Black Art and Experience from the Great Depression to the Civil Rights Movement: One Woman's View

Margaret Burroughs is the founder, along with her husband, of the DuSable Museum of African American History. She published her first children's book Jasper, the Brummin' Boy in 1947; co-edited an anthology For Malcolm: Poems on the Life and Death of Malcolm X; and published several volumes of poetry. She was instrumental in founding the South Side Community Arts Center, which was organized as part of President Roosevelt's New Deal, and the only WPA Art Center still in operation. She has her undergraduate degree from Chicago Teachers' College and an MFA from the Chicago Art Institute. Her artworks in diverse media have been exhibited nationally and internationally.
