requests for tickets should be directed to Harry G. Burrell, Sports Information Director, State Gymnasium. Iowa State University, Ames, Iowa. Tickets will be mailed if there is time, otherwise they may be picked up at the Ticket Office at the north end of the stadium, just north of the elevator. Writers planning to use direct Western Union wire will make own arrangements with the company. Press box tickets for Western Union operators are issued to the company on the basis of leased wire requests. Additional commercial facilities will be available for writers not desiring direct wire service.

PARKING—Parking permits issued upon YOUR request. Parking in special lot north of the stadium.

ELEVATOR—It will take you direct to the press deck only. It will be in operation from 8 a.m. until the last man leaves the press box after the game. It will be held at the "ready" just before the start of each half for coaches who are running the field phones from the press box. It will be yours exclusively until 1:10. For the next 15 minutes we will also service the Stadium Club deck.

RADIO BOOTHS—There are seven of them, six available to you on a first-come, first-served basis. The exception is that one booth will be reserved for the official station representing the visiting team.

CYCLONE SPORTS NETWORK originated by Station WOI, Ames. Station WOI will provide the broadcast to any station requesting it at no fee charge. Your only cost will be the line charge. For complete details write Frank Snyder, Sports Director, WOI-AM-FM, Ames, Iowa 50010.

DRESSING ROOM LOCATIONS— Iowa State will meet the press at the dressing room at the south end of the east stadium. Visiting team quarters are at the north end of the east stadium.

PHONES—Iowa State furnishes three outside lines in the press box on a first-come, first-served basis.

SPOTTERS—A number of excellent spotters are available. PLEASE let me know early, however. It is risky to wait until you arrive in Ames, although we usually can help you that late in an emergency.

PRESS BOX SERVICES—We will provide programs, speed cards, prior to the game. At the half we will give abbreviated statistics. After the game we will have lineups by depth, complete team and individual statistics. If you want anything not normally provided in this material please let me know. We will also provide play-by-play sheets if you want them.

The press box public address will provide name of ball carrier, tackler, yard line. Statistics will be in a rack in the center of the press deck. Play-by-play will be there and will not be passed out during game. A sideline phone will help you get injury or disqualifying foul information. The call director will handle your radio requests for this infor-

mation. Simply pick up the phone in your booth to talk to him.

TURKEY IS ALMOST READY

We will provide a pre-game lunch for you at the snack bar. The Iowa turkey Federation and the Iowa Dairy Industry-Commission have been providing hot turkey sandwiches and milk at the snack bar at half time. This has been one of the top press box attractions in the country, so don't miss it.

PHOTOGRAPHERS—Side line or press box tickets are issued by Harry Burrell.

GENERAL TICKET INFORMA-TION—Tickets for Iowa State games are \$6. The season ticket price is \$24.

COLORS-Cardinal and Gold.

NICKNAME—Cyclones. In summer and early fall of 1895 Iowa was visited by a great many cyclones. That fall an underdog Iowa State football team whipped Northwestern, 36-0. The head on the story in the Chicago Tribune was "Iowa Cyclone Devastates Evanstontown." From then on it has been Cyclones.

MASCOT—Cy the Cardinal. The 8-foot 6-inch bird combines Cy for Cyclone and Cardinal for one school color.

PRESS-RADIO RECEPTION—will be held each Friday night before home games. Sportswriters, sportscasters, coaches, team and university officials will be there. Site will be the Holiday Inn.


THE BIG EIGHT

Beyond any doubt the best all-around athletic conference in the nation, the Big Eight is made up of eight state universities—Iowa State, Kansas State, Oklahoma State, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, and Oklahoma. Whatever is desired in both athletic and academic excellence can be found in the Big Eight. No conference has more national titles, either individual or team, than the Big Eight.

Originally a part of the Missouri Valley Conference, six of the schools left that group in 1928 to form what was then known as the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. The nickname Big Six was added by the sports writing fraternity. It became the Big Seven in 1948 with the addition of Colorado. The nickname was changed to Big Eight ten years later when old friend Oklahoma State rejoined the original Big Six group. In 1966 the conference officially became the Big Eight.

The Big Eight settles conference titles in football, cross country, basketball, swimming, wrestling, gymnastics, indoor and outdoor track, baseball, golf and tennis. In addition, the conference has a preseason basketball tournament that is the highlight of the Christmas holiday

season in Kansas City, home of the Big Eight office.



W. Robert Parks
President, Iowa State University

Iowa State University is a broad-based university with an orientation around science and technology. In addition to its graduate and undergraduate work in the physical, biological and social sciences, Iowa State maintains strong programs in the liberal arts.

Approximately 100 major fields of study are offered in the colleges of Agriculture, Education, Engineering, Home Economics, Sciences and

Humanities, Veterinary Medicine, and the Graduate College.

The university was chartered by the state legislature in 1858 as the State Agricultural College and Model Farm. When President Lincoln signed the Morrill Act in 1862 to establish the Land-Grant system of higher education, Iowa was the first state to accept its provisions, applying them to the college that would be established in Ames. Today more than 19,500 students from all 50 states and 80 foreign countries study on the 1,000-acre campus.

With a research budget of more than \$30 million a year, Iowa State ranks 20th in research expenditures among the nation's universities. Largest of the research units is the Ames Laboratory of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission. The laboratory's work in the devel-

opment of new metals from the rare earths is an outgrowth of research done at Iowa State during World War II to develop the method for producing pure uranium in quantities needed for the atomic energy pro-

gram.

The university's emphasis on specialized education within a liberal arts context reflects the philosophy of its president, W. Robert Parks, the first social scientist to head the university. In his studies for the B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees at Berea College, the University of Kentucky and the University of Wisconsin, President Parks majored in political science and minored in economics.

He served in a research and administrative capacity with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in Washington, D.C., and was chairman of graduate training in the National Agricultural Extension Center for Advanced Study at the University of Wisconsin.

At Iowa State he was professor of government, dean of instruction and vice president for academic affairs before becoming president in 1965. He is a member of the board of directors of the National Center for Voluntary Action established by President Nixon and is chairman of the Vocational Rehabilitation and Education Advisory Committee for the Veterans Administration.

He's an enthusiastic sports fan, too. He's on hand for nearly every athletic event his schedule will permit. Iowa State had some great moments during the past year with a national championship in wrestling, a second-place finish in the national gymnastics meet, and a berth in baseball's College World Series. No one enjoyed those moments more

than Iowa State's president did.

The regard students hold for President Parks is demonstrated by two actions. The 1969 graduating class, noting that the president's four years in office coincided with their years on the campus, made him an honorary member of the class. In 1970, the Government of the Student Body surprised him at halftime of a basketball game by presenting him the President's Award for his "outstanding contribution to the educational, social and cultural well-being of the students of Iowa State University."

CLAY STAPLETON

Director of Athletics

No more dedicated man has ever devoted his life to athletics than Clay Stapleton. As a student and player at Tennessee, as a coach at Wofford, Wyoming, Oregon State, and Iowa State, and now as director of athletics at Iowa State, his devotion to the field of sports and the improvement of his schools has been uppermost in his mind.

You had to be dedicated and loyal in order to play football for Tennessee, and those two qualities have dominated Staple-



ton's thinking ever since. He played guard for the Vols on both sides of his naval service during World War II. He had been a three-sport star at Fleming, Ky. He tells of a post-season game after one undefeated season there, facing an unbeaten team from Blytheville, Ark. His team lost that one by something like 50-0 and he took a pretty good thumping from a vocal enemy guard. More than 20 years later he hired a new head trainer from New Mexico State and then found out that his one-time opponent was Ray (Brick) Bickerstaff, now the assistant athletic director at Iowa State!

Stapleton majored in both history and physical education but never hesitated about coaching and went right to work for Phil Dickens at Wofford College. He not only coached football but was the head track coach and won three straight conference titles.

Stapleton went to Wyoming as Dickens' assistant, then to Oregon State when Tommy Prothro was called upon to rebuild the football fortunes of that school. The two combined to bring a pair of Rose Bowl trips for the Beavers.

A disciple of hard-nosed football, Stapleton's single wing style gave the Cyclones their most interesting 10 years of football. His 1959 team became storied as the "Dirty Thirty," a nickname hung on them because the whole squad, which numbered just 30, played an opening game on a muddy field. That tough little gang (the team averaged only 179.5) missed by a game of going to the Orange Bowl.

Currently the Cyclone director of athletics is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Committee on Committees.

Selfless loyalty to a school he loves, a driving desire to give Iowa State nothing but the best, these are the characteristics that mark Clay Stapleton as a No. 1 leader for the Cyclone department of intercollegiate athletics.

C. R. (Brick) BICKERSTAFF

Assistant Director of Athletics

A hustling, hard-working man in every endeavor, Ray Bickerstaff has coached, trained, recruited. There had been little he had not done in connection with the field of sports when Clay Stapleton tabbed him as his assistant in 1966. That opened up still another field for the personable native of Tupelo, Miss. As in his other assignments, he has earned the "well-done" accolade.



Bickerstaff earned nine letters in football and track at Blytheville, Ark., high school. After short stints at Mississippi and Sunflower he returned to Arkansas and finished there in 1951 with three letters each in football and track. He was a Marine during World War II.

Bickerstaff earned the M.A. from Texas and the Ph.D. from Burton. He was coach and trainer at Arkansas State, and head trainer at New Mexico State. Stapleton brought him to Iowa State in 1961. A great trainer during a 14-year career in that field, he is now the action man for the director.

JAMES K. (Jim) OVERTURF

(Business Manager)

Jim Overturf has never really been very far away from Iowa State all his life, although he is a graduate of Colorado State College. He was born in Marshalltown, taught in Dumont and Ames, ran the Cyclone concessions before moving up to his present job in 1966.

At Marshalltown he was a letterman golfer and still manages to be an 80 shooter. He earned B.A. and M.A. degrees from Colorado State and also did graduate work



at Northern Iowa and Minnesota. He taught one semester at Dumont, then came to Ames high in 1958, where he taught distributive education and served as athletic treasurer. He was president of the Iowa Distributive Education Teachers Association; vice-president of the national association of the same body, and vice-president of the Iowa Vocational Association.

HARRY G. BURRELL

(Sports Information Director)

Earned both B.A. and M.A. degrees from Iowa (journalism) to move into the SID field. Started at Northern Iowa, where he formed the first news bureau for the North Central Conference. Came to lowa State in 1941. Naval gunnery officer in World War II. President of College Sports Information Directors of America, Member of the U.S. Olympic publicity committee; committee for Advancement of Intercollegiate Football; screening committee for Foot-




ball Foundation Hall of Fame: COSIDA Hall of Fame; board of directors of Football Writers of America: board of directors of Basketball Writers of America. Also world's lousiest golfer, vet once served as president of the Iowa Golf Association!

MAURICE W. (Maury) SOULTS

Faculty Representative

Maury Soults is a member of an honored group of men known as "faculty representatives." These men have to be the most unselfish people connected with sports, since each must be a full-time member of the university staff and not connected with the athletic department in any way. They represent their presidents in formulating the rules and regulations under which the conference operates.

All of this means that much of their



Soults was a three-sport star at Clarion, Iowa, high school and a track letterman at Iowa State, where he captained the team as a senior in 1930. He has been a member of the Iowa State staff in many capacities since that time, and is now assistant director of the Extension Service of the College of Agriculture.



JOHNNY MAJORS

(Head Football Coach)

Once labeled "like another coach on the field" when he played for Tennessee, Johnny Majors is bringing that same intelligence and leadership to the job of giving Iowa State excellent football teams.

A great player as an All-America choice at tailback in 1956, Majors did everything at Tennessee-as a single wing tailback had to do. He ran and passed for more than a thousand vards his last two years of competition, was the nation's third-ranked



punter as a senior, averaging better than 43 yards a kick.

He cocaptained the 1956 team that was 10-0 for its regular season. He was voted back of the year by the United Press in 1956 and was runnerup in the Heisman Trophy voting. He was All-Southwest conference in 1955 and 1956 and named the most valuable player in the league both years. He earned 3 football, 2 track letters at Tennessee.

As a high school star he played three years for his father at Huntland, Tenn. He led Tennessee preps in scoring all three seasons, during which time the team won 30 of 31 games. His dad is now the coach at the University of the South.

The coaching career started right at Tennessee, where he worked as a freshman coach for two years before going to Mississippi State. He coached the defensive secondary there. At Arkansas he coached the defensive secondary for three years and the offensive backs one year.

His football teams have shown signs of his own daring and imagination during his first two seasons. Majors feels that this 1970 team will start showing the results of increasingly more successful recruiting and familiarity with the Majors style of coaching.

Interestingly enough, for a man raised in the traditional conservatism of Tennessee football, Majors is a great gambler. There is no way of telling what one of his teams will do in the tight spot, except that it will be both daring and exciting-that's the Johnny Majors style of football.

JOE AVEZZANO

(Offensive Line)

Joe Avezzano is another gridder who stands as an example of brains and brawn combined exceedingly well. A high school honor society member and president of the student body, he still found time to earn 12 letters in football, basketball and baseball at Miami Jackson high. He was all-city in all sports, and all-state in baseball. He later earned all-state honors in football at Florida State as a guard and center. He played for Boston and Pittsburgh in both



pro leagues before heading to Massillon, Ohio, as line coach in 1967. He was a graduate assistant at Florida State in 1968, in charge of offense for the freshmen and working as the offensive line coach. Avezzano got his B.A. degree from Florida State in 1965 in criminology, and has continued that same major in his graduate studies. He had graduate work at Akron as well as at Florida State.

KING BLOCK

(Offensive Backs)

One of the finest prep gridders in Idaho history, Block earned 11 letters in football, basketball, baseball and track. At the University of Idaho his fullbacking earned him three letters. He later was awarded his M.A. in education from Idaho (1954).

His coaching career started at Grangeville high and included duty at Idaho, Arkansas State (both as assistant and head coach), Nebraska, and Washington State before he joined forces with Johnny Majors at Iowa State.



Block actually has one other sport, too—he still takes part in some rodeo work. The Blocks live on a "ranch" outside of Ames so King can have some of his horses around him.

JIM DYAR

(Defensive Line Coach)

In Dyar's resume when he joined the Iowa State staff as a graduate assistant, he made this statement: "I also recruited for Houston and was fairly successful in my first year." Johnny Majors will make a change of two words in that for him now—substitute Iowa State for Houston and VERY for fairly and add "amen!" Dyar is the man Majors assigned to recruit Jerry Moses, the most sought-after player in Iowa prep history, an assignment he carried to success late in May.



Dyar was a three-year starter for his native Enterprise, Ala., high school team and a member of the best defensive team at the University of Houston. He played for the Atlanta Falcons taxi squad at Huntsville, Ala., one year and was named the most valuable offensive player in that league. He had one year as graduate assistant at both Houston and Iowa State before joining the varsity staff last winter.

RAY GREENE

(Scout Squad Coach)

Ray Greene heads the scouting department for Johnny Majors and directs the play of the Cyclones who emulate the upcoming enemy each week. Greene brings a most varied background to his work at Iowa State, a background that includes outstanding college work in debate, speech, drama, and radio as well as sports. With majors in speech and physical education he still found time to earn the outstanding sophomore football award, all-Ohio, all-con-



ference football honors and serve as defensive captain at the University of Akron. He taught and coached following his 1962 graduation at Kenmore high, Akron; Dan McCarty high, Fort Pierce, Fla., and served as recreation supervisor in Akron for five years. Has his M.A. degree from the University of Miami. Coached football, tennis and track in high school in addition to serving on staff at Akron and Miami. Was a football, basketball and track letterman at Akron south high school.

GEORGE HAFFNER

(Quarterbacks)

George Haffner has a busy fall coming up, since he handles the Cyclone quarterbacks. With only one experienced signal caller to work with, he will have little time to relax. Relaxing, however, has never been a part of Haffner's makeup. He played football, basketball, and baseball at Chicago's Mt. Carmell high. He followed that by earning a pair of letters as a Notre Dame quarterback; then went into the service and played football and basketball for Fort Hood.



He played his final year of college ball at McNeese State in Louisiana, where he earned his degree. He was a member of the Baltimore Colts taxi squad in 1965 and activated for the final game when both Unitas and Cuozo were injured. Played in the Continental league in 1966 until injured. Graduate assistant at McNeese, and then assistant at Lake Charles, La., high two years before coming to Iowa State.

KEITH KEPHART

Graduate Assistant

Kephart will head the group of student coaches who will work with the Iowa State varsity staff during the 1970 season. He has been working with Majors and his fellow coaches since the former Tennessee star came to Iowa State. Teaming with Jim Dyar, Kephart has been one of the most tireless recruiters for the Cyclones.

He graduated from West Branch community high school in 1962 after an outstanding career that included a total of



14 letters. He earned three letters each in football and basketball, four each in track and baseball and was one of the state's outstanding hurdlers as a senior.

He competed in both football and track at the University of Dubuque, graduating in 1966. He earned four letters in football and a pair in track. He coached football and track at Crystal Lake, Ill., for a year after graduation then joined forces with Iowa State while working on his advanced degree.

JOE MADDEN

(Defensive Secondary)

Joe Madden was not only a friend of Johnny Majors when the two were on the Mississippi State staff, he was an exceedingly smart director of defensive secondary play. Majors had not forgotten that when he called Madden from Wake Forest to join him at Iowa State. It was another good Majors move.

Joe was a nine-letter football, boxing, and baseball graduate of St. John's high school in Washington, D.C. He went to Mary-




land on a boxing scholarship. His coaching career (following his 1957 graduation) included Gonzaga high, Washington, D.C.; Father Lopez high, Daytona Beach, Fla.; Mississippi State; Morehead State; and Wake Forest. He was awarded his M.A. in education administration at Mississippi State in 1963.

JACKIE SHERRILL

(Defensive Coach)

One of the best all-around athletes ever to play at Biloxi, Miss., Jackie Sherrill was a do-everything guy. He played fullback and linebacker in football, center and forward in basketball and was both a sprinter and a weight man in track. He was All-American in football.

He captained the 1966 Alabama team that won the national title and beat Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. He played fullback, linebacker and tight end for the Crimson Tide.



In 1966 he coached the Alabama frosh defense, and assisted with the varsity linebackers. The next year he went to Arkansas as freshman defense coach and to work with the varsity defensive secondary.

A smart, determined young man, Sherrill brings an intensity to his coaching that demands only top performances from his players. Works primarily with the defensive ends and linebackers.

GORDON SMITH

(Offensive Coach)

Iowa State fans have good reason to remember rugged Gordon Smith. He played tight end for the Missouri Tigers in the early 1960's so the Cyclone fans know he ought to be able to direct the receivers exceptionally well. He heads the offense now for Johnny Majors and turns his individual attention to the receivers.

A native of Phoenix, Ariz., Smith was a freshman at Arizona State the last year Dan Devine coached there. He followed



Devine to Missouri and played on the 1960 and 1961 Orange Bowl teams. Smith played tight end for the Minnesota Vikings for five years. In the spring of 1963 he served as a graduate assistant at Missouri and took up coaching as a career in 1968 at Arkansas. He coached the ends and receivers and also worked with the offensive line at Arkansas. He followed Majors to Iowa State in 1968. Coached the 1969 College All-Star receivers.

ARCH STEEL

(Academic Counselor)

Arch Steel, most veteran of the Cyclone football staff will be starting his seventeenth season when opening day comes around in September. During that time he has aided four head coaches—Vince DiFrancesca, Jim Myers, Clay Stapleton, and now Johnny Majors.

Born in Scotland, Arch came to River Rouge, Mich., as a youngster and was a football and basketball star there. He was a three-sport regular in football, basketball



and baseball at Bowling Green University, graduating in 1940. He was awarded the M.A. degree in administration from the University of Michigan in 1947. Started his coaching career at Lincoln Park, Mich. Served five years in the Navy's Gene Tunney physical fitness program, then returned to Lincoln Park. Was backfield coach at Eastern Michigan; and head football coach and athletic director at Corcoran, Cal., high school before coming to Iowa State in 1954. He was the Michigan high school coach of the year in 1948. Works with Cyclone backs.

FRANK RANDALL

(Head Trainer)

Frank Randall has twice followed Ray Bickerstaff into head trainer posts. Frank was an outstanding senior trainer when Brick left New Mexico State for Iowa State and was named to succeed his mentor. Now he follows Brick once more.

Randall was a football and baseball letterman at Carlsbad, N.M., high and then earned four baseball letters and served as baseball captain at New Mexico State. He has both B.A. and M.A. degrees from New



Mexico State. Also attended both Eastern and Western New Mexico universities. Head trainer at New Mexico State, New Mexico Military Institute, and University of Idaho. Had Army artillery stint in 1953-55 before attending college.

ATHLETIC COUNCIL

Control of the conduct of the Iowa State intercollegiate athletic program is vested in the Athletic Council, a board to be made up of faculty (9), alumni (4) and student (3) members.

The makeup of the council includes the following men:

WHAT ABOUT 1970?

Well, there is this about 1970 as far as the Cyclones are concerned: it is going to be a most interesting and exciting year, one in which Coach Johnny Majors will blend mature experience with enthusiastic youth.

In his first season as the head man at Iowa State, the Cyclones had that enthusiastic exuberance and created a lot of excitement and turned in some mighty interesting football. Last year those same young men underwent some growing pains but still caused lots of excitement for their fans.

Now the young men who got knocked around for a couple of years while learning the game under the former Tennessee All-America star, would like to do a bit of teaching themselves.

"We will have more experience, more depth, and more size than we have had since coming to Iowa State," is one way Majors will point up the 1970 season. "We started as many as 16 sophomores most games in 1968. This fall 12 of those men will be starters again. A couple more are now backup men and could be right back in as starters if their competition falters."

Despite having 28 lettermen on hand, Majors will still have several newcomers in the lineups—although among those "newcomers" will be some lettermen. When the word newcomers is used it might as well mean newcomers to the starting group. For instance, Ray Harm is a letterman who got a few starts last year as a tackle but now is

ready to start at guard. Steve Jacobsen played a lot at three defensive spots last year but looks like the right linebacker this year. In midsummer it would appear that six lettermen will start on offense, 10 on defense.

Actually there are really eight offensive lettermen starting, but two of them will be on defense. Obert Tisdale, the 1969 quarterback, has moved over to the monster spot on defense. Jeff Allen, a wing back for two years, is now the leader as the defensive right halfback. He will continue to be the top kickoff return man for the Cyclones. Both men made the shifts in spring drills and have greatly strengthened the defense for the Cyclones.

The only non-lettered defensive starter, as of midsummer, is scheduled to be Harold Bassett, 217pound Ellsworth junior college transfer. He gives indications of being a big asset to the Cyclones at the right tackle spot.

Tackle seems to be the target of the newcomers. Joe Marconi and Geary Murdock, on the basis of spring drills, moved out a pair of two-year veterans on offense. Neither Tom Barnes nor Tim Jeffries are out of the running, but both must play the best they have in three years to get back in front of the two sophomores.

Dave Pittman, a sophomore pivot from Struthers, Ohio, moved very quietly into the No. 1 spot on the frosh team last fall. He moved just as smoothly on the varsity staff to take command at a spot that had no lettermen returning.

George Amundson, the soph-

omore weight man from Aberdeen, S.D.; Dean Carlson, a hard-throwing transfer from Rochester junior college; and Mike Fontanini, the back-up man for Tisdale last fall, are the leaders in that order for the quarterback spot. Amundson has the edge with good running ability, good leadership, and good throwing.

Dave McCurry, a state high school hurdle champion, is the leader at the flanker spot. He has good speed, good hands, and can maneuver after getting the ball.

The man who will be the target both of the Cyclone passers and the enemy defense, though, will be Otto Stowe. The brilliant senior from Springfield, Ill., needs just 24 catches this year to become the record holder with 97 Iowa State catches. Majors rates him the equal of any receiver in the country. If the Cyclone passers come through, Stowe could be in the running for national catching honors, despite the fact that he will be double and triple-teamed all season.

Tom Lorenz and McCurry will join with Stowe on the starting unit as the receiving gang—a good one for any team.

Majors felt that the pass blocking was greatly improved in the spring and that the offensive line worked the best it had in three years. If his judgment is correct, then the Cyclones will have a better running attack, too. Mike Palmer and Jock Johnson will take care of running back duties with help from Dennis McDonald, Willie Harris, Brian Cannon, and, hopefully, Bob Dwyer. Dwyer was an outstanding frosh two years ago who missed last

year with an Achilles tendon injury. If Dwyer is ready to play this fall—and he says he is—then the Cyclones will have another good running back.

Ray Harm and either Jerry Berna or Bob Belluz will fill the guard spots for the first line unit.

The defensive veterans will be Chuck Wilkinson and Andy Waller, ends; John Griglione, tackle; cocaptain Mark Withrow, Keith Schroeder, and Steve Jacobsen, linbackers; Ralph Baracz and Allen, halfbacks; Tisdale at monster; and cocaptain Tony Washington, safety.

The defense has a lot of new faces, even though it is mostly a veteran group. Majors was pleased with the progress made by the defense, since Mike Kirar, Steve Powers, Jerry Fiat, Tom Elliott, and Larry Holton are missing from the 1969 unit.

The kicking game is still the big question mark. Lack of consistency on all phases of kicking in the spring caused Majors plenty of worry. In his final workout Baracz gave his best exhibition of the drills and may be the punting answer. Reggie Shoemake, a transfer from Jones junior college in Mississippi could wind up doing all the kicking, but the staff has not yet seen him in action.

So, it comes down again to sending an ambitious, eager bunch of Cyclones into action against the best teams in the best conference in the nation. Iowa State will cause waves in every game. Some of those waves are going to upset the hopes of some mighty good teams. The only real promise Majors can make

is this—the 1970 Cyclone team will be competitive, it will be aggressive, and it will be interesting.

That is pretty well what the game of football is about, isn't it?




