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

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



Last winter when it was rumored about the campus that there was to be considerable change in the coaching staff for the coming year, many thought that all was over for Iowa State athletics. Suffice it to say there are none of that opinion now. Ames fans and Ames students are enthusiastic about the coming year and feel without exception that the shake-up left us stronger than ever before. We now have confidence in our coaches and in the teams that they will put out for Iowa State College.



T. N. METCALF Director of Athletics

"Nelly" Metcalf attended school at Oberlin, in Ohio, completing his work for a degree in 1912. While enrolled there he won three letters in track and two in football. He played both tackle and end on the football team. His name was a byword in Ohio track since he held the state record of 4:25 in the mile and the Big Ten record of 9:42 in the two-mile. It is not often that the combination of a good lineman and long distance man is met. Incidentally, Coach Willaman and Director Metcalf attended rival institutions at about the same time.

In the fall of 1912 Metcalf returned to Oberlin as assistant football coach and head track coach. The following year the extra duty of head football coach fell to his lot. That he managed well his job may be inferred from the fact that he won the state championship his first year.

1914 saw him at the University of Columbia studying for an advanced degree in physical education. He became head football coach there in 1915 and was again undefeated in the season. He coached both football and track in '16 and '17.

In 1918 Oberlin called "Nelly" Metcalf back as acting director and track coach. From 1919 to 1921 he coached both football and track, passing thru undefeated seasons in football in '19 and '21.


Minnesota induced him to come there in 1922 and '23, where he coached varsity track and was connected with frosh football.

As a summary we see that Director Metcalf has been an outstanding athlete, has gained recognition in 12 years of coaching in both football and track and has acted in the capacity of a director before.

Director Metcalf presents a clean-cut figure. In manner and speech he is decisive but courteous. His work is for the forward progress of Ames Athletics, and we hope that everyone is behind him.

AL HOLMAN

The name of Al Holman may sound unfamiliar to followers of the Cyclones, but he is a young man that Iowa State coaches are making known in valley football. Holman is at his best on off-tackle smashes, and along with Lindbloom has carried the bulk of the Cyclone offense. Holman is also used to throwing passes. He is a sophomore and is from Fairfield.



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NOEL WORKMAN

Iowa State College is extr mely fortunate in obtaining the services of Noel Workman, former Ohio State football star and head coach at Simpson College for the past three years, to guide her in her football achievements. Workman's official title is associate professor of physical education and head football coach.

Coach Workman began his football career with the Huntington, W. Va., high school team, playing end and quarterback for three years. In the fall of 1917 he entered Bethany College and made the varsity, playing quarterback the entire season. He then left college and entered the service, and when he was discharged entered Ohio State in the fall of 1919. In his first year at Ohio he made his numeral on the freshman football team playing as quarter and end. In 1920 he played end on one of the best teams that Ohio has ever boasted, and in 1921 played quarter on the great Wilce machine of that year. In two years that Workman played at Ohio he was ranked as one of the greatest quarters and ends in the history of the Big Ten.

During the three years as coach at Simpson Workman became recognized as one of the outstanding coaches in the state, his teams lost but three games in that entire time, two to Iowa State, and the other a conference game to St.

Ambrose.

Workman makes the second Ohio State football player to be at the helm of the Cyclone grid team. With the good football material left from last year and the eligible stars coming in from last year's freshman we are looking forward to a successful season for Iowa State College.





Iowa State left end, whose educated toe has been responsible for much of the Cyclones' success this year in keeping the ball deep in the enemy territory. The work of Captain Coe, especially in the Oklahoma Aggie game, marks him as one of the greatest punters produced at Iowa State.

In the game with the Oilers Coe outpunted Perry, their star punter, over eight yards on every kick made. The week before Perry outpunted Friedman of Michigan by a like yardage. This year is the Cyclone wingman's last for the Cardinal and Gold. Captain Coe's home is in Ames, and he is a senior in veterinary medicine.

Bud is a wingman with an affectionate disposition. He is constantly hugging some opponent and it is usually the ball carrier. Bud is particular whom he hugs.

WALT WEISS, Quarterback

He weighs only 134 pounds, but he can worry the opposing team. Walt Weiss of Denison, Johnnie Behm's understudy last year, has the reputation of being the smallest varsity regular in the valley, but as a quarterback and field general the Denison midget is in a class by himself. Weiss won the Washington game for the Cyclones by lugging the ball thru the center of the line 22 yards for a touchdown.



HARRY TOOM, Center

Another man new to followers of the Cardinal and Gold, Harry Toom of Knoxville, a reformed guard from the Simpson team of two years ago, who is now alternated at center with Ayres. Toom is a senior in electrical engineering.



HOLLIDAY SMITH, Right Tackle

Measuring six feet three inches in height, and tipping the scales at 210 pounds, Holliday Smith, new Cyclone right tackle, is giving promise of being one of the brightest lights that has shone on the Ames line in years. Smith has had one year's experience at Michigan State. In his first game as a Cyclone, altho hampered most of the time that Saturday with a broken hand, the giant tackle smeared Grinnell plays for repeated losses, and ripped holes in the Pioneer line large enough to let a truck thru.



JOHNNIE MILLER, Halfback

Another sophomore back that knows how to pick holes in the opposing line and use them to good advantage. Johnnie Miller is a product of Waterloo, and a great halfback. Miller, along with Holman and Bob Fisher, are used as regulars in practically every game at left half. The Waterloo flash is taking general engineering.

ELMER KINGERY, Left Tackle
Knoxville contributed this 190pound specimen to the Cyclones,
and this year Elmer Kingery
stands a good chance at the mythical all-valley team as a left
tackle. Kingery's work at breaking thru to smear plays before

the highlights of the Ames defense in the first five games.
The big Cyclone tackle is playing
his second year for Iowa State.
Kingery is a senior in the division
of industrial science.



OLE ANDERSON Left Guard

In 1922 Ole Anderson made his debut to Cyclone football fans, but he is back again at left guard, where he is playing a great game. Anderson is next to the largest man on the team, weighing in at 205 pounds. Big Ole is a Nebraskan, hailing from Osceola.



NORMAN THOMAS, Right Guard
Another veteran from last year's
team, Norman Thomas of Garden
Grove, right guard, whose work
has been outstanding on both the
offense and defense. "Tommy,"
besides performing the usual duties of a crack guard, does the Cyclone place kicking. Thomas is
unusually fast and this year's
work ranks as the best of his
football career. Thomas will be
lost to the Cyclones next year as
he is also a senior in industrial
science.



BOB FISHER, Left Half

A much needed addition to this year's young Iowa State team is Bob Fisher, two letter man, who was declared eligible three weeks ago. Fisher, besides two letters in football, also sports three stripes and a star in baseball, and a letter in basketball, proving that he is an all-round athlete. Fisher plays left half along with Al Holman and Miller, and as a pass snagger is worth watching. Fisher's home is in Titonka.



Besides smashing the line for consistent yardage "Chink" Hall is also a passer of more than usual accuracy. Hall is playing his second year at right half for the Cyclones. The "Chink" began his football career with the Manual Arts high school of Los Angeles, but calls Cedar Rapids his home.


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THE CYCLONE SQUAD OF 1926





The history of Iowa State College dates to an appropriation of \$10,000 by the State Legislature in 1858 and the Land Grant College Act passed by Congress in 1862. Courses in both Agriculture and in Engineering were offered from the first. The first students were admitted in 1869. The period from that date to 1900 was one of expansion. In 1898 the name of the school was officially changed to Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts. At this time James Wilson, later Secretary of Agriculture under President McKinley, was head of the Department of Agriculture.

In 1871 the College of Engineering was divided into the departments of Civil and Mechanical engineering. Electrical engineering was added in 1891, Mining in 1894, Ceramic in 1906, and Architectural in 1914. The division of Industrial Science, embracing the sciences such as chemistry, biology, botany, geology, mathematics, and economics, was organized in 1898.

The school has been co-educational from the first. The majority of the women are housed in dormitories or sorority houses and plans are under way for men's dormitories next year.

The enrollment reached the 1,000 mark in 1898. It increased rapidly up to the World War and since that time has nearly doubled. Last year there were over 5,000 students registered.

The name of Cyclones was first heard describing our football team in 1895 when after defeating Northwestern University 36-0 a Chicago paper printed the head line, "Cyclone Strikes Northwestern University."

AMES-DRAKE FOOTBALL HISTORY

- 1898 AMES, 17; DRAKE, 16 Ames' first game with Drake yielded the score as the only data. This was at a time when there was considerable opposition to athletics in universities.
- NOV. 10, 1900 DRAKE, 16; AMES, 0 Drake evened up the record and handed Ames an imposing goose egg.
- NOV. 16, 1901 DRAKE, 12; AMES, 5 We bumped heads with the heavy men of Drake. A battle was evident.
- NOV. 16, 1902 AMES, 0; DRAKE, 0 The field was fine for ducks. Neither team could show its speed or ability and the game resulted in a punting duel, with honors even. This was the only tie game.
- NOV. 26, 1903 AMES, 16; DRAKE, 0 Ames reversed the score of her last defeat. The percentage column was even.
- NOV. 24, 1904 AMES, 19; DRAKE, 0 Ames' strength began to manifest itself on the football field.
- NOV. 30, 1905 AMES, 17; DRAKE, 12 By defeating Drake, Iowa State secured second place in the state championship race.
- NOV. 29, 1906 AMES, 7; DRAKE, 0 This was Ames' fourth straight victory over Drake and carried a state championship with it.
- NOV. 28, 1907 AMES, 13; DRAKE, 8 With another state championship on our belts, we took the Bulldogs into camp, but not without a struggle.
- NOV. 26, 1908 AMES, 12; DRAKE, 6 Drake was not beaten until Ames put forth her best efforts.
- NOV. 25, 1909 AMES, 0; DRAKE, 11 The journey to Des Moines had become traditional, but this game added to Drake percentage.
- NOV. 24, 1910 AMES, 2; DRAKE, 0 The whole team played a great game, but we were forced to be content with a safety.
- NOV. 25, 1911 AMES, 6; DRAKE, 0 The only score came in the first minute and a half of play on a recovered fumble and an end run. Ames won the state championship and tied Nebraska for the Missouri Valley.

- NOV. 23, 1912 AMES, 23; DRAKE, 3 A 65-yard run through the entire Drake team by Captain Hurst added to the glory of the day. Missouri Valley champs.
- NOV. 22, 1913 AMES, 26; DRAKE, 3 Iowa State had again started on a long string of victories.
- NOV. 21, 1914 AMES, 52; DRAKE, 0 Playing for second place in the state and Valley races, the Cyclones swept over Drake in the greatest landslide victory in the annals of the two schools.
- NOV. 25, 1915 AMES, 28; DRAKE, 14

 By their defeat of Drake, the Cyclones clinched the state championship. The first half ended 7-7 and Drake led at the end of the third quarter.
- NOV. 30, 1916 AMES, 33; DRAKE, 14 The Bulldogs were outclassed throughout the game.
- NOV. 29, 1917 AMES, 47; DRAKE, 0 The Bulldogs didn't have anything to be thankful for after this game. Another landslide.
- NOV., 1918
- Old man Elements won this game. Anyway, it was a beautiful snow.
- NOV. 25, 1919 AMES, 14; DRAKE, 0 The Cyclones decisively trounced the Ducklings on a snow-covered field. Drake scalps were becoming plentiful.
- NOV. 5, 1921 AMES, 7; DRAKE, 0 This was a hard battle and Drake's tenth consecutive defeat.
- NOV. 4, 1922 DRAKE, 14; AMES, 7 Drake broke the jinx and doubled the score.
- NOV. 3, 1923 DRAKE, 21; AMES, 0 Our worst beating at the hands of Drake.
- 1924 AMES, 10; DRAKE, 0 The game was played on State Field.
- AMES, 7; DRAKE, 6




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CROSS COUNTRY BETWEEN IOWA STATE AND DRAKE RUN WILL START BETWEEN HALVES



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

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The history of Iowa State's present system of seating that is able to handle a 15,000 crowd satisfactorily dates back to 1913 when the present west bleachers were built. Before this time Homecoming crowds were taken care of by temporary wooden bleachers, a seating system that was extremely unsatisfactory. Partly thru subscription and partly thru notes signed by faculty members the west bleachers were built thirteen years ago to seat 5,600 people. For homecoming crowds and major games temporary bleachers were erected along the east end of the track.

The present east bleachers were completed last year in time to handle the home-coming crowd. They were financed by the issuance of a \$75,000 bond, and by the sale of seat preference options that allowed the purchaser a preference on seats for a period of ten years.

The next step in the program of the athletic department will be to build the west bleachers to the ground in front, adding eight rows of choice seats near the field, and increasing the seating capacity 1,600. After this the curve at the south end completing the bowl will be made. Towers at the north end of what is now the east and west bleachers will also be made at this time. When the Iowa State stadium is completed it will have a seating capacity of 35,000.

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
