-by-play of the Iowa State games at home and on the road.


