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## *Beware of the Heterosexual Society*

At a meeting of the newly-formed Heterosexual Society, club president and founder DeAnne Backes leveled some pretty questionable opinions about homosexuality.

She claimed, among other things, that heterosexuality is the only biologically correct lifestyle. To explain her view she continued, "homosexuality is a disease. Gay people are wrong."
