The feature attraction today is the football game between the University of Colorado and the Iowa State College. I am sure it will be an interesting contest.

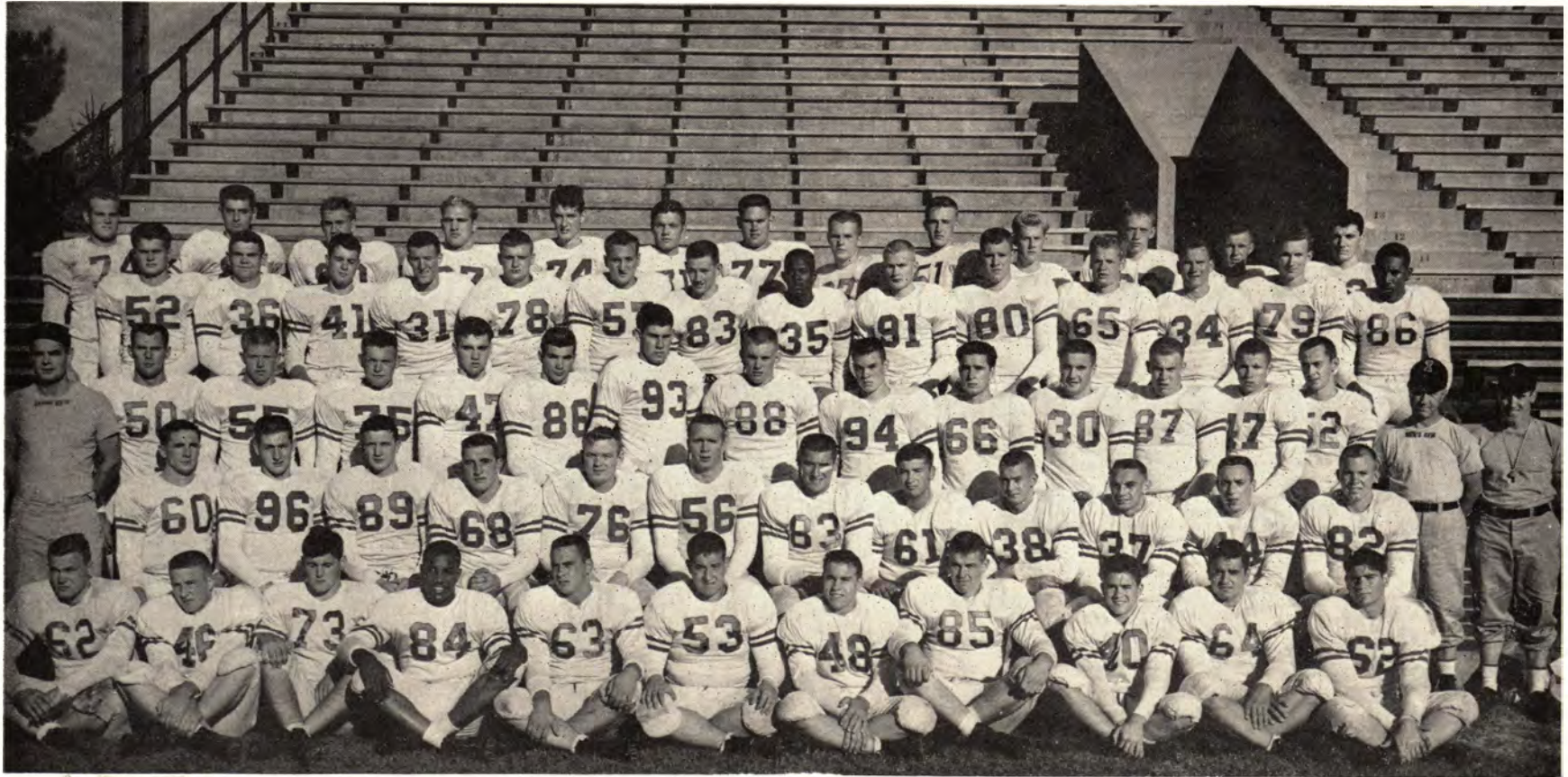
Please feel free to visit any of the college activities in which you may be particularly interested. We do hope you enjoy your visit as much as we enjoy having you with us.

# Bufs Meet Cyclones

It's homecoming time at Iowa State again and for the third time the Colorado team will be taking part in that series.

Today's contest will be the "rubber" in the homecoming part of the series between the two teams. In 1950 the Bufs were Cyclone victims here, 18-7. In 1952 the Bufs reversed the count and scored a 21-12 win.

For this contest it will be speed, power and depth versus spirit. The Golden Bufs have the greatest collection of backs in the history of Colorado football. A young line has more than lived up to some early fearful hopes. As a result Coach Dal Ward has a powerhouse reminiscent of some of the old Minnesota teams he once helped coach.

The big difference, however, between the Bufs and the old Gophers is versatility. Scout Arch Steel rates this club as the most versatile attacking crew he has seen. With backs like Frank Bernardi, Carroll Hardy, Homer Jenkins, Emmerson Wilson, John Bayuk, Homer Scott—Colorado is loaded to the hilt.

Iowa State will attempt to match this great crew of Orange-Bowl Bound gridders with spirit. And don't ever sell that commodity or the Cyclones short. Coach Vince DiFrancesca sends his Cyclones into action for no other reason than to win. The Cyclones have put on four fine displays this fall and have an even break as a result in the quartet of rugged contests. That means they'll be swinging for haymakers every minute of the day despite Colorado's wealth of depth and speed.

Since Homecoming was started here in 1912 the big victory celebrations have not come along as often as Cyclone fans would like. Iowa State lost five in a row before scoring a 10-7 win over Kansas State in

1917 for the first big celebration. In the total series Iowa State has won 13 of the games, lost 24 and tied four.

It is interesting to note that three of those four ties came in a row. From 1934 through 1936 the Cyclones battled 0-0 with Kansas, 6-6 with Missouri and 7-7 with Oklahoma. The other tie was in 1925, a 9-9 affair with Grinnell.

Missouri has been on the Cyclone homecoming list most often and holds a 6-4-1 edge over the Cyclones. Kansas State has appeared five times without winning. Oklahoma has won five, lost one and tied one. Kansas won three, lost one, tied one. Iowa won four times, Nebraska won four and lost one. Grinnell tied in its only appearance and Drake lost in its one Homecoming game at Ames.

With Colorado sniffing orange blossoms the Bufs enter the game favored to retain their share of the Big Seven lead with Missouri. The Tigers play Indiana so have no fear of dropping out of a tie for first. Oklahoma, which meets Kansas, ought to win its first conference effort to tie Missouri and possibly Colorado. Right now Iowa State shares third place with Nebraska and Kansas State. Kansas is last with two losses while Oklahoma has not yet played in the conference.

Iowa State must face the game today with three regulars as spectators. Ralph Brown, tackle; Gary Lutz, left halfback, and Weldon Thalacker, guard, were all hurt in the win over Kansas and are expected to miss at least one game, possibly more.

Improved play from reserves, though, makes the blow a bit softer. Against Kansas Ray Tween, tackle; Wayne Horras, guard, Kim Tidd, halfback, all filled in for injured players in fine style.

There are lots of others but those names pop up right at the moment. So we feel we ought to tell a little about what the foresters have been doing on the campus this week.

As far back as 1874 there was a department of horticulture and forestry on the campus. Interest grew greater each year and finally in 1904 Dr. Hugh P. Baker became the first professionally trained forester and set up the department. Later Charles A. Scott headed the department and by 1912 the department had a separate curriculum. The college was one of the first to provide a summer training camp, getting that feature of its program underway in 1914. G. B. MacDonald guided the department through its greatest period of expansion. Since 1948 George B. Hartman has been the department head. That he is now a member of the athletic council only further shows the great interest of foresters in the sports program at Iowa State.

A series of meetings and dinners have kept the foresters busy this week with one of the main addresses Dr. DeWitt Nelson, director of the California Department of Natural Resources and vice-president of the Society of American Foresters.

Special honors were accorded men like T. R. Truax, chief, division of Wood Preservation, U. S. Forest Products Laboratory; Fritz J. Poch, former Forest Supervisor, San Isabel National Forest in Colorado; I. T. Bode, director of the Missouri Conservation Commission; Fred Boeckh, Minnesota and Ontario Paper Co.; Paul M. Dunn, Dean of Forestry, Oregon State College; Edwin F. Heacox, DeWitt Nelson, George Pecaro, Clarence Prout, and Fred Trenk.

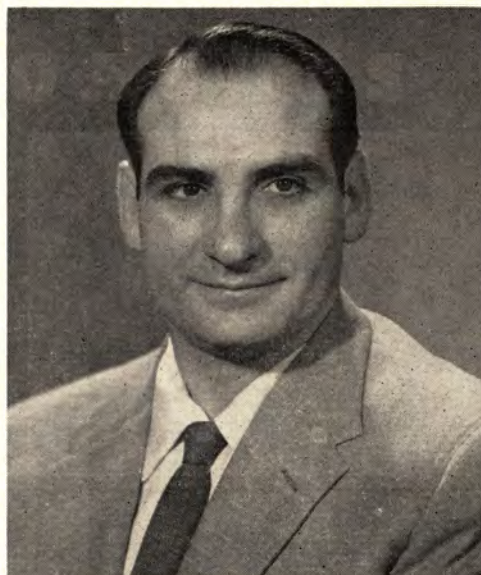
One special feature of the fiftieth celebration was the dedication of a tract of woodland northeast of Ames. Friday morning the tract was dedicated to Prof. Gilmour B. MacDonald, who headed the department at Iowa State from 1914 to 1948. The tract will be used for the outdoor activities of the department and its students. The tract covers seven and a half acres and borders on the east bank of the Skunk River.

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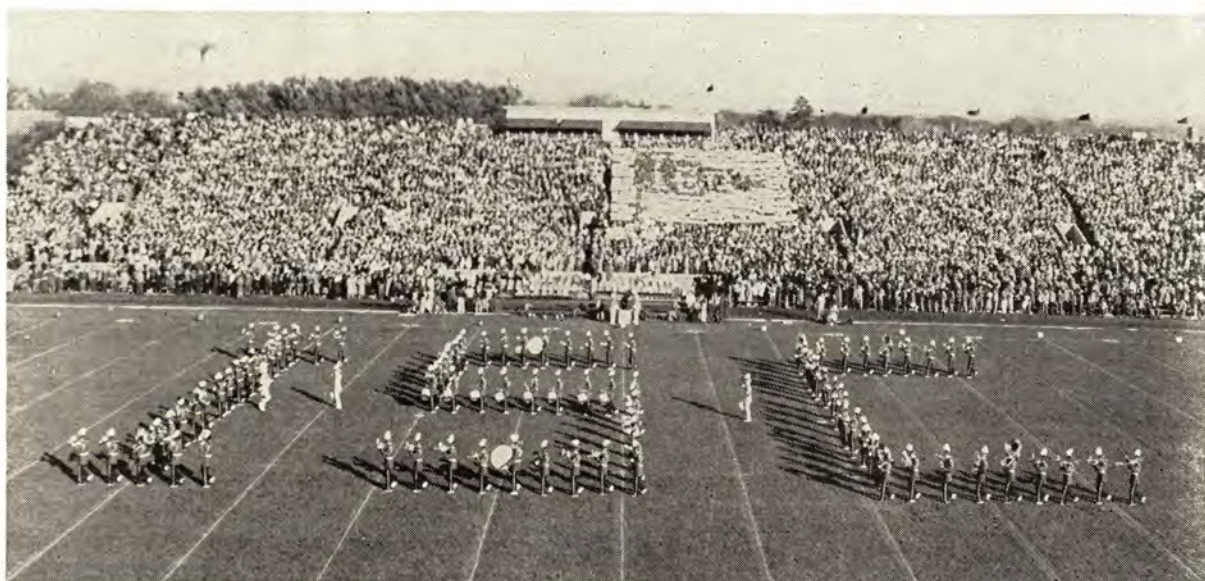
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# Other Parts of the TEAM

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## PENALTIES

### LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

1. Taking more than five times out during either half (except for replacement of injured player).
2. Illegal delay of game.
3. Failure to complete substitution before play starts.
4. Violation of kickoff formation.
5. Player out of bounds when scrimmage begins.
6. Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-play".
7. Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is

snapped. Also, backfield man illegally in motion.

8. Offside by either team or encroachment on neutral zone.
9. Attempt to draw opponents offside.
10. Crawling by runner.
11. Illegal forward pass (includes intentional grounding of forward pass). Also loss of down.
12. Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made.
13. Player on line receiving snap.
14. Any violation of the scrimmage formation.

### LOSS OF FIFTEEN YARDS

15. Team not ready to play at scheduled time.
16. Violation of rules during intermission.
17. Illegal return of suspended player.
18. Interference by member of offensive team with defensive player making pass interception. (Also loss of down.)
19. Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick.
20. Illegal use of hands or arms by offensive player.

21. Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch.
22. Roughing the kicker.
23. Piling up, hurdling, clipping.
24. Tackling player out of bounds, or running into player obviously out of play.
25. Coaching from sidelines.
26. Failure to stop one full second following shift.
27. Defensive holding.
28. Invalid Signal for Fair Catch.

### OTHER PENALTIES

29. Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands, kicking or kneeing — Mandatory disqualification of offending player plus loss of fifteen yards.
30. Foul within the one yard line — half the distance to the goal.
31. Interference by defensive team on forward pass — passing team's ball at spot of foul.
32. Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of

scrimmage — loss of fifteen yards from spot of preceding down and loss of a down.

33. Illegal touching of kicked ball within opponent's ten yard line — touchback.
34. Flagrantly rough play or unsportsmanlike conduct — Mandatory disqualification plus loss of fifteen yards.
35. Eligible pass receiver who goes out of bounds and later touches a forward pass — loss of down.

# ◆ ◆ ◆ ◆ BUFFALO OUTLOOK

A young but improving line and a fleet of experienced and versatile backs combine this year to give Coach Dal Ward his finest offensive machine in seven seasons at Colorado.

The Buffaloes are a thin club, experience-wise. Only nine lettermen, smallest total in the Big Seven, are included in the ranks. Of this slim total, three are linemen who played minor roles in 1953.

But, from a husky crop of sophomores Ward has molded a forward unit which he feels will be a fine one by the end of the year. There'll be times during the front part of the campaign when the green Colorado linemen make mistakes at crucial times. But the battle for starting jobs will be fierce all the way and that situation helps counter-act the disadvantages of inexperience.

Center Don Karnoscak, the team's finest line-backer, and Tackle Sam Salerno are the only line lettermen with starting jobs fairly well under control. They form the nucleus of the front wall along with End Lamar Meyer, a junior who returned to college this fall after duty in the Air Force.

Ward, whose single wing offense is considered one of the hardest to handle in the Big Seven, has backfield personnel which he feels is as fine as a coach could want.

Veteran Halfbacks Carroll Hardy and Frank Bernardi form what the Buff coach calls "the best tailback-wingback combination I've ever seen or hope to see."

Cyclone fans remember Hardy's winning touchdown run in the game at Boulder last fall when the Colorado clipper sped 17 yards with 1:22 remaining in the game. Hardy netted 103 yards that afternoon with Bernardi getting 104, scoring one touchdown on a 46-yard gallop, setting up another with a pass interception and passing 31 yards for a third marker.

The two seniors are the sparkplugs of a backfield crew which includes several other performers

good enough to play dominating roles on many teams.

Behind Hardy is junior Homer Jenkins, a great triple-threatener who was injured much of last season. Jenkins can be used at either tailback or fullback and is ready to step in at quarterback if necessary.

At fullback, Emmerson Wilson, the team's leading ground-gainer last fall, heads the list after recovering from an early-season elbow injury. Wilson is backed by sophomore John "The Beast" Bayuk, a burly 221-pounder who plows a wide furrow through enemy lines.

Sidelined most of the year with a knee injury but considered one of the finest Colorado sophomores in history is Tailback Homer Scott, who is due to return to action sometime in mid-season. Scott is the best passer on the team and a fine runner and punter. Pete Middlemist, a junior, is still another tailback with more than average ability.

Sam Maphis, a converted fullback, has been a pleasant surprise for Ward at quarterback. Maphis blocks with authority and has shown excellent play-calling ability despite the strangeness of the new task. Bill Lamont, a letterman last year, shares the quarterback job with Maphis.

Always partial to bruising ground attacks Ward has his 1954 Buffaloes concentrating the majority of their offense on the land. It's a tremendous operation to defend successfully with Hardy and Bernardi as outside threats and the good fullbacks always ready to run up the middle. And, if enemy defenses close in Hardy, Bernardi and Company are ready to fire the long touchdown pass.

The defense may be spotty at times but the Buffs figure to pack plenty of scoring punch. Consequently some high-scoring games, reminiscent of last year's meeting, can be expected.

"Just forget about that for a moment," Strannigan says. "Right now we are concerned with the 1954-55 varsity. The freshmen will get lots of coaching from here on but we can't use them until 1955-56. Then we'll see. Meantime we have a lot of work before us and when the official starting date arrives all of us are going to buckle down and work our way out of last place."

There will be five lettermen available for the basketball squad but Barney Alleman cannot join the group until Nov. 15. He is at present an end on the football team.

The other lettermen are Chuck Duncan, the highest scoring junior in Iowa State history; Don DeKoster, Larry Wetter, and Stan Frahm. To go with this group Strannigan will have the following holdovers from 1954: Dale Benson, Bill Dale, Arnie Gaarde, Tom LeBuhn and Jake Muehlenthaler.

A good crop of sophomores includes Gary Thompson, Jack Peterson, Chuck Vogt, Jim Sinning and Mark DeRuyter.

Strannigan plans to use a single post offense, concentrate on defense and decide on his exact type of offense after he gets fully acquainted with the personnel. He figures his spring drills gave him only a brief acquaintance with the players.

"I feel now that we can settle down to solve our problems in complete understanding," the new Cyclone coach said. "We'll have a lot of fun with a lot of hard work. We can't expect anyone from the other schools to want to help us so we'll have to count on lots of work on our own."

The veteran Iowa State swimming team will swim in a minimum of 11 meets and if Coach Jack McGuire has his way the schedule might reach a total of 15.

McGuire believes in swimming any team that he can schedule. The tougher the competition the better. It has paid off for the Cyclones and McGuire. The tall red head has won six conference titles and produced some of the greatest swimmers the Big Seven has had. His teams have won 46 and lost 16 with one tie in dual meets.

Last year the Cyclones lost a dual meet to Oklahoma and placed second in the conference to the Sooners. Later both losses were forfeited to Iowa State when Oklahoma discovered it had used an ineligible swimmer.

This year McGuire and his Cyclones want to win on their own power.

"We'll take any kind of a victory," McGuire said after the forfeits were announced last year, "but from now on we'd like to beat the other fellow face to face."

The personnel with which that seventh title will be sought includes Mike LaMair, Bob Best, Bill Thornberg, seniors; Jim McKevitt, Loran Braught, Sandy Stewart, Jim Val-leau, Maurie McCullen, Bob Hollowell, Dale Lucas, juniors, and Pete Janss, John Ryder, Jim DeYoung, John McDonald, Bill Cummings, all sophomores.

LaMair has been conference breast stroke champion for three years and holds the NCAA 100-yard record. He was an NCAA All-American in 1954. McKevitt holds the NCAA 100-yard free style record and the American record in the 220 free style. He holds numerous conference marks and was an NCAA 1954 All-American choice. Braught was also an All-American and shares several conference relay marks. Janss held the high school mark for the 200 free style as a senior.

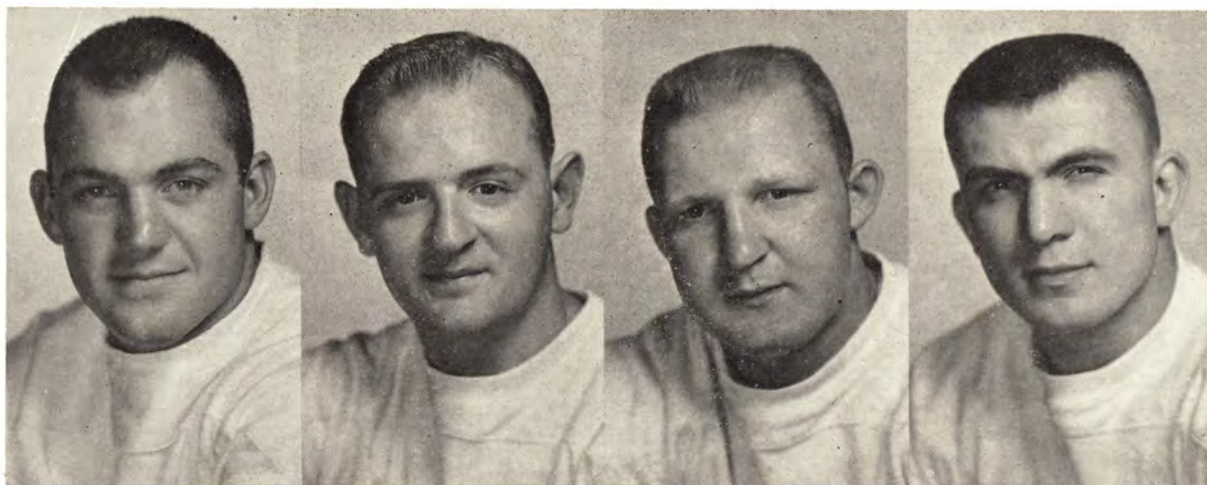
The other performers are up to the high standards expected of McGuire's swimmers. Even the men who did not compete in high school become great swimmers.
