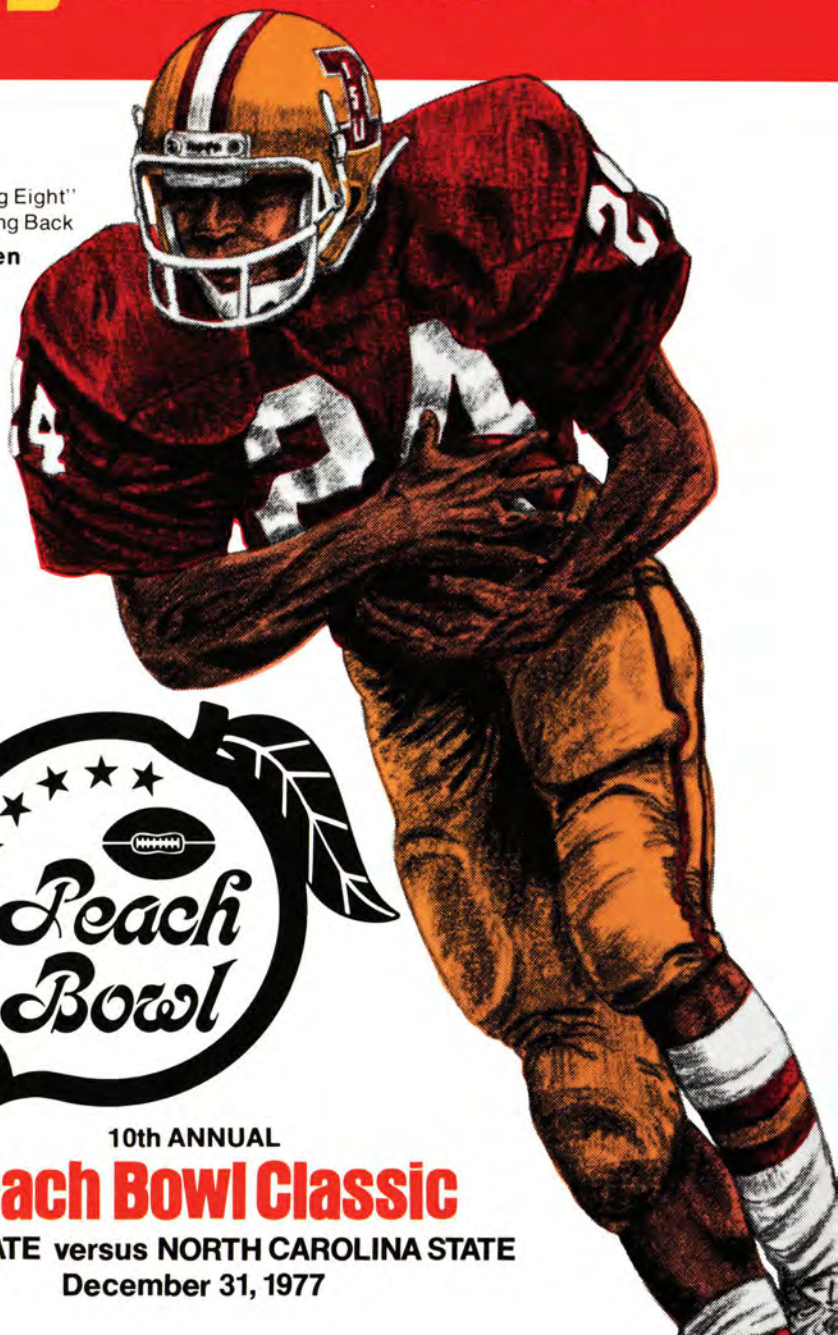

# IOWA STATE WRAP-UP 1977

Earle Bruce pondered the question put forth by a sportswriter following Iowa State's regular season-ending victory over Oklahoma State:

"How did ISU, picked sixth in the Big Eight pre-season poll, overcome what was supposed to be a rebuilding year and finish with an 8-3 overall record including a second-place tie in the Conference?" asked the scribe.

"Well, I guess somebody forgot to tell our players and coaches that we weren't supposed to be any good," responded the man who has received back-to-back Coach-of-the-Year honors in the Big Eight Conference.

Indeed, the member of the fourth estate had been correct. This WAS supposed to have been a rebuilding season for the Cyclones. There were only nine starters returning and added to that was the fact that starting quarterback Mike Tryon received a severe shoulder separation (which would require surgery) in the first quarter of the initial game.

That turned out to be a very untimely injury for the Cyclones since the Cardinal and Gold would have to face arch-rival Iowa in the second contest of the '77 campaign. The loss of Tryon did cause a dent in the ISU effort, as the host Hawkeyes handed I-State a heart-breaking 12-10 loss in Iowa City.

Earle Bruce told his players to forget about that game...there were still 9 left to play. But how would the team react in actuality?

That answer was to come during the next four Saturdays when the Cyclones would rack up 83 points enroute to four consecutive victories including wins over Missouri and then Nebraska, a member of the nation's top ten.

In addition, Iowa State would beat Kansas, Oklahoma State, and Kansas State in Big Eight play to add to its three non-conference victories.

The only losses in those last 9 games would be to Oklahoma and Colorado, both having been ranked fifth or better on the national polls during the course of the season. The loss to Colorado was another cliffhanger—12-7—while the game at Oklahoma was much closer than the final 35-16 tally. The Sooners held a slight 21-16 lead heading into the fourth quarter with the Cyclones hav-



ing the ball on the OU 4-yard stripe. However, a pass interception in the endzone killed the ISU drive and seemed to deflate the emotionally-high Cyclones.

But all in all, it had been an amazing journey through the 11-game slate. The 5-2 record against Big Eight competition enabled I-State to tie Nebraska (a team, remember, which the Cyclones had beaten) for second place in what many consider the nation's number one conference.

Coach Earle Bruce received Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year honors from United Press International, an honor he garnered from both U.P.I. and Associated Press the previous year, and several Cyclones received all-league status.

First-team laurels went to running back Dexter Green, defensive tackles Mike Stensrud and Tom Randall, defensive back Kevin Hart, and punter Rick Blabolil. Named to the second unit were defensive end Craig Volkens, linebacker Tom Boskey, and middle guard Ron McFarland.

The Cyclones were the top team in scoring defense and finished second in every other major defensive category on the final Big Eight Conference statistics. Dexter Green finished first in scoring, Ray Hardee was the top kickoff returner, and Rick Blabolil was the number one punter on the final loop individual stats.

The dream of every Cyclone player and coach was to be invited to a post-season bowl classic. That dream came true when the Peach Bowl committee graciously offered an invitation to the Ames institution. Now only one goal remains for this "rebuilding" team—a nine-game winning season. That will be on the minds of every Iowa Stater when the Cyclones take the field against the rugged Wolfpack of North Carolina State...

# EARLE BRUCE

## 1976 AND 1977 BIG EIGHT COACH-OF-THE-YEAR

You would have to go back to 1906 and 1907 before finding the same success that Iowa State has enjoyed the past two seasons. That was the last time in which ISU recorded 16 victories over two consecutive seasons, a feat Earle Bruce-coached teams have accomplished over the past two years.

In each of the past two campaigns, Bruce has taken a team which was supposed to have dwelled somewhere near the cellar of the rugged Big Eight race and has made a solid title contender out of each, finishing in the first division both times.

Both teams were consistently ranked in the nation's top 20 and I-State presently owns back-to-back victories over Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas, and Kansas State.

For those reasons, due to his remarkable achievements, the successful mentor has been named Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year twice in the past two seasons.

In just six years of collegiate coaching, Earle has already recorded 38 career victories, including 28 of those in five years at Iowa State. He stands second on the ISU list of career wins over conference opposition.

Earle joined the program in January of 1973. With the aid of the beautiful new stadium complex in 1975, Iowa State has set and reset home attendance records since Bruce's arrival.

Bruce came to Iowa State after coaching the University of Tampa to a 10-2 record and a Tangerine Bowl victory in 1972, his first year as a college head coach. Prior to that his coaching experience was in Ohio—six years as an assistant at Ohio State and a decade in the prep ranks.

As a high school coach, Bruce was recognized as Ohio's best. He went 28-9 in four years at Mansfield High School, 34-3-3 in four years at Sandusky, and 20-0 in two seasons at Massillon. He was three times state "Coach-of-the-Year."

One of the highlights of his college coaching was being honored as the head coach of the East team in the 1976 Hula Bowl and directing a 16-0 victory, the first shutout in 30 years.

Bruce was an all-state gridder at Allegany High School in Cumberland, Md., and graduated from Ohio State in 1953. He played freshman ball there before an injury ended his career.

Earle, the father of four daughters, received a master's degree from Kent State in 1963.

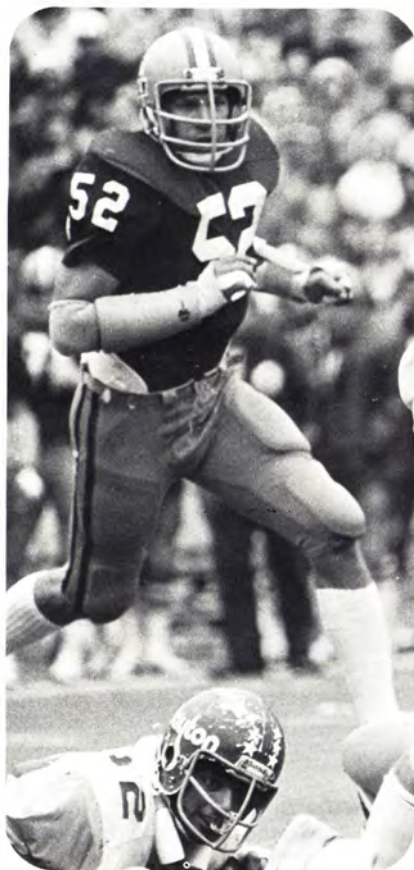

state team and was Mt. Carmel's most valuable lineman. . .came to Iowa State with the reputation of being one of the toughest linemen in the Chicago area and is expected to get much bigger . . .will challenge for Randall's open tackle job when Randall graduates in the spring. . .coaches are looking for big things from this young giant.

**48 Don Thurston, 6-0, 225, Jr., Orland Park, Ill., nose guard.** . .nicknamed "Fuzzy" after the former great Green Bay Packer star. . .was a first-team all-America junior college player out of Joliet Junior College in 1976 but injuries have slowed his career at ISU . . .received a non-football related head injury in late spring (was hit by the back gate of a truck) and it was first believed that he would have to give up football, but doctors gave him the go-ahead late in the 1977 season. . .now runs at second-team nose guard and could possibly see action in Peach Bowl . . .coaches are impressed with his hitting ability. . .teamed at Joliet J.C. with Jerry Washington, also a member of the Cyclones.

**10 Mike Tryon, 6-1, 188, Sr., Ames, Ia., quarterback.** . .would have to be regarded as one of college football's hard-luck stories of the year. . .after toiling for four years he finally won the starting QB job at ISU in his fifth and final season and received a shoulder separation in the first quarter of the first game which required surgery



### **BOB MARCUM**

Associate Director of Athletics

Bob Marcum is in his seventh year on the Iowa State athletic staff with the responsibility of overseeing the varsity sports of football, baseball, track and field, cross country and swimming as well as the athletic business office.

Marcum came to the program from Canton, Ohio, where he had a wide variety of athletic and administrative responsibilities. He coached at Canton's famous McKinley High School from 1963-68 as the offensive coordinator on the football team, and for one season was the wrestling coach.

From 1968-71 he served as an administrator in the Canton public school system with emphasis on inner-city problems. During this time he was also a committeeman on Ohio State's athletic council and helped the Buckeye assistant coach Lou McCullough in recruiting in the Canton-Massillon area.

Marcum was a 1959 graduate of Marshall University, where he earned two letters in football and had what promised to be a professional career halted by injury. He is a native of Huntington, W.V., graduating from Huntington High School in 1955 with all-state football honors.



### **MAX URICK**

Assistant Director of Athletics

Max Urick is in his fourth year as assistant director of athletics with direct responsibility for the basketball, wrestling, gymnastics, golf, and tennis programs, and coordinating the busy athletic ticket office.

Urlick joined the Iowa State program after a 13-year coaching career which was well-rounded and took him to nearly every level of collegiate football. He began coaching in 1961 at Army and served there for two years. He then joined the Ohio State staff and was an assistant for three years. In 1966 he left there to become an assistant at Denison University, where he coached for one year. He was the head coach at Wabash College from 1967-70 and left there to accept a position on the Duke staff as offensive backfield coach.

A native of Troy, Ohio, Urick was named one of the outstanding young men in America in 1968 by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. He is a 1961 graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University, where he earned All-America honors in football and lacrosse and won a conference championship in wrestling.

**TOM LICHTENBERG** is the veteran of the offensive staff, now in his fourth year at Iowa State. He has coached the Cyclone quarterbacks and receivers the past two years after working with the running backs his first season.

Tom came to Iowa State after three years at Morehead State in Kentucky. He had previously coached for 12 years at Wm. Mason High School in Mason, Ohio and for two years at Purcell High in Cincinnati.

He is a 1962 graduate of Louisville and earned four letters there as a running back. He also lettered in track. Tom graduated from Lockland High School. Among his coaching honors was an assignment in the 1966 Ohio all-star prep game. A year ago he was instrumental in developing the offense that ranked second nationally.

**CHARLIE LYLE** is one of two members of Bruce's original Cyclone staff, having joined the ISU program in January of 1973 after coaching for two years at Tampa.

Lyle, a 1962 graduate of Tampa, coached in the Florida high school ranks for seven years prior to moving to Tampa. His 1972 Tampa secondary ranked nationally in interceptions and his 1976 Cyclone defensive backs led the Big Eight.

Lyle lettered in football and baseball at Tampa and also played professionally in Orlando, Lakeland and St. Petersburg. A native of Mulberry, Fla., he earned 12 letters in three sports there.

**PETE RODRIGUEZ** enters his second year at Iowa State as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach.

Rodriguez has a wealth of collegiate experience, starting at Arizona in 1968 for two seasons. He moved to Western Illinois and helped mold a 39-13 mark from 1970-1974. He was the defensive coordinator at Florida State during the 1974 and 1975 campaigns.

Pete is a native of Chicago, Ill., and graduated from Kelly High School in 1958. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1963 from Western State and added a master's degree a year later. He coached in the Colorado ranks for three years at Stratton and Harrison High Schools.

**STEVE SZABO** is the new addition to the defensive staff as the guard and tackle coach. He came to Iowa State following the 1976 season after three years at Syracuse with the same coaching responsibilities.

Szabo was an outstanding student-athlete in both high school and college. A 1962 graduate of Chicago's Mendel High School, he graduated third in a class of

He attended graduate school at The Catholic University and Johns Hopkins. He moved from there to the varsity staff of Toledo and went to Iowa in 1971. There he coached the linebackers and both lines. He moved to Syracuse in 1974.

**DAVE TRIPLETT** is the newest member of the offensive staff, coming to the ISU program after the 1976 season following an outstanding four years of prep coaching.

Triplett was 19-2 in two years at Sioux City Heelan High School, winning the state 4A championship once. He went 10-7 in two years at Davenport Assumption.

A 1972 graduate of Iowa, where he was a football letterman and all-conference performer, Dave also earned Phi Beta Kappa academic honors.

Triplett played for Jim Williams, ISU's line coach, as a prep at Des Moines Dowling High School. His assignment at Iowa State is to work with the tackles and tight ends.

**BOB TUCKER** is another of Bruce's original staff, having coached the Cyclone defensive ends since 1973. Among his prize pupils at ISU was Otis Rodgers, drafted by the New York Giants last year.

Tucker had spent four years as an assistant coach at Wichita State prior to coming to Ames. Before that he coached at Massillon Washington High School in Ohio for two years. He had also been an assistant at Penn State while working on his master's degree.

Tucker earned four letters in football at Wooster College before his 1965 graduation. He is a native of Sandusky, Ohio and was coached there by Earle Bruce.

**TOM VAUGHN** joined the Cyclone staff in the spring of 1975, returning to the school where he had won all-Big Eight and all-America honors just a few years earlier.

Vaughn first came to Iowa State after a prep all-America career at Troy, Ohio. His career at ISU was superb, and he has been called the best all-purpose back ever to wear the Cyclone uniform. He graduated in 1967 and went on to play for the Detroit Lions for seven years.

Vaughn, who has a master's degree from Eastern Michigan, coached for a year

**JIM WILLIAMS** is in his second year on the ISU staff after compiling a record that perhaps earns him the distinction of being the most successful high school football coach in Iowa history.

The coach of famous Dowling High School in Des Moines for 12 years, he compiled an outstanding 105-9-1 record. His overall record stands at 181-21-3, which includes five years at East Dubuque, Ill., and seven years at Audubon, Ia.

Williams-coached teams never lost a Metro-Conference game and once had a 47-game unbeaten streak.

A native of Clinton, Ia., Williams graduated from Miles, Ia., High School in 1949 and earned a bachelor's degree from Northern Iowa. He earned all-conference recognition in football and basketball as a collegian. He has been honored as the state's "Coach of the Year" on several occasions. He directs ISU's guards and centers and played a large role in the success enjoyed by the 1976 linemen.

**VAN HOLLAWAY** serves as the football program coordinator, his first year in this capacity after one year as a part-time coach at ISU.

The head coach at Bethany College in 1974 and 1975, Hollaway was a two-sport star at Iowa State before his 1973 graduation. He lettered twice on the football team and three times on the track and field squad. He still holds the school javelin record, won the Drake Relays and qualified for the 1972 Olympic trials.

A native of Beloit, Kan., he also attended Hutchinson, Kan., Community College.

**HARRY BURRELL** is serving as the assistant sports information director for the first year after a 36 year tenure as sports information director. A native of Iowa City and a graduate of Iowa, Burrell came to ISU in 1941 after seven years as the sports information director at Northern Iowa.

He is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America and is a member of the Helms Hall of Fame. In the past year he was honored by the Iowa High School Track and Field Association and the Iowa State Alumni Association.

He captained the baseball team and played in the Chicago White Sox system before entering high school coaching.

Gary coached at North Polk High School and Des Moines Dowling before moving into private business.

**JOHN MAHLSTED**, a 1947 graduate of Miami (Ohio), is Iowa State's faculty representative to the Big Eight.

Mahlsted graduated from Mayfield, Ohio High School in 1941 after winning letters in football, basketball and baseball. He received master's and doctor's degrees from Michigan State before joining the Iowa State staff in 1951.

He is a past president of the American Society for Horticultural Science and is presently associate director of the Iowa Agricultural and Home Economics Experiment Station, a position he has held since 1967.

**JIM OVERTURF** has been Iowa State's athletic business manager since 1966 after a teaching career on the high school level.

Overturf, a native of Marshalltown and a 1951 graduate of Marshalltown High School, earned a bachelor's and master's degree from Colorado State.

Jim is a former vice-president of the Iowa Vocational Association, former president of the Iowa Distributive Education Teachers Association, vice-president of the National Association of Distributive Education Teachers, and a member of the College Athletic Business Managers of America.

**FRANK RANDALL** is in his seventh year as head trainer at Iowa State.

Randall is a native of New Mexico, graduating from Carlsbad High School in 1953 and New Mexico State University in 1962. He earned his master's degree from Western New Mexico in 1969.

Frank, himself a collegiate baseball star, was the trainer at New Mexico State from 1961-1964, then moved to the New Mexico Military Institute for five years. Prior to coming to Iowa State he was at the University of Idaho for one year.

**MAL SCHMIDT**, a former star athlete for Iowa State, is the executive director of the National Cyclone Club, joining the staff in 1965.

Mal graduated from Ames High School in 1946 and became a two-sport star with the Cyclones before his 1952 graduation. He was a conference swimming champion and an all-conference football selection as an end, being drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles. He was ISU's "Athlete of the Year" in 1951.

**TOM STARR** became the sports information director at Iowa State on July 1, 1977 after serving four years as the director of the Big Eight Conference service bureau.

He served first as freshman coach and then worked on the varsity staff until 1972. In 1948 he was Michigan's high school "Coach of the Year."

Born in Scotland Arch graduated from River Rouge, Mich., High School in 1934 with six letters in football and basketball.

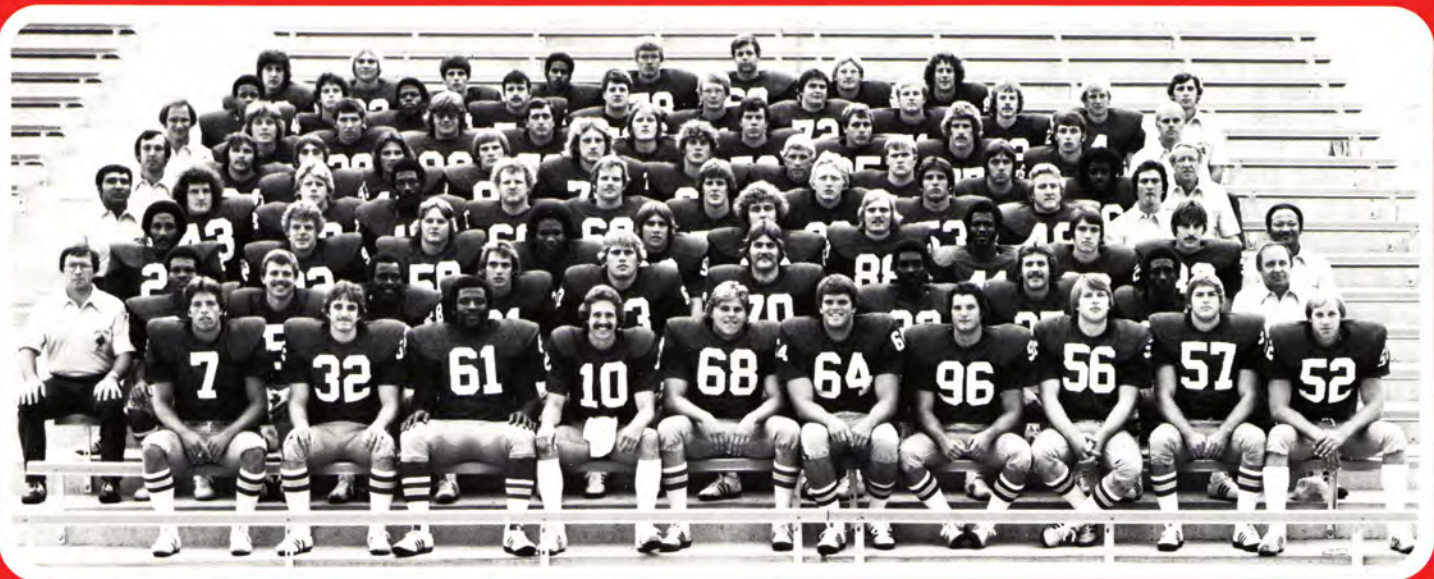
