To the Board of Regents:

The International Students' Council has been established at Iowa State University to encourage and strengthen communication and cooperation among International Clubs and the University in general. On September 17, 1984, the Council passed a resolution stating that a letter be written expressing serious concern about the proposed tuition increase. Foreign students will be greatly affected by these increases due to the following reasons.

1. Restrictions on money that can be sent to foreign students.

2. Foreign students are ineligible to receive U.S. Federal:

i) grants

ii) scholarships

iii) loans

iv) work-study funds

3. Foreign students are prohibited from working off campus for their first year.

4. Visa regulations require students to be enrolled as full-time students.

5. A strong dollar has caused weak exchange rates for many foreign currencies.

"Iowa State University is a broad-based university of international stature. The majority of its students are from Iowa, but every state and more than 100 foreign countries are represented in the student body." Fall semester 1984, there are over 2,000 foreign students and at least 3,500 overseas alumni. Foreign alumni are leaders in agriculture, business, education, government, and labor in their home countries. Increasingly these alumni are looking to the U.S. and Iowa as they purchase consumer and capital goods for themselves, their businesses, and governments. Foreign students are active in educating Iowans about international issues through several on and off-campus programs coordinated by ISU's Office of International Education Services.

While it is understood that inflation requires some rise in tuition, the projected inflation rate in the cost-of-living is 3% to 5%. A 12% out-of-state tuition rate is proposed for 1984-85. The following are reasons why foreign students will be hit harder by a tuition increase than Americans: Many countries have limits on the amount of money families can send to their children in the U.S.; foreign students are ineligible to receive U.S. Federal awards for grants, scholarships, loans, or work-study funds; foreign students are prohibited from working off-campus by the Immigration and Naturalization Service in their first year of study; after a year they must convince the INS that an unforeseen change in their financial circumstances has arisen since they arrived in the U.S.: this procedure often takes three or more

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months and it is not uncommon for permission to be refused; students are limited to working 20 hours per week while school is in session; while on-campus employment can be authorized by unversity officials, there are a limited number of on-campus jobs; foreign students cannot drop out of school and work full time in the U.S. to make enough money to continue their studies; as a condition of their student visas, they have to be enrolled as full-time students.

The tuition increase falls harder on foreign students because the strength of the U.S. dollar is at record levels. This means that students' home currencies are weaker against the U.S. dollar. For example, in Mexico in 1981 there were 24 pesos to the U.S. dollar and on September 17, 1984, there were 190 pesos to the dollar. A Mexican family sending money to their son or daughter today at ISU would find their money worth only 12% of what it was worth in 1981. Since 1980-81, ISU's out-of-state tuition for graduates has increased 80%, and for undergraduates, 83%. Of course the devaluation of the Mexican peso and other foreign currencies was caused by international economic forces unrelated to ISU's tuition policies; but it is cited as an example of how some foreign students are already suffering severe economic difficulties.

To keep ISU's longstanding commitment to cultural pluralism, it is urged that the tuition increase for out-of-state students match that of in-state tuition. A second alternative would be to increase scholarship funds for needy foreign students.
