If you know someone gay, lesbian or bisexual tell them that you know

it's National Coming Out Day and that you are coming out as a "100 percent Homophobia Free" friend.

It takes a lot of courage to come out as a gay, lesbian or bisexual. But it takes just as much courage for straight people to be visibly supportive.

Come to the "Out Is In" Rally at noon today. Make the extra effort to show support for your friends and family.

As long as we choose to remain hidden, we are our own worst enemy. And as long as we are silent, we are defenseless against oppression.
