



YOUR OLYMPIC SPORTS ATHLETES NEED AND DESERVE YOUR ATTENTION

This is another "Olympic Games Year." Automatically, increased attention will be focused on the "other" sports. Somehow, the development of "our" teams in these seldom-talked-about sports will creep into sports conversations.

For swimming, track, wrestling, gymnastics, and most other Olympic Games sports, progress checks come but once every four years - - it becomes a patriotic duty then. Of the sports on the Olympic Games' schedule, only basketball, in this country, approaches a local focal level which is deserved.

The same is true everywhere, including the Big Eight Conference. Each year, Conference athletes excel, win national championships and international acclaim in these sports, but . . .

It is not surprising that Big Eight athletes in these "other" sports have long enjoyed a higher standing internationally than they have in their own country, own Conference, and even their own institution.

Your Big Eight athletes in these Olympic Games sports have won 270 national collegiate championships, in addition to numerous other U.S. titles of the National Federation and AAU varieties. Of the 48 national collegiate team titles won by Conference institutions, 45 of them have been won by the Olympic sports teams.

In NCAA competition, no other conference has done so well, either over a long period of time, or for a shorter span. During the past seven years, the Big Eight has scored 15 team championships. During the past two seasons, 27 individual titles have been won by your Big Eight representatives.

Wrestling and track, two of the more popular sports on the Olympic Games' list, have contributed the most team and individual national titles to the Big Eight collection.

Since the first national wrestling meet was held at lowa State in 1928, 145 gold medals and 32 of the 37 team championships have been won by your Big Eight athletes. Internationally, 43 of your Big Eight wrestlers have competed in the Olympic Games since 1928, including eight gold medalists.

Your Conference representation in the Olympic Games has been even more frequent in track, with the Big Eight total now numbering 49 who have competed in 56 events, including three who represented you in three different Olympiads - - Missouri's Jackson Scholz, a sprinter who won two gold medals, Kansas State's Ray Watson, a middle-distance runner, and Kansas' Al Oerter, three-time gold-medal winner in the discus.

Domestically, Big Eight track and field stars have won a total of 90 individual championships. Most prolific of the group was Nebraska's Charlie Greene, who finished with six individual NCAA titles, a mark surpassed only by Jesse Owens. Only Greene, Ralph Metcalfe, and Mel Patton have won three straight NCAA 100-yard dash championships.

It takes talented and highly dedicated coaches to develop these individuals in those "other" sports. Often, your Big Eight coaches have been tapped to lead U.S. teams in international competition, including the Olympic Games - - all still remember the task faced by and the subsequent success of Oklahoma State's Henry Iba in Tokyo with a basketball team thought to be inferior to previous U.S. entries in the Olympic Games.

The record indicates the quality of the overall intercollegiate program existing today in the Big Eight.

Now, it's another Olympic year. What lies ahead for your Big Eight athletes competing in the Olympic sports on the Conference's list - - track and field, basketball, swimming, wrestling, and gymnastics? These athletes face one of the longest years of their careers. There will be continual training for the first of the Olympic trials in the various sports, and then the Olympics themselves for those of exceptional ability.

A starting point will be the meets and matches. Then the Big Eight championships - - cross country teams will have their meet November 11 at the University of Colorado, the swimming meet is March 7-8-9 at the University of Kansas, the gymnastics championships are March 15-16 at the University of Oklahoma, the wrestling tournament is March 8-9 at Colorado, the indoor track championships are March 1-2 in Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium, and the outdoor track and field meet is May 17-18 at the University of Colorado. The building toward the dreamed-of Olympic spot will continue through the various national meets and qualifying trials.

Potential Olympic Games competitors from among those competing for Big Eight teams the past few years and currently are many. Any list would have to be headed by Kansas' Jim Ryun, the world-record holder in the 880, mile, and metric mile, and Greene.

Regarded almost as highly in their respective sports are wrestlers Fred Fozzard and Gene Davis of Oklahoma State, Wayne Wells and David McGuire of Oklahoma, and Dale Bahr of Iowa State. High national rankings in gymnastics are held by Iowa State's Mike Jacki and Jerry Fontana and Colorado's Jack Ryan. Kansas' Jo Jo White was the star of the U.S. Team at the Pan American games.

There are others equally as well endowed athletically. This year, all have a stronger motivation. Not mentioned are those in the Big Eight who have yet to compete at the varsity level, but who will be in the final competition for a spot on some team headed for Mexico City.

No one knows who will succeed. Undoubtedly, there will be another Billy Mills, who thrilled this nation three years ago when he came from nowhere to become the first from the U.S. ever to win the Olympic 10,000 meter run.

Only time will tell who will be representing you from the Big Eight. Those who do, however, will again attest to the Conference's national and international prestige. This 14-month "year" ahead will be long and for most quite without attention. Attend their meets, matches, games and watch their performances. One can be sure that somewhere among those swimmers, gymnasts, wrestlers, basketballers, or runners and weightmen there lurk gold medal winners at Mexico City. They will be competing right near your home.



Intramural Sports Popular at ISU

The popularity of intramural athletics at lowa State University is evidenced by the fact that in the academic year of 1965-66 a total of 4,612 men participated in a planned schedule of sports. This represents 47 percent of the men at the university.

The 1966-67 academic year saw an increase of 400 more men in the programs offered in the intramural slate to bring total participation that year to 5,012 team and individual participants.

With a program of this size, it is important to note that space is becoming a critical matter. While the building program on the west side of the campus furnished a fine gymnasium, Beyer Hall, for use by intramural teams, construction on the east edge of the campus is taking away large areas formerly used for outdoor

sports in season. Sports being affected most are softball and touch football. So, until space is found elsewhere, the number of teams participating in the two sports mentioned may have to be limited.

Addition of water polo this year is expected to bring additional numbers of intramural participants this fall as dormitories enter teams in this sport.

Regardless of limitations, the men of Iowa State University have made intramural athletics really big business not only in numbers but in enthusiastic support of the events offered. Participation in the 1965-66 academic year, the year for which figures are complete, is reflected in the tabulations below:



Angry Tiger, Revived Cyclone Meet

Some of the finest lowa State football efforts of recent have been against the powerful teams from Missouri. It will take another of those super efforts to keep up with the Tigers today.

This will come as no surprise to the Cyclones or their fans, though. Missouri is never anything but boot-tough and today might be even worse. Last Saturday Colorado, surging toward replacing Nebraska as the Big Eight champion, stung the Tigers with a 23-9 loss - the first of the season for Missouri.

A happy Missouri Tiger is troublesome enough but an angry one is a real problem.

But real problems are nothing new for the Cyclones. Just this week Iowa State learned that it has been playing what is ranked as the eleventh toughest football schedule in the nation so far. No other team in the Big Eight has faced as much rugged competition as the Cyclones. So, one more will be nothing new.

Missouri will be making its twelfth home-coming appearance here today and will carry a 7-3-1 edge in the series. It is the first time since the 1953 upset of the Tigers that Missouri has shared homecoming honors with the Cyclones. That day the 13-6 upset brought about such a tremendous celebration that traffic was halted for several hours in attempts to get through Ames.

So far this season the Tigers have whipped Southern Methodist, Northwestern, and Arizona to go with that one loss to Colorado. Iowa State has a pair of victories over New Mexico and Kansas State to balance against losses to South Carolina, Texas Tech and Colorado.

Coach Clay Stapleton's charges exhibited some of the defense that must be ready for Missouri in inflicting a 17-0 loss on Kansas State last week in the annual Parents Day game. Usually that has been the type of defense readied for the titanic struggle with Missouri. The Cyclones now must keep the defense that tough today and find a way of moving the ball against one of the strongest defenses in the nation.

lowa State has a 17-33-4 homecoming record that includes the oddity of three straight tie games in 1934 (0-0, Kansas); 1935 (6-6, Missouri); and 1936 (7-7, Oklahoma). The longest winning streak for lowa State was three in 1926-27-28.

There have been some highly interesting homecoming struggles. Old timers like to recall the excitement generated by such contests as the lowa game in 1916 (16-19); the 1926 game with Drake (13-7); the 1933 win over Missouri (14-7); the 1948 Colorado game (18-7); the 1949 struggle with Kansas State (25-21); the 1953 upset with Missouri (13-6); the wild one with Oklahoma State in 1963 (33-28) and the wild finish at the goal line in the 1965 Oklahoma State game (14-10).

Today should write another great chapter to the games which have drawn alums back to the campus for some 56 years.

Jesse Hall - University of Missouri

The University of Missouri is the oldest state university west of the Mississippi River. It was created in 1839 by the Geyer Act. Formal instruction began on April 14, 1841.

It is the 13th largest American university with a full-time enrollment of nearly 40,000, with 20,910 at the main campus located in Columbia.

In July, 1963, the University system was established by the addition of the University in Kansas City and a new campus in the St. Louis area at Normandy. The Kansas City institution is now the University of Missouri at Kansas City while the campus at Rolla - - previously the Missouri School of Mines and Metallurgy, founded in 1870 - - is now the University of Missouri at Rolla.

The University Library on the Columbia campus is one of the nation's finest. A Nuclear Research Reactor, the most powerful at any American University, was completed at Columbia last year. Missouri's School of Journalism, oldest in the world, is considered one of the best in the nation.

President of the University of Missouri is Dr. John C. Weaver, and the Chancellor at Columbia is Dr. John W. Schwada. Dr. Randall M. Whaley is Chancellor of the University at Kansas City, Dr. James L. Bugg, Jr., is Chancellor at the St. Louis campus, and Dr. Merl Baker is Chancellor at Rolla.

Sixteen different divisions of the University are accomodated on the Columbia campus: the College of Agriculture; College of Arts and Science; College of Education; College of Engineering; School of Business and Public Administration; School of Forestry; School of Home Economics; School of Journalism; School of Library and Informational Sciences; School of Law; School of Medicine; School of Nursing; School of Social and Community Service; School of Veterinary Medicine; University Extension Division; and Graduate School.
