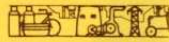

"People's China"

Peoples China is a large graphic display over one hundred feet in length which contains approximately 500 photographs and other visual pieces giving a comprehensive overview of modern day China.

The topics covered in various sections of the PEOPLE'S CHINA exhibit include agriculture, industry, political system, medicine, education, science, sports, culture, children, elderly, women, minorities, geography, natural resources, language and history.

PEOPLE'S CHINA is produced and distributed by the US-China Peoples Friendship Association, a non-profit, tax exempt organization whose purpose is to build friendship based on mutual understanding between the peoples of the United States and the People's Republic.

The exhibit can be seen in the exhibit case on the first and second floors of the ISU Library as well as in the Pioneer Room of the Memorial Union.

SUNDAY, DECEMBER 2

Keynote Lecture: "China, Her Conception of Her Place in the World"

Dr. Han Suyin, Distinguished Chinese Historian and Author

8 p.m., Sun Room, Memorial Union

Han Suyin is a doctor and Chinese historian who witnessed the Chinese Cultural Revolution and has investigated practically every aspect of Chinese social and political life. Dr. Han attended Yenching University, Brussels University, and received her M.D. in England in 1948. She has lectured in twenty-five countries and has worked as a doctor in Hong Kong, Singapore, and Malaya. Among her books are: *Destination Chungking*, *A Many Splendored Thing*, *The Morning Deluge*, the first volume of her major work on Mao Tsetung, and *Wind in the Tower*, which completes her biography of Mao Tsetung. MONDAY, DECEMBER 3

Film: "Women in China"

[27 minutes/color]

12:00 Noon, Pioneer Room, Memorial Union

"Women in China" takes a look at family life in a villa for workers in Shanghai, women at work in many occupations, the child-care support system, the opportunities for girls and women in the educational system, the role of women and the family in a minority area in Inner Mongolia, and witnessing a birth in a Canton hospital. The variety of options for girls in China is contrasted with the old society.

Lecture: "Agricultural Mechanization, Social Change and Rural Values in the People's Republic of China"

Benedict Stavis, Michigan State University

Dr. Benedict R. Stavis, Assistant Professor of Agricultural Economics at Michigan State University, is author of *The Politics of Agricultural Mechanization in China*, as well as numerous other reports and articles on agricultural development in China.

Dr. Stavis has served as research associate at the Center for International Studies and Program on Politics for Science and Technology in Developing Nations at Cornell University. He was born in Washington D.C. in 1941 and received his B.A. from Haverford College and his M.A. and Ph.D. from Columbia University.

Susan Warren, U.N. Correspondent

3 p.m., Pioneer Room, Memorial Union

Susan Warren, U.N. correspondent for New China (national organ of the USCPFA), has published many articles about China's foreign policy. She is the author of *China's Voice in the United Nations* (1975). A frequent traveler to China, she is also one of the founders of the New York, U.S.-China Peoples Friendship Association, and teaches contemporary Chinese Studies at Empire State College, New York.

Lecture: "Chinese Foreign Policy"

Dr. Edward Friedman, Harvard University

8 p.m., Sun Room, Memorial Union

Edward Friedman, Professor of Political Science, University of Wisconsin, Madison, is the recipient of a Ph.D. in East Asian studies from Harvard University. He has taught at four universities including Harvard. His books include, *Backward Toward Revolution: The Chinese Revolutionary Party* (1974); *Taiwan and American Policy* (1971, joint author); and *America's Asia: Dissenting Essays on Asian American Policy* (1970, co-editor).

He is currently an Advisory Editor of the *Republican Chinese Newsletter*, and has founded or edited other periodicals relating to Asia. He is the Chairman of the China and Inner Asia Regional Committee of the Association for Asian Studies. He has been a fellow of Harvard's East Asian Institute, Michigan's China Center, and Illinois' Center for Advanced Study. He is currently completing a book entitled *The Promise of Peasant Revolution*, and a manuscript based on research done during a stay in a Chinese Village, called *A Chinese Village*.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 5

Films: "Sunshine Over Lhasa" and "Medicine in China"

[30 minutes/color and 25 minutes/color]

"Sunshine over Lhasa" was filmed in China in the early 1970's using footage from pre-1953 Tibet. The film illustrates the changes which have occurred in Tibet since the revolution. Showing changes in health care, education, and the use of land.

Lecture: "Science in the People's Republic of China"

Dr. Chen Yen Yang, State University of New York

8 p.m., Sun Room, Memorial Union

Dr. Chen Yen Yang is Albert Einstein Professor of Physics at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. He is also Director of the Institute of Theoretical Physics at the same campus. Yang received his Ph.D. in 1948 at the University of Chicago.

He is currently a member of the Board of Directors of the

American Association for the Advancement of Science and on the Board of Trustees of the Salk Institute. In 1957, Yang received the Albert Einstein Commemorative Award and the Nobel Prize for Physics. Dr. Yang became President of the National Association of Chinese Americans (NACA) in 1977.

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 6

**Films: "The People's Commune" and
"Self Reliance"**

[each is 25 minutes/color]

"The People's Commune" shows how China, with most of its 800,000,000 plus people working the land, is reaching self-sufficiency in agriculture. It conveys the reality of the Chinese peasant's life, how they live, and their immense capacity for work in order to make the land more productive.

"Self Reliance" gives a general overview of China's developing economy. Scenes of rural workshops, urban cooperatives, large state farms, heavy industry, and shipbuilding describe the spirit of self-reliance which has been the cornerstone of China's national economic policy.

**Lecture: "Has China Lost the Road to
Socialism?"**

**Dr. Paul Sweezy, Distinguished Marxian
Economist**

Dr. John Gurley, Stanford University

8 p.m., Sun Room, Memorial Union

Dr. Sweezy ranks among the most distinguished Marxian economists in the nation. Educated at Exeter, Harvard, and London School of Economics, he has worked with various New Deal agencies and during World War II served with the Office of Strategic Services within Europe. In 1949 he co-founded *Monthly Review* and remains its co-editor. He is the author of many books which include *The Theory of Capitalist Development* (1942), *The Present as History* (1953), and *Monopoly Capital*, with Paul Baron, (1966).

Dr. Gurley is well known as professor of economics at Stanford University, where he received his undergraduate and graduate education. He has a distinguished teaching career having taught at Princeton University, the University of Maryland, and Doshisha University in Japan. He has served in the capacity of consultant for several international agencies and has held the positions of Senior

Fellow at the Brookings Institute (1954-1960) and managing editor of the *American Economic Review* (1963-1968).

Dr. Gurley has published widely on the subject of political economics. He wrote the works *Money on a Theory of Finance* (1960 with E.S. Shaw), *Challenges to Capitalism: Marx, Lenin, and Mao* (1975), and *China's Economics and the Maoist Strategy* (1976).

FRIDAY, DECEMBER 7

Film: "Forbidden City"

[35 minutes/color]

"Forbidden City" is a documentary made in China about the Forbidden City as it was in the past and the role it plays today. The narration follows a Chinese family as they pay a visit to this part of their cultural heritage which is now a national museum and park open to the public. Beautiful footage of the buildings and art treasures.

Lecture: "Art in China"

Peggy Patrick, Des Moines Art Center

3 p.m., Sun Room, Memorial Union

Peggy Patrick has been on the staff of the Des Moines Art Center for twenty-five years. She is currently Vice-President of the Midwest Museums Association, as well as being a member of the Iowa Museums Association and Iowa Arts Council. Miss Patrick participated as leader on an art oriented trip to China in the spring of this year.

Film and Lecture: "Dr. Norman Bethune"

Gerald Tannenbaum

8 p.m., Sun Room, Memorial Union

Gerald Tannenbaum graduated from Northwestern University with a B.S. in Business Administration. He went to China in 1942 with the US Army and stayed there for more than twenty years. While there, Mr. Tannenbaum was involved in various official relief, welfare, and cultural projects, including helping to develop China's international magazine, *China Reconstructs*. He has been a featured actor in Chinese motion pictures and is on the Editorial Board of *Modern China* (a UCLA publication) and is an editor of *New China*.

Mr. Tannenbaum's presentation will include a showing of his film, "Dr. Norman Bethune," in which he himself stars. Following this, he will discuss the making of the film in China.
