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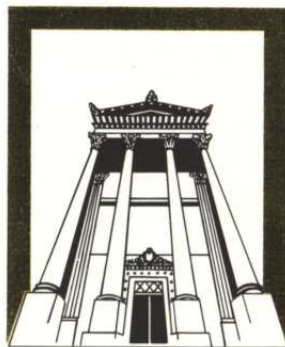

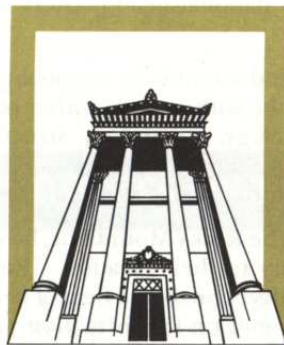
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Gordon P. Eaton is the second native of Ohio to become President of Iowa State. The first was William M. Beardshear, one of the institution's most successful chief executives, whose eleven-year term as President began nearly a century ago, in 1891. Eaton is also the second to come from Texas A&M University to assume the Presidency of Iowa State. The first was Charles E. Friley, whose seventeen-year term commenced in 1936.

Gordon Eaton was born in Dayton March 9, 1929. He received the B.A. degree in geology and mathematics "With High Honors and Distinction" in 1951 from Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut, and married Virginia A. Gregory two days following commencement. He earned the M.S. in geology in 1953 and the Ph.D. in geology and geophysics in 1957 from the California Institute of Technology.

He was designated by the State Board of Regents in November, 1985, to become President of Iowa State University of Science and Technology, effective July 1, 1986. At the time of his designation, he was Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Texas A&M University, College Station, a position he had held since 1983. He had served as Dean of the College of Geosciences at Texas A&M from 1981 until 1983.

Iowa State's new President has spent his entire professional life in education and public service, as teacher and researcher, as federal manager and executive and as university administrator.

He served on the faculty of Wesleyan University from 1955 to 1959 and the faculty of the University of California, Riverside, from 1959 to 1963. He took academic leave from 1963 to 1965 to serve as project chief for the U.S. Geological Survey in Denver, for investigations of bentonite deposits and groundwater resources. He returned to the University of California, Riverside, in 1965 as associate professor and chairperson of the Department of Geological Sciences.

He began a fourteen-year career with the U.S. Geological Survey in 1967, serving in several administrative and scientific positions that took him to Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Washington, D.C., and Hawaii, where he was scientist-in-charge of the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory. (In January, 1987, he was invited to Hawaii Volcanoes National Park to make the major address in ceremonies dedicating the new Hawaiian Volcano Observatory and Thomas A. Jaggar Museum.) He was Associate Chief Geologist at U.S. Geological Survey national headquarters in Reston, Virginia, when he joined Texas A&M in 1981.

Eaton is a recognized scholar and scientist in regional geology and geophysical synthesis and interpretation. He is the author or co-author of more than forty publications and he has taught physical geology, mineralogy, structural geology, petrology, and introductory geophysics, at the undergraduate level, and exploration geophysics, fundamental geology, and research courses at the graduate level.

When, as a child, he first visited the Rocky Mountains, he was inspired by their scale and by the awesome forces necessary to their creation. That experience led to his early interest in, and his professional devotion to, the field of geology. Following his arrival on campus, Eaton presented a seminar on the formation of the Southern Rocky Mountains for all interested faculty and students. He won favorable reviews from the overflow crowd for his detailed scientific knowledge and his skillful teaching techniques. He maintains his ties with the Rockies, where he and Virginia own a cabin to which they retreat several times each year. They have two adult children living in Texas, Gretchen and Greg, who join them there for family occasions.

Iowa State's new President has won many honors, including membership in Phi Beta Kappa honor society and Sigma Xi research honor society. He is a member and fellow of the Geological Society of America. He is also a member of the American Association for Higher Education, the American Geophysical Union, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the American Association of Petroleum Geologists. He is also a recipient of the U.S. Government Senior Executive Performance Award and the Wesleyan University Distinguished Alumnus Award.

Nine citizens of Iowa comprise the State Board of Regents. Members are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. Three members are appointed to six-year terms each odd-numbered year. The Regents are responsible for:

The Iowa State University of Science and Technology

The State University of Iowa

The University of Northern Iowa

The Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School

The Iowa School for the Deaf

The cardinal duty of the Board is to develop and govern the Regent institutions in the best interests of the people of the State of Iowa. The Board appoints faculty and staff members, approves programs and curricula of the institutions and determines their general policies of admission and governance. The Board controls their properties, directs the expenditures of their funds and administers trusts, gifts and grants tendered for various purposes.

The Board elects its own officers. It normally meets for two days each month, rotating meeting sites among Des Moines and the five Regent campuses. The Board maintains a full-time staff, under the direction of Executive Secretary R. Wayne Richey, to administer its business from offices in the Lucas State Office Building in Des Moines.

Sloshing up the muddy lane from Ames station in a mule-drawn wagon at dusk on a chill October day in 1868, Adonijah Welch beheld an unfinished hulk of Victorian architecture silhouetted on a naked sweep of prairie horizon.

He was a frail and gentle person, called to this desolate place as an instrument of what he described as a "great and essential mission."

He was formally inaugurated as Iowa State's first President the following March 17, in ceremonies which also dedicated the college building and opened the institution to 183 students who were, in his words, "as poorly prepared as the surroundings."

Benjamin Gue later wrote that "no more unpromising College enterprise was ever launched into existence—even in the 'wild west.'"

Despite such circumstances, the March weather, and the difficulty of travel, more than 1,200 Iowans came to witness the inaugural program. In part, theirs was a typical show of the "western enthusiasm" generated by any local enterprise, however uncertain. More than that, it was a show of faith in the "people's college" movement which had brought this institution into being.

The day had been a long time coming. The charter for this "people's college" had passed the Iowa General Assembly March 22, 1858. Under pressure of hard times, the Assembly had provided only \$10,000 for the institution's establishment.

Whether the college would ever become more than a legislative document was still in question in the summer of 1862, when President Abraham Lincoln signed into law Justin Morrill's Land-Grant Act for federal endowment of state schools embodying the "people's college" concept. With Gue leading the debate, the General Assembly voted the following March to award Iowa's endowment to Iowa State.

The day of the inauguration, dedication and opening began with welcoming remarks by Lieutenant Governor John Scott.

The principal speaker that afternoon was former legislator Gue, then President of the College Board of Trustees. Governor Samuel Merrill presented the College charter and seal, President Welch delivered his inaugural address and Chairman of Agriculture Norton Townshend responded for the faculty.

Today, nearly 119 years later, Iowa State's "great and essential mission" involves more than 26,000 students and more than 2,000 faculty members in nine colleges comprising one of the nation's major universities. A campus noted for its beauty provides the setting for a physical plant which includes 120 major buildings and 1,730 acres of campus. Iowa State is a member of the prestigious Association of American Universities, a collection of the finest research institutions in North America. It is the setting for a variety of research centers and institutes and is actively organizing and seeking funding for new centers of excellence. In addition, Iowa State University is assuming new responsibilities in the process of transferring promising research efforts to the marketplace.

In 1858, or 1868, or 1869 it would have seemed wildly optimistic to hope that Iowa State would someday achieve excellence in its then narrowly defined areas of instruction. Today, it seems reasonable to expect Iowa State to continue to seek and achieve excellence of national and international stature on various academic fronts.

The date of the Inauguration of Dr. Gordon P. Eaton as the twelfth President of Iowa State University marks the one hundred twenty-third anniversary of the award of the Morrill Land Grant to the Iowa Agricultural College and Model Farm.

Iowa Agricultural College was founded in 1858.

President Abraham Lincoln, in 1862, in the midst of the Civil War, signed into law the Morrill Land-Grant College Act. The act provided to the states grants of land, proceeds from the sale of which were to be used to establish "people's colleges" to "promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life."

Iowa's General Assembly was in session at the time of the enactment of the Land-Grant College Act; and Iowa became the first state to accept the terms of the federal legislation. It was two years later that the Iowa Agricultural College, at Ames, was designated Iowa's Land-Grant College.

Adonijah S. Welch, the first President of Iowa State, on March 17, 1869, told the institution's first students, "We offer you for intellectual nutrition the sciences that are most effectual for general culture, most valuable for the special discipline which will fit you for your future work, and most conducive to the welfare and progress of the world."

Benjamin Gue, the Iowa legislator recognized as the originating force behind the establishment of the College, criticized the "usual colleges" as being for the sons of the wealthy. "It is one of the chief aims of this College," Gue said, "to break down these barriers which belong to the darker ages of the past, and open these doors to any of God's people, whether high or low in social circles, rich or poor, white or black, man or woman."

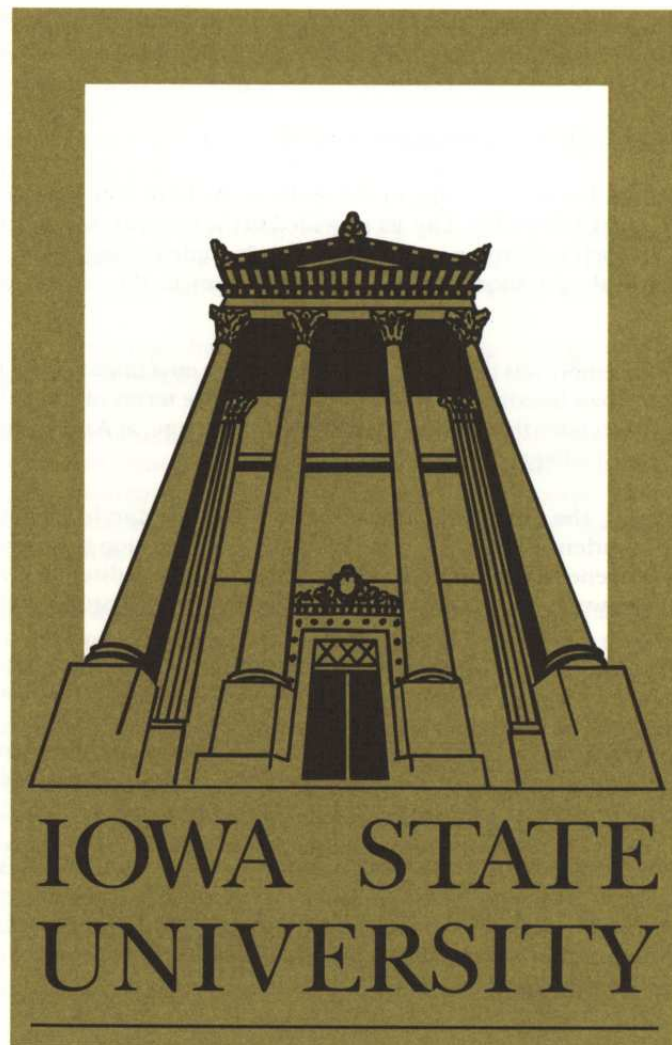
This year marks the Bicentennial of the Constitution of the United States. It is also a significant year in the history of public higher education in this nation because it is the Bicentennial of the Northwest Ordinance, which created the foundation for a national system of public education with its declaration that "schools and the means of education shall be forever encouraged."

This year marks the 125th anniversary of the Morrill Land-Grant College Act.

It is the Centennial of the Hatch Act, which symbolized the first national commitment to scientific research and initiated a strong government-campus partnership in the search for new knowledge. The Hatch Act also provided funds for the establishment of Agricultural Experiment Stations at campuses endowed under the Morrill Act.

It is also the Centennial of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, the nation's oldest higher education association.

This year and this date mark significant and profound milestones in the history of our nation, the history of public higher education and the history of Iowa State University of Science and Technology.



The Presidential Medallion, which symbolizes the investiture of Dr. Gordon P. Eaton as President, is new to the Inauguration Ceremony at Iowa State University of Science and Technology.

The Medallion's design is representative of the facade of Beardshear Hall, which houses the Office of the President, the Vice Presidents and other administrative officers of the University. The back of the Medallion is inscribed, "Office of the President, Iowa State University of Science and Technology, Ames, Iowa."

Beardshear Hall stands on the site of Old Main, the building in which the first students to attend Iowa's Land-Grant College lived and learned. Old Main, which first served as residence hall and classroom building beginning in March, 1869, was partially destroyed by fire in 1900 and the remaining wing burned in 1902. Beardshear Hall was completed in 1906.

The Presidential Medallion symbolizes the venerable tradition as well as a dramatic and dynamic new perspective of Iowa State University of Science and Technology. It presents a doorway to academic adventure and opportunity. It beckons the University's faculty, staff, students, alumni, friends and all citizens of Iowa, much as the imposing entry to Old Main must have challenged and inspired the students, faculty and loyal supporters whose efforts marked the beginnings of Iowa State University's academic heritage.

The President of the State Board of Regents appointed a Presidential Search Committee to assist in the screening of candidates for the Presidency of Iowa State University of Science and Technology and to recommend finalists to the Regents.

The Committee conducted one of the most thorough and publicly scrutinized searches for a public official in Iowa's history. The broadly representative group met frequently during the course of more than six months in the discharge of its duties. Regent President John McDonald lauded the efforts of the committee for its exceptional service to the Board and to the people of Iowa.
