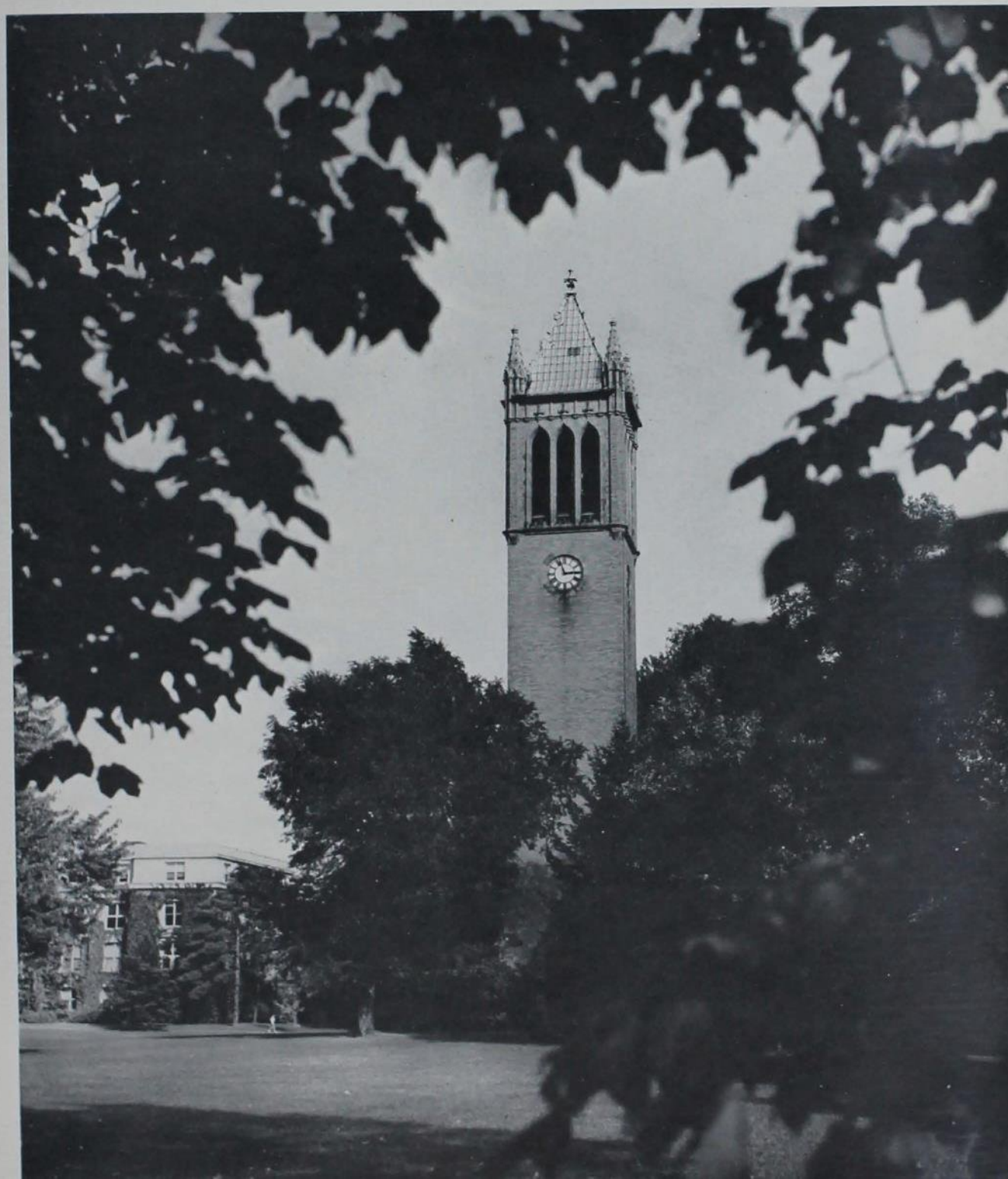

Curtiss Hall, facing west on central campus, is center of agricultural activities.

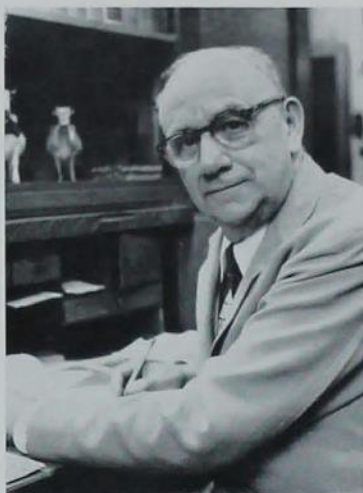

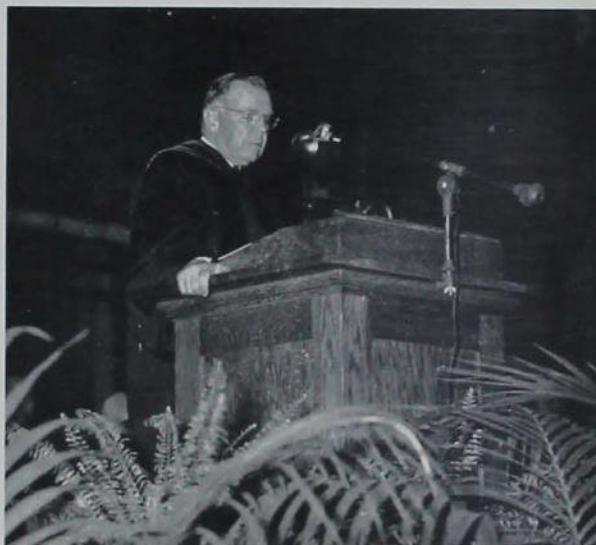


The End of Four Years of Hard Work and Play

The Cyclones finished with four wins, four defeats and one tie — good enough for a number four berth in the Big Seven football race.

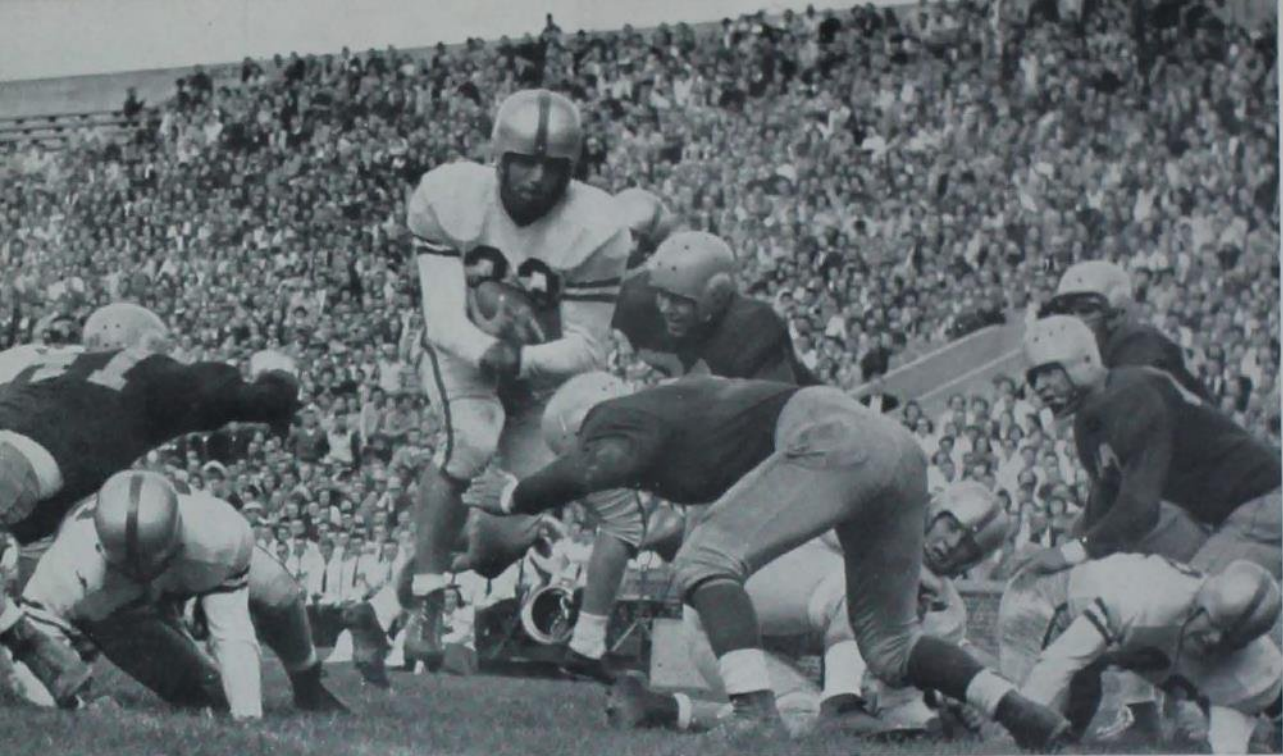

The Cyclone home fans, pep band and cheer squad whoop it up in pulling for ISC to come through.

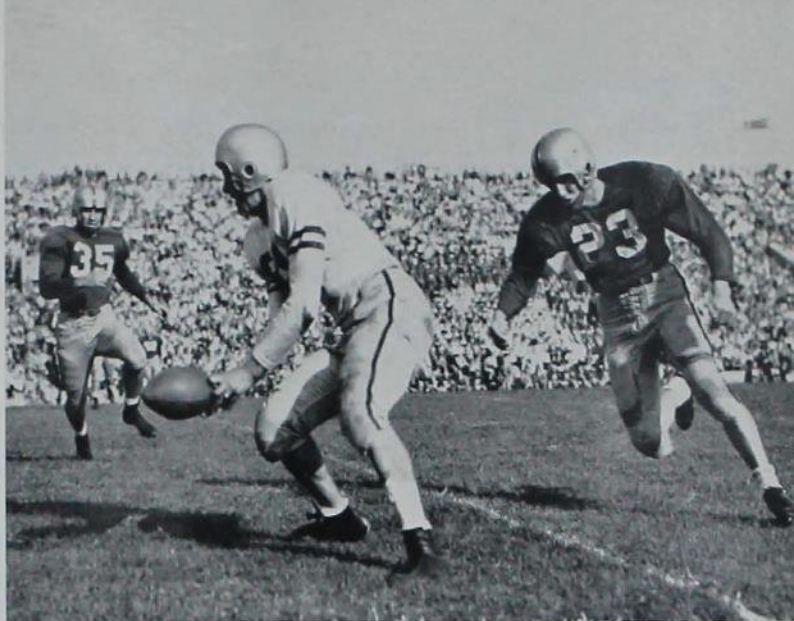


Kansas 53, ISC 33

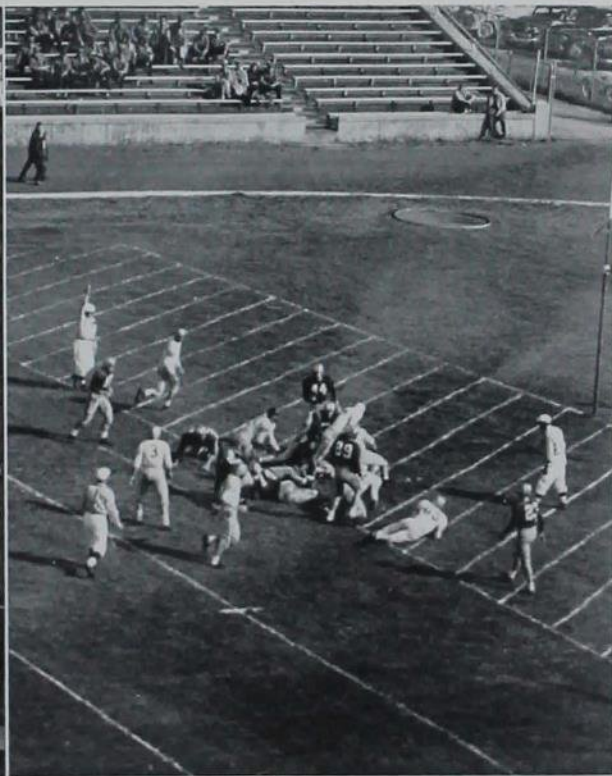

Eichorn intercepted a Mizzou pass and went the distance for the first Iowa State marker. Mann's passing artistry led to the other two TD's with Cherpinsky scoring both times. "Mr. Toe" Clendening made good on all three conversion tries.

Mann connected on 7 of 13 aerials, as Iowa State got 13 first downs to Mizzou's 9.

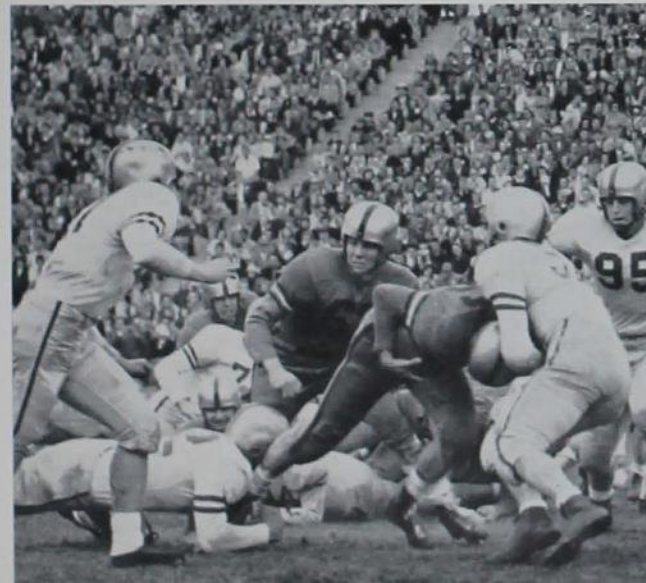
Mann hit on two scoring passes, giving him eleven for the year, a new school record.

ISC 13, Drake 0

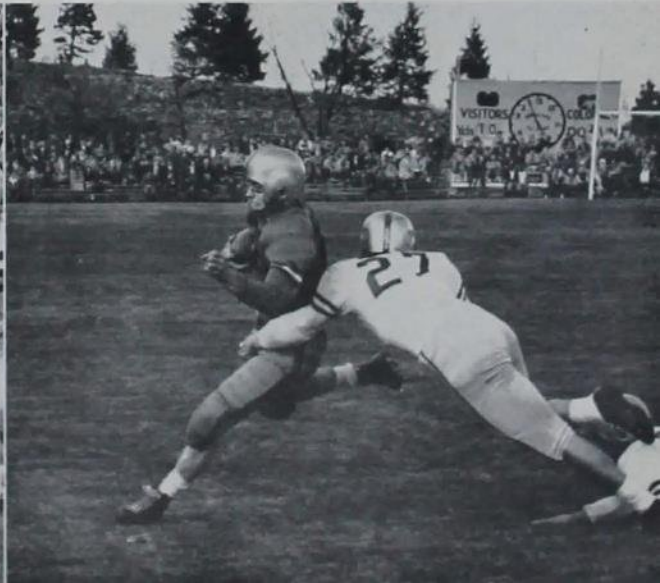
ISC's offensive platoon had to take a back seat to the Cyclone defensive unit, as the home club ground out a 13-0 victory at Drake.

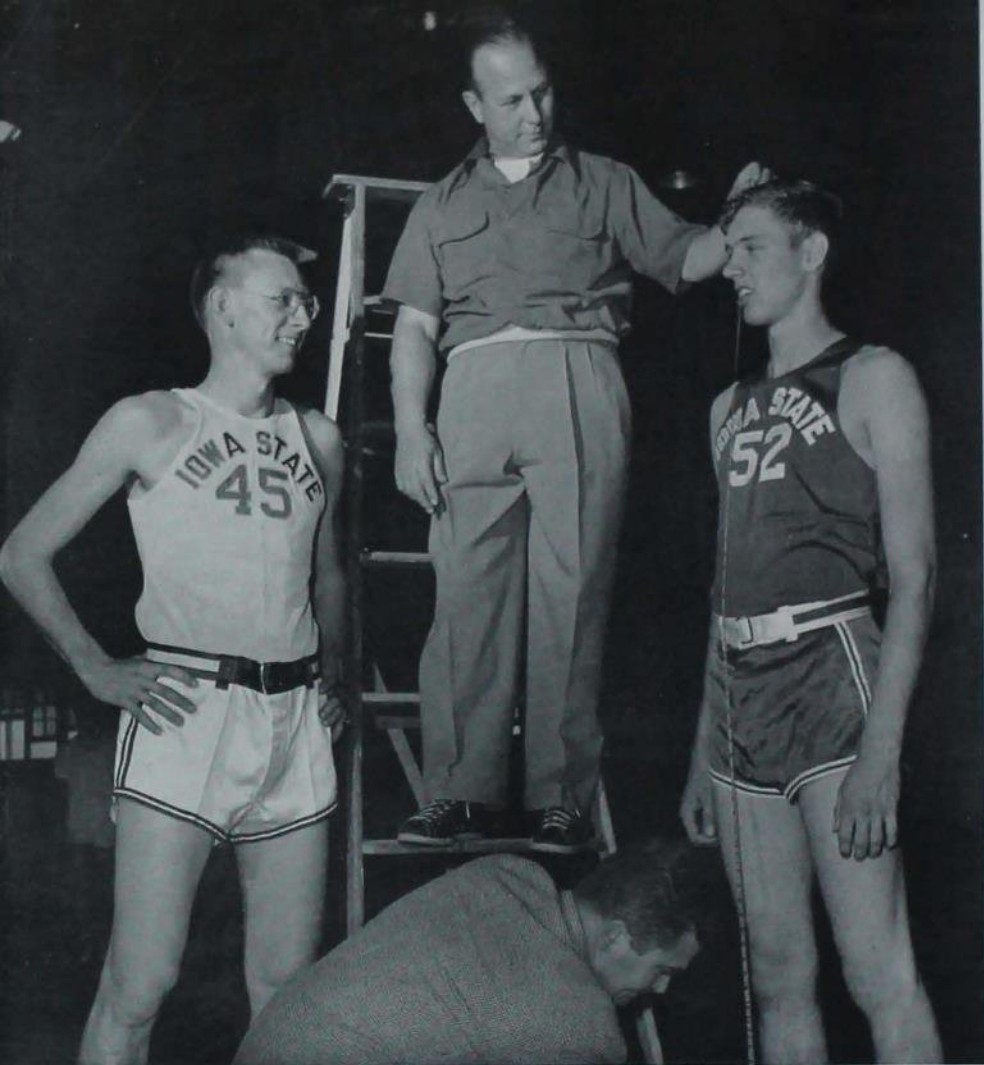
Bee back Spence gathered most of the squad's scoring laurels, while fullback Stevenson saw considerable varsity action.

Coach Clayton (Chick) Sutherland's 1951-52 Cyclone cagers, which he classed as "an improved club over the '50-51 team," annexed a season's record of 10 wins and 11 losses and ended up in fourth place in a rugged Big Seven loop race.

The Cyclones had their usual ups and downs, losing several tight ball games, but generally the club turned in its top performance on the home floor and lost most of its contests on the road.

One of the cagers' toughest losses was at the hands of Stanford University at the Big Seven Invitational in Kansas City. The Indians finally won over ISC, 103-102, in a thrilling over-time tilt. Iowa State finished seventh in the top-notch eight team field at the tournament.

Several Aces Brightened Average Season

Despite an average season, the '51-52 squad came up with several offensive and defensive aces.

Lanky Jim Stange smashed the old school record for individual scoring by amassing a total of 298 markers. George Hess also surpassed the old standard but had to settle for second place with 248 points.

Big Delmar Diercks turned in a whale of a defensive game when he held Kansas' scoring "giant," Clyde Lovellette, to a mere 13 points, one of the lowest totals Lovellette has garnered in his entire college career.

In that contest the Cyclones once led the eventual Big Seven champs and NCAA titlists late in the fourth quarter, only to lose by a scant five points.

The Cyclone cagers habitually have held All-American Lovellette to fewer markers on the average than any other club.

A top scoring highlight of the season, despite the fact that the Cyclones didn't win, was the battle with the Stanford Indians at Kansas City. Stanford won the tilt, 103-102, but the Cyclone total was the largest one an Iowa State squad has ever amassed. Stange and Hess each dumped in 27 points in that game.

Tankers Have Record Year But Miss Loop Crown

Splashing its way through another record-smashing season, the Iowa State swimming squad marched to five dual meet wins against one loss, but was nosed out in the Big Seven loop race.

The tankmen ran their undefeated string in conference dual meets to twenty-two. However, the team failed to have the depth necessary to retain the conference crown. In the Big Seven meet at Lincoln, Coach Jack McGuire's tankers grabbed off nine blue ribbons, but Oklahoma, with five firsts, gained the victory on second, third and fourth place wins.

Iowa State stopped the Sooners earlier in the season in a dual meet, 47-42, but the Oklahomans' depth was too much in the loop meet that saw a new record set in every event.

Michigan State stopped the Cyclones to open the year, 54-39, as the tankers' only loss.



SWIMMING

Despite the Cyclones' loss to the Spartans, one of the top teams in the country, McGuire was pleased with the performance of his paddlers. Sprint ace Brown nosed out the Spartans' Scholes, NCAA champion, in the 60-yard free style event to gain revenge for his loss to Scholes in the NCAA meet last year. Four Iowa Staters and two Michigan State swimmers splashed to new records.

Nine marks fell as the Cyclone splashers won their first meet of the year over DePaul, 54-35. Six went to Iowa State swimmers, as ISC won seven of the ten events, including both relays.

Nebraska's Cornhuskers were the next Cyclone victims, as ISC outpaddled them, 71-22, taking a blue ribbon in every event. Only the 60-yard free style meet standard remained unbroken after the meet, the home tankers having smashed eight meet marks.

The Cyclones kept on the victory trail by next toppling Colorado's tankers, 70-23. As was the case in the meet with Nebraska a week earlier, the Cyclone crew splashed in with every first place and gave up only three second places. McGuire used his regulars sparingly, but still five meet marks fell.

Oklahoma's eventual loop titlists and the Kansas tank team became the last two Cyclone victims. Oklahoma fell, 47-42, and Kansas 64-28.

Then came the conference meet at Lincoln and Coach McGuire barely missed his sixth consecutive loop crown in as many tries.

Bob Brown, senior sprint ace, had another record-smashing year. Brown, who holds the NCAA records in the 60 and 100-yard free style for the 20-yard pool, spent the year shooting to break his own records.

Lee Anderson and Russ Thomas, junior backstroke and distance stars, respectively, paddled to many new marks, as did yearling breast-stroker Mike LaMair. Gone next year will be valuable men like Lindgren, Brown, Tholl, Nielsen and Maine, but the yearlings who gained experience in '52 should be able to take up the slack.

Coach McGuire will, however, have many stellar tank performers, such as Thomas, Anderson, Holan, LaMair, Ervin, Patterson, Thornberg, Ervin, Lucas, Johnson and transfer student Best still in the fold to form a nucleus of veterans for the '53 tankers.

Two ISC Matmen Win Loop Titles—Team Second

The Cyclone wrestling squad, under the guidance of veteran coach Hugo Otopalik, rang up a 1952 record of six wins against two losses in dual match competition.

The Cardinal and Gould grapplers annexed more firsts and seconds in the pre-season Iowa State Teachers Invitational than any other team.

With two individual loop champions, heavyweight Mel Waldon and 177-pounder Bob Wirlds, Iowa State finished in the runner-up spot in the Big Seven Conference meet.

Four lettermen greeted Otopalik upon the season's outset. The dual meet season opened with an ISC win over Grinnell. Getting in the mood, the grapplers slapped strangle holds on Minnesota, Wisconsin, Kansas State, South Dakota State and Nebraska. However, losses to Oklahoma and Iowa State Teachers broke the string. Otopalik felt his team had made a fine record.

The team played host to the U.S. Olympic tryouts, April 17-19. Otopalik is the wrestling representative of the U.S. to the games.

Big Jack Erickson, who was ineligible for the regular season, being a transfer student, became the first Cyclone grappler to qualify for the final tryouts here in the preliminaries held at Chicago.

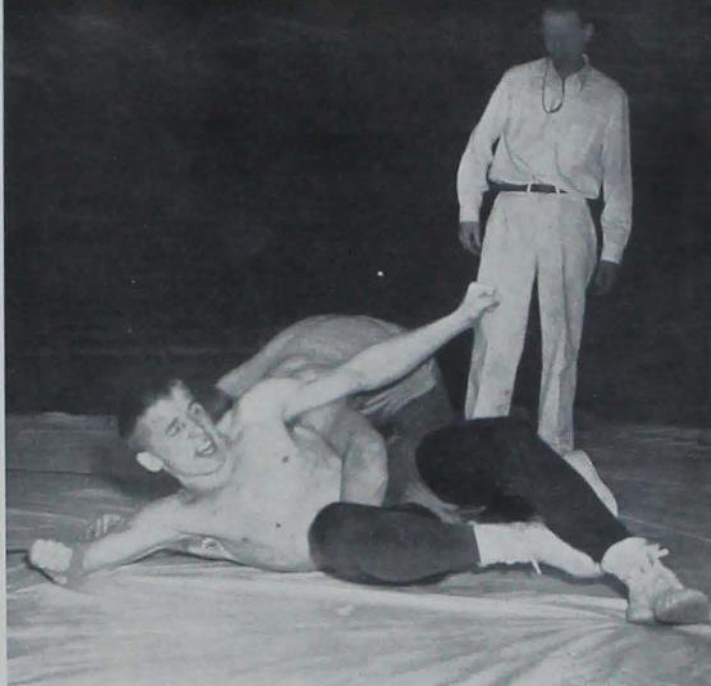

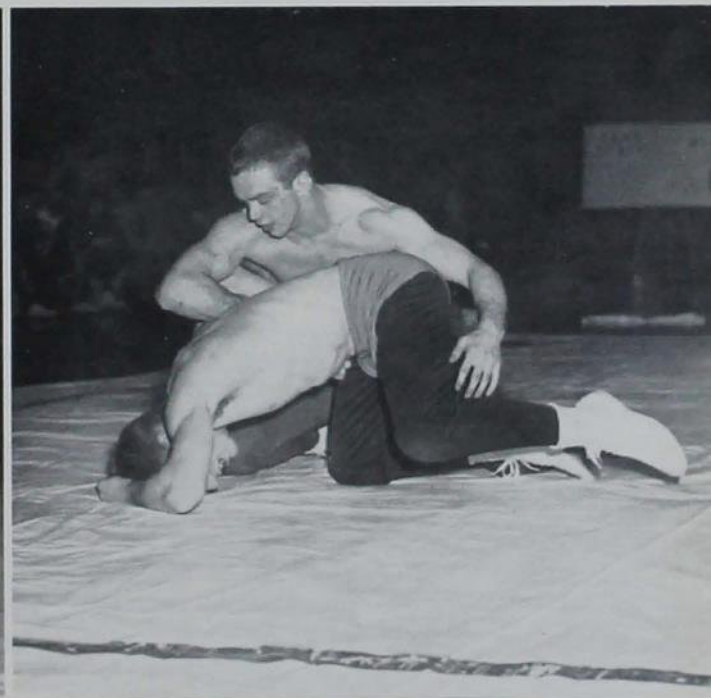

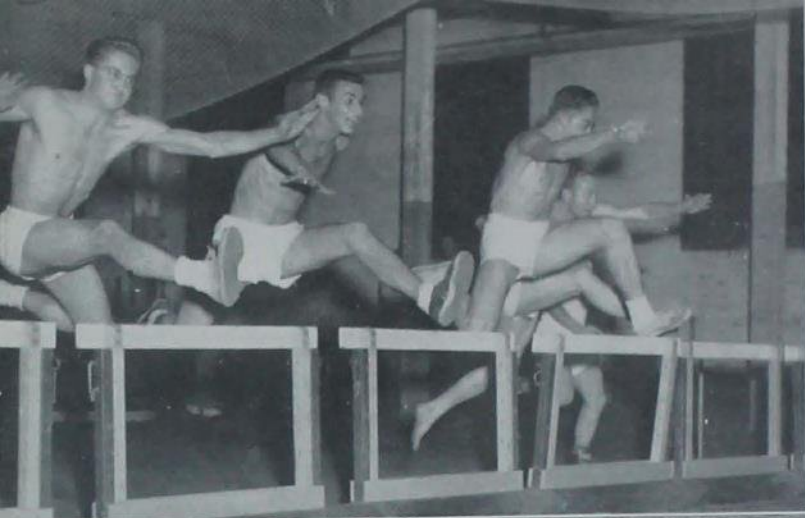

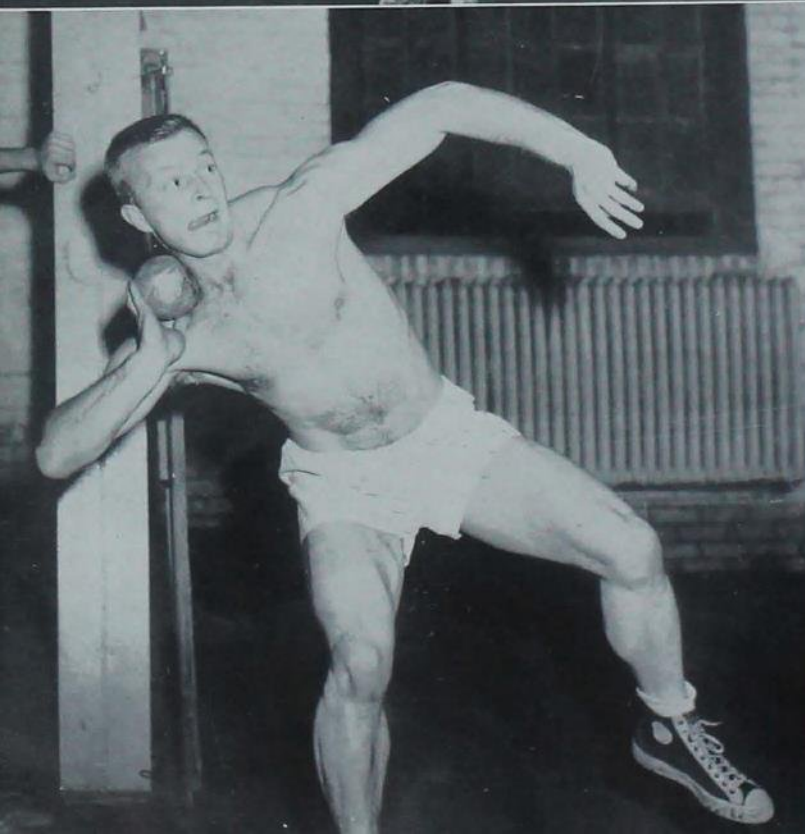

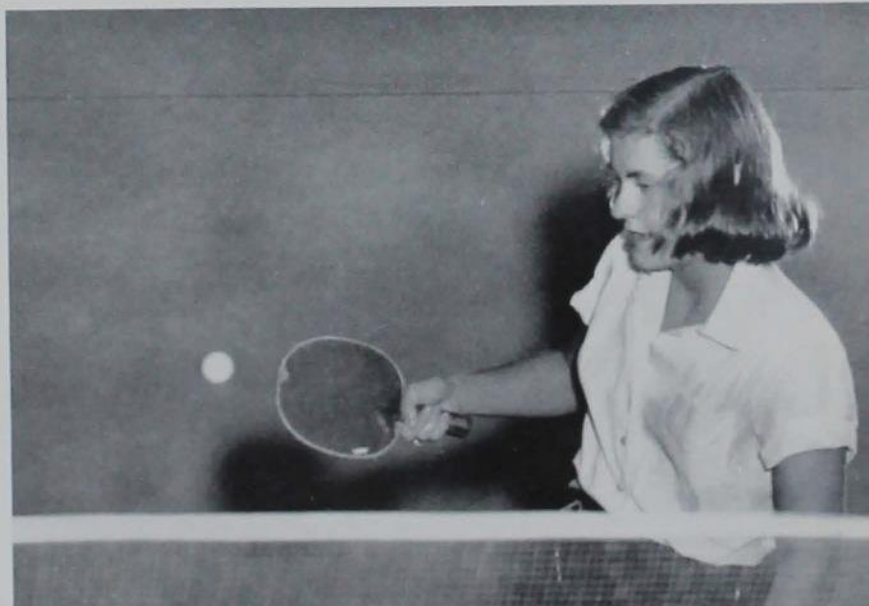

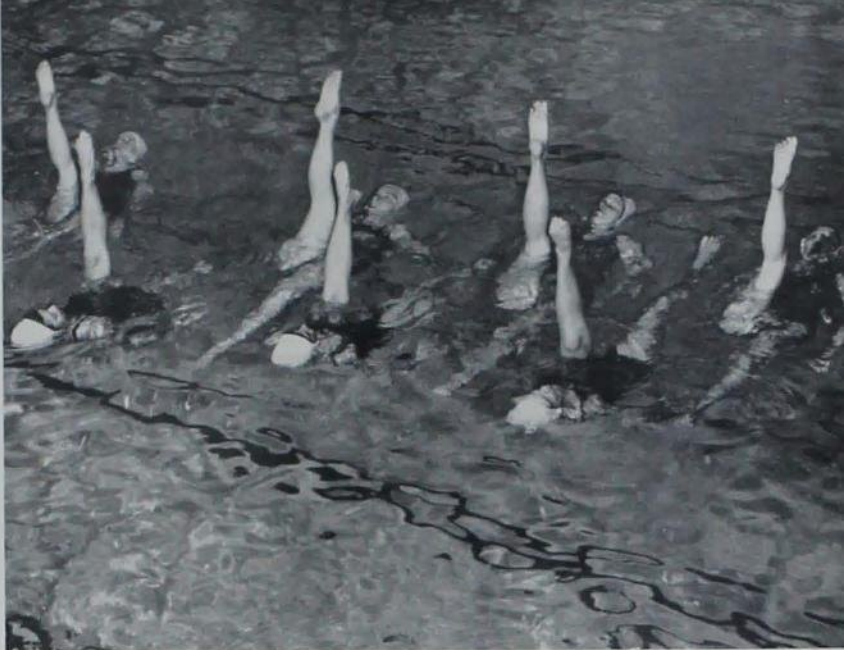
In the fall there was a big play day for the freshmen and transfers. WAA Council put on skits to tell about the activities of the various member clubs.

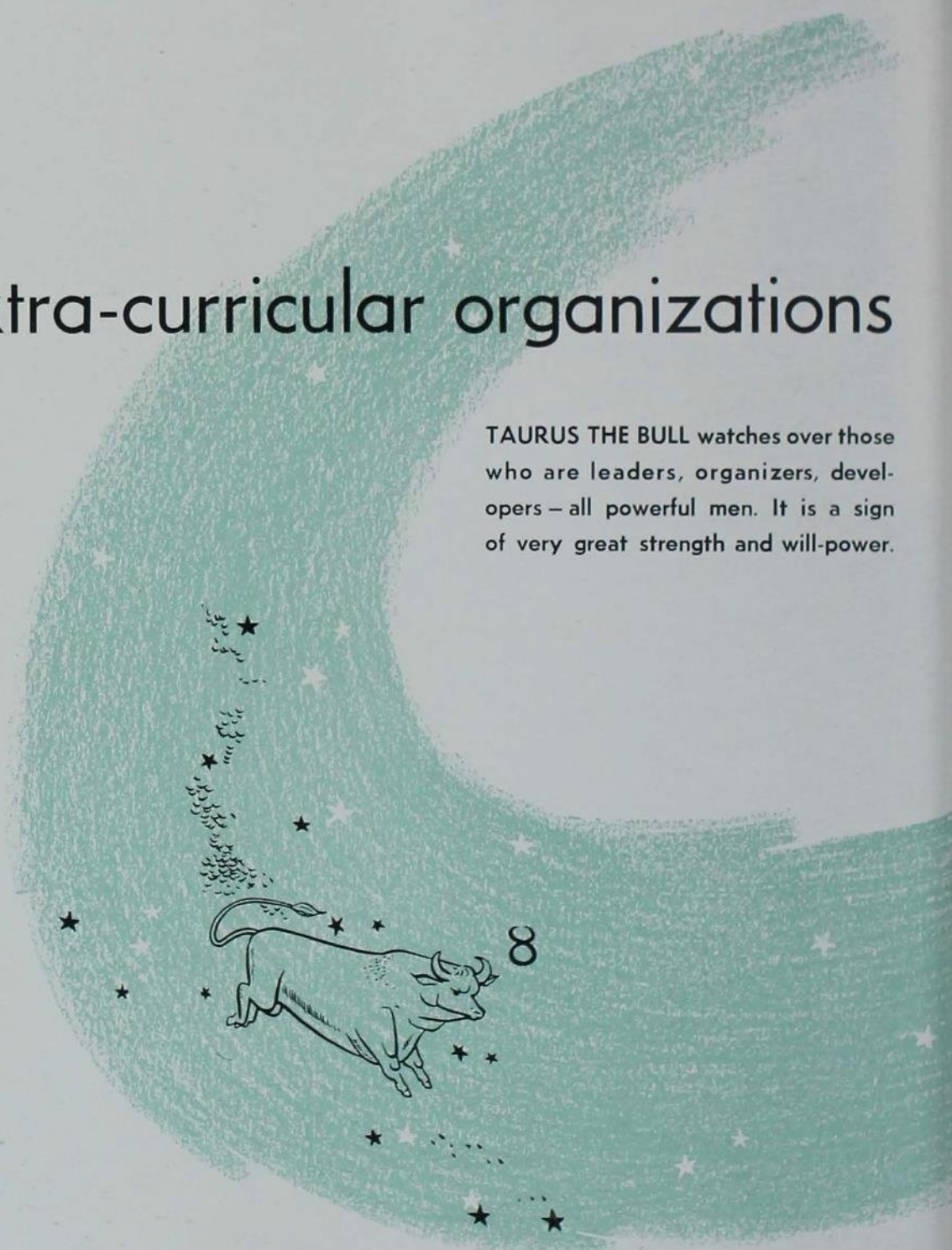

Head "designer" was Walter Hotchkiss, who steered the architects and landscape architects.

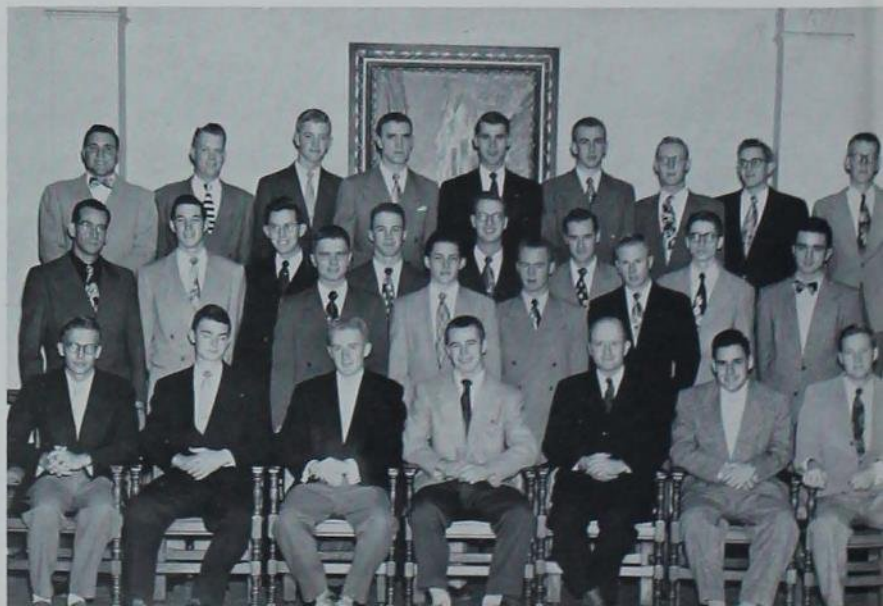
Phi Eta Sigma — Brains

Another Honor: Service to the Alumni Fund

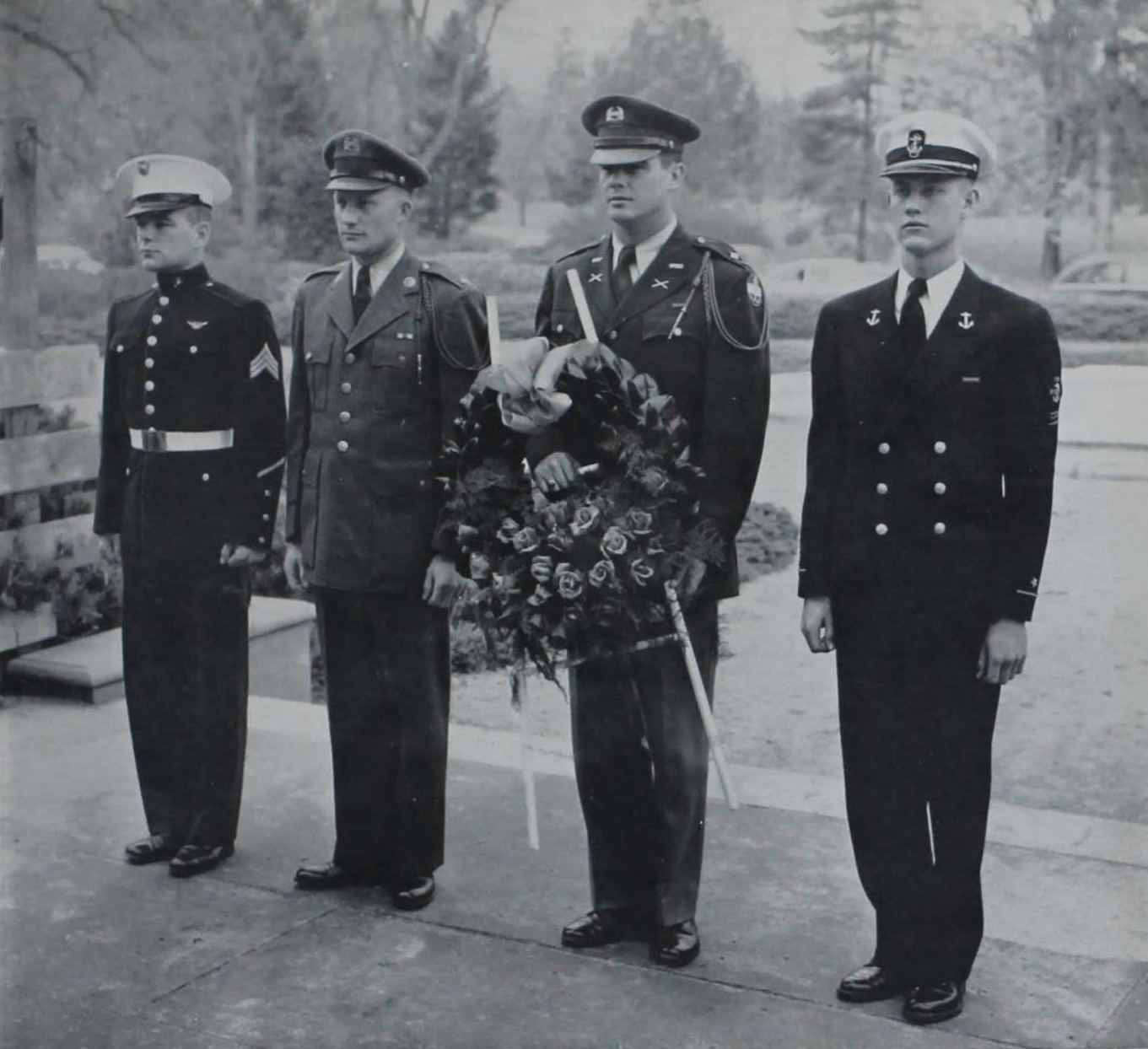

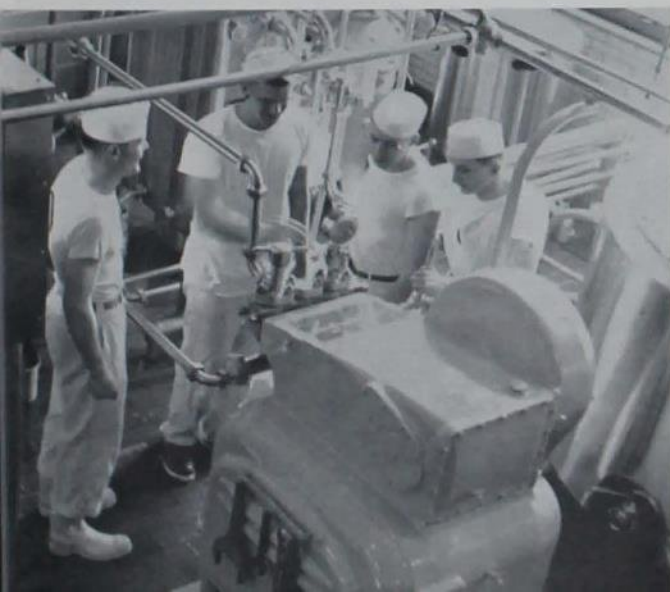

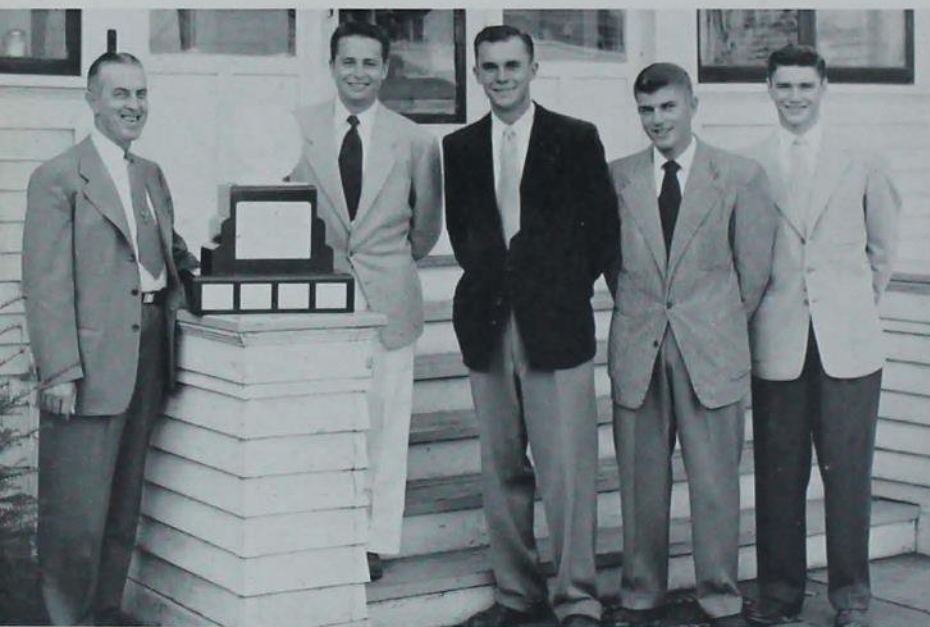
A campfire under the stars was the scene for the annual club stag. Members reminisced about their summer activities as forest rangers or loggers in the mountains.

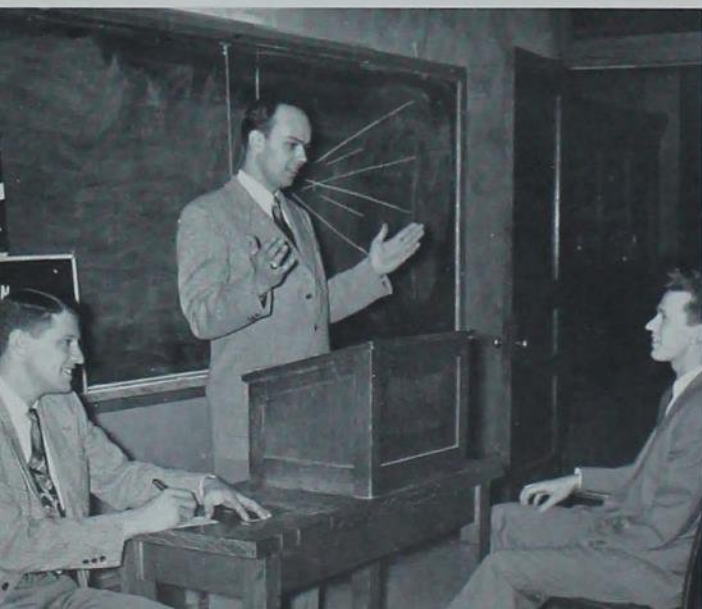

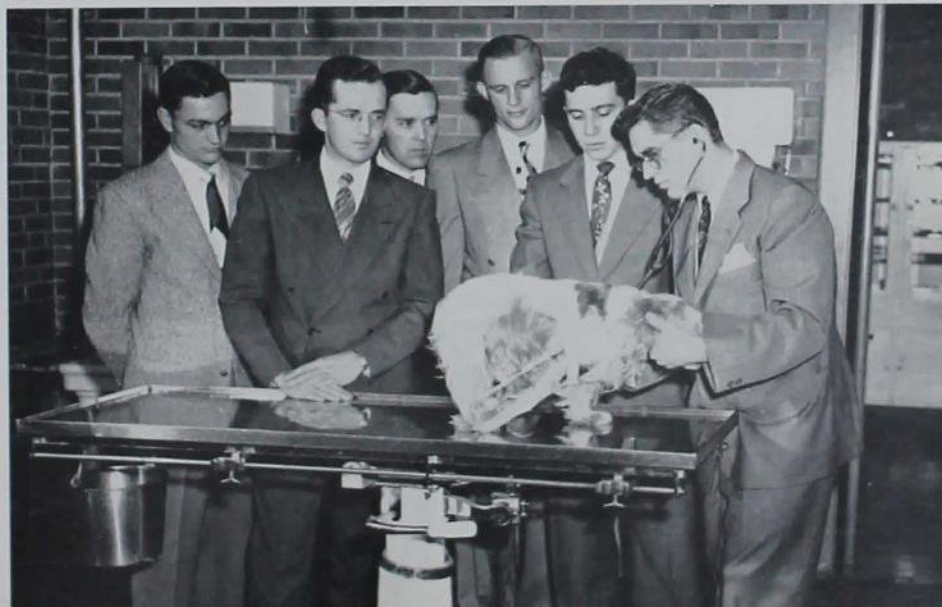

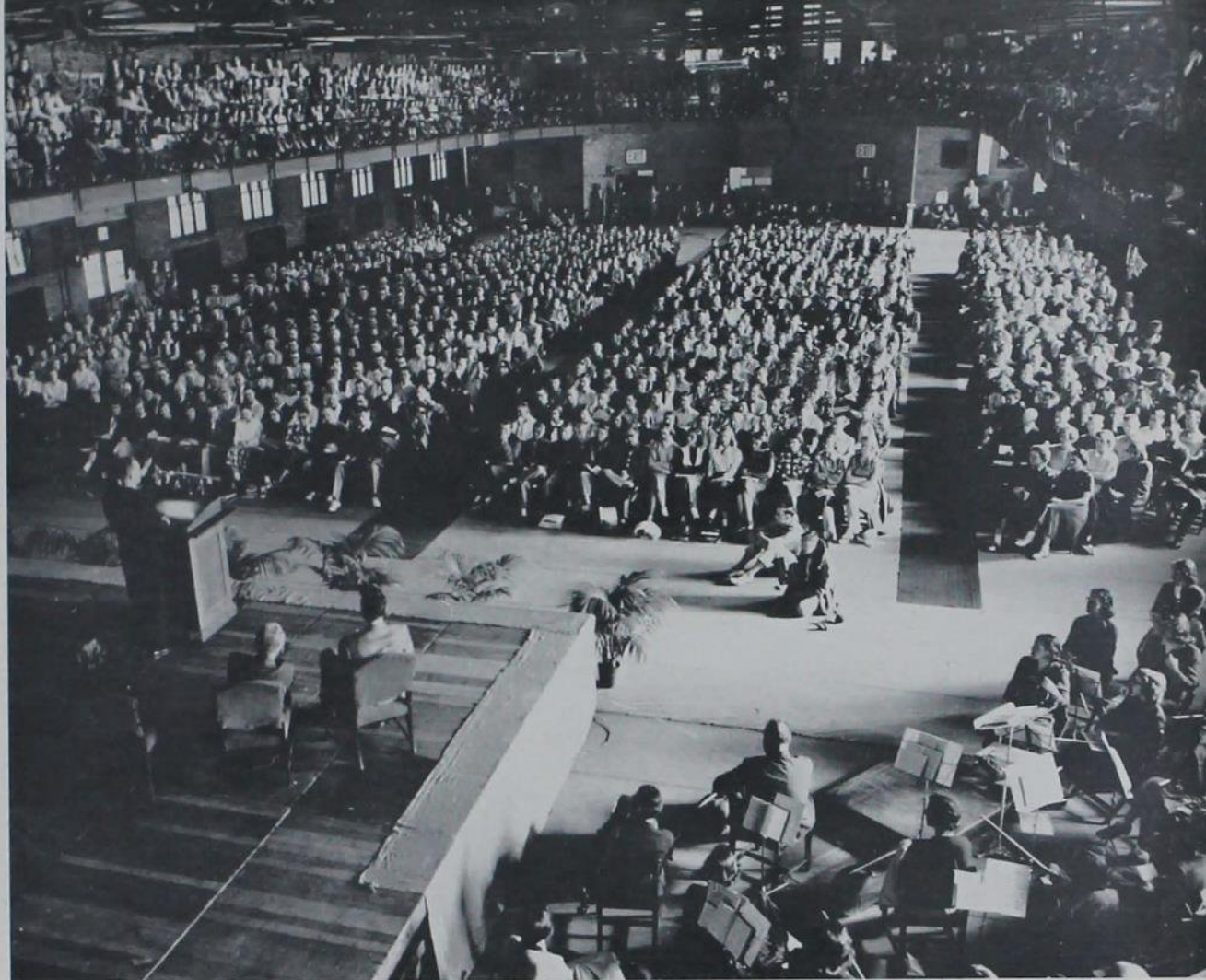
Religion in Life . . . "Strength for Years to Come"

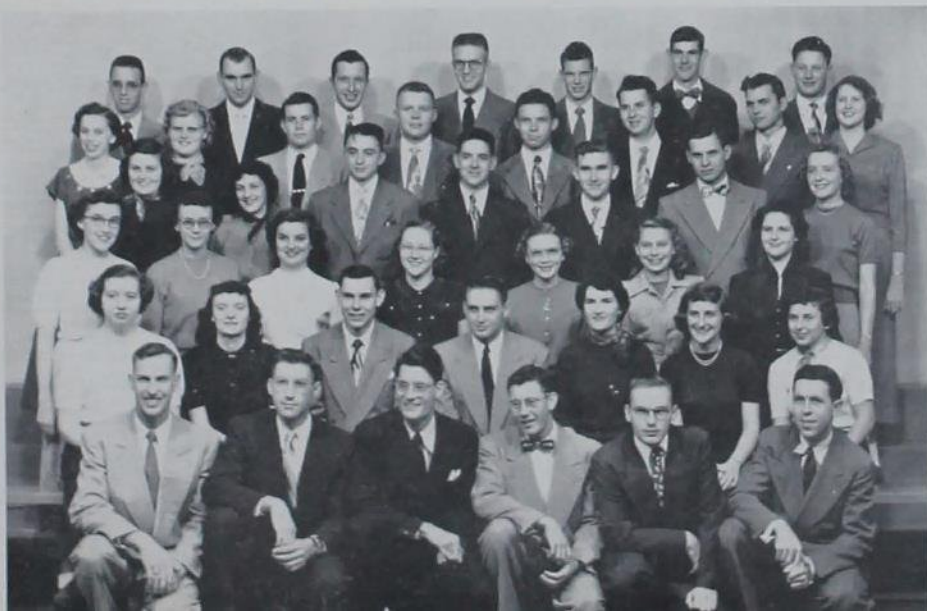
Bethany out to Ledges

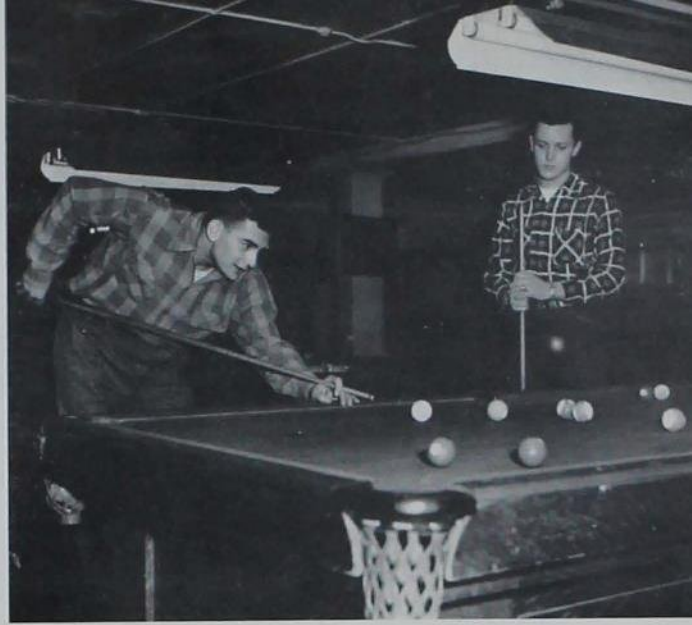
During the Christmas vacation nine members went to Lawrence, Kansas to attend the sixteenth Student Volunteer Quadrennial.

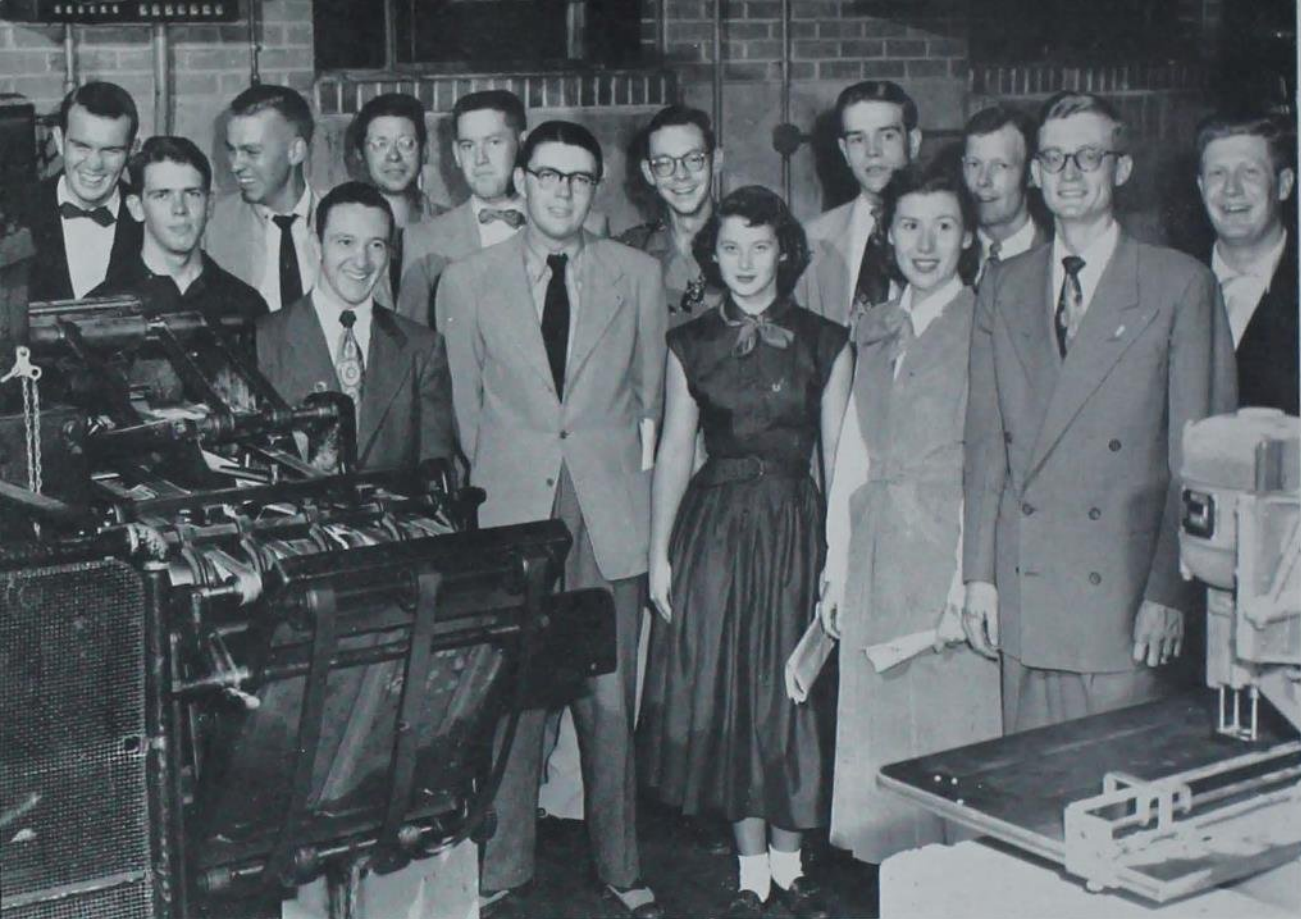

The journalism 221 and 222 students trembled in their boots when Rod Fox announced in class that there would be a news quiz. An announcement at the first of winter quarter that the seating arrangement would be reversed alarmed people that had slept through the previous quarter's class and would now have to stay awake.

A typical day in the business office of the *Iowa State Daily*? Rare indeed. The business office was always a beehive of activity with ad salesmen and staff members buzzing around looking for that last bit of advertising. To the outside observer the office was in a chaotic condition, but in reality everyone knew just what he was supposed to do.

Rod Hanchett, business manager, kept the paper in production during fall quarter. When he graduated, Lloyd Kline, former advertising manager, took over for the rest of the year. Both the editorial and business staffs were the best of friends, but when the pages for the next day's *Daily* were passed out to be filled with copy, one would have thought that they were the bitterest enemies. The editors always accused the business staff of giving blank pages to them on the day they had no news. On the days when news lay heavy in the copy basket, the pages were always loaded with ads.

On Valentine's Day the students pushed and shoved in line for "Modern Screen." Glamour shots, Hollywood style, as well as take-offs on typical cinema publicity stories, were featured in the issue. This parody of national movie magazines was a well viewed and discussed topic.

Most of the students wondered which road the campus magazine of wit and humor would travel next. The *Green Gander* staff, trying to please both the students and censors, might well have been compared to a novice walking a tight rope without a net below.

Iowa Engineer Shows No Shades of Shamrocks

The dramatic arts program at Iowa State has grown as varied and nearly as extensive as the theatre programs found on liberal arts campuses. Sponsored by the Department of English and Speech, the Iowa State College Theatre was composed of three closely knit units — the Iowa State Players, the Laboratory Theatre, and the Film Theatre. Professor Frank E. Brandt was the faculty director of the ISC Theatre.

To gain a better perspective of the scope of the college theatre program, let's look at the three subdivisions, starting with the Iowa State Players. Their goal was to bring to the college the "best in theater." Those who didn't see "The Madwomen of Chaillot," "The Glass Menagerie," or "Harvey" missed some superb acting.

Unknown to the audience who attended "The Glass Menagerie," the cast and workers were caught in its spell of sympathy. The properties committee changed the scene in absolute cold silence.

"The Madwoman of Chaillot" displayed much hidden talent in its large cast. Imaginations ran wild in this elegant success of both dignity and poetry. Costuming of the cast, which represented the various classes in France, presented the greatest problem.

Players' membership was over two hundred and had steadily climbed by spring quarter. Active members were chosen on the basis of outstanding contributions and work. Last year, instead of making the annual trip to Des Moines to see a play, a Players' banquet was held in the spring.

The Laboratory Theatre was devoted to the production of new plays and of old classics staged in experimental ways. One of its recent experiments was an arena style presentation of Moliere's famous comedy, "The Miser."

In March, 1952, a new historical play centering about the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, "The Last Act," was produced by the Lab Theatre. In the form of "a play within a play" it featured a condensed version of a portion of "Our American Cousin," the comedy Lincoln saw the night he was killed at the theatre. The assassination was authentically re-enacted at the historically correct spot in that comedy. "The Last Act" was written by Walter Adams, a graduate of Iowa State.

The third element was the Film Theatre which brought outstanding silent pictures, early sound films and good foreign productions to the campus on 16 mm. film. Comedy, drama, satire, animated color cartoon features — all were offered. Seven films were shown each quarter.

Most of the debaters took part in the visits to communities within a one hundred mile radius. A group of three or four would go to Rural Youth, Rotary, Kiwanis, and other meetings to present a program of current interest to the audience. This gave them a chance to speak before a group and, of course, to enjoy the dinners which were always served first.

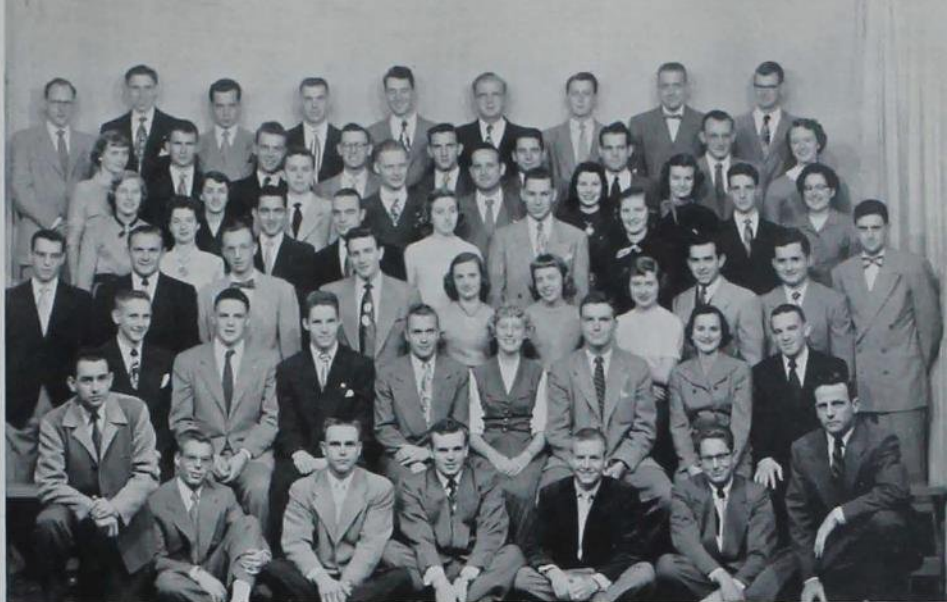


the Union Board pushed the buttons and pulled the strings to keep the works running smoothly.

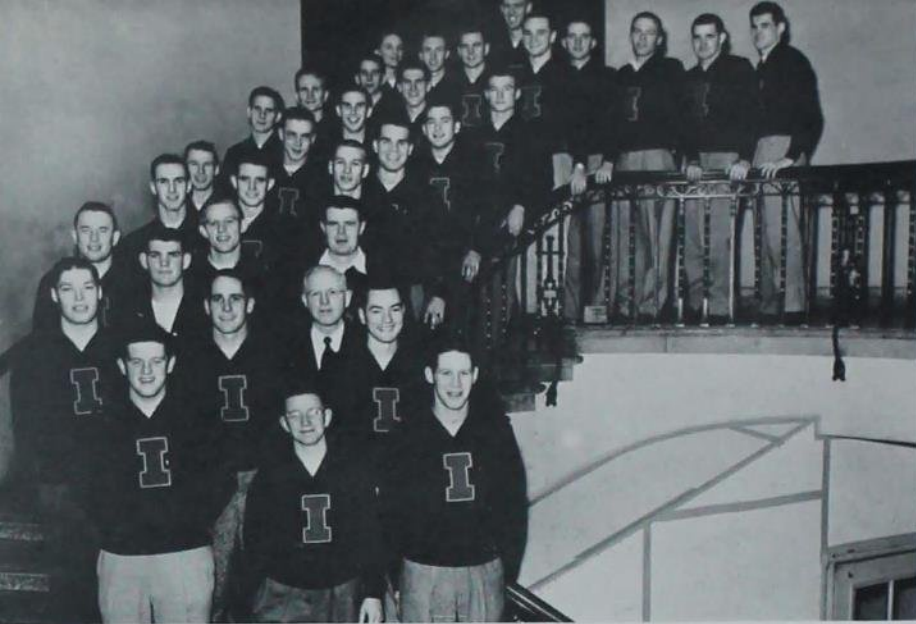

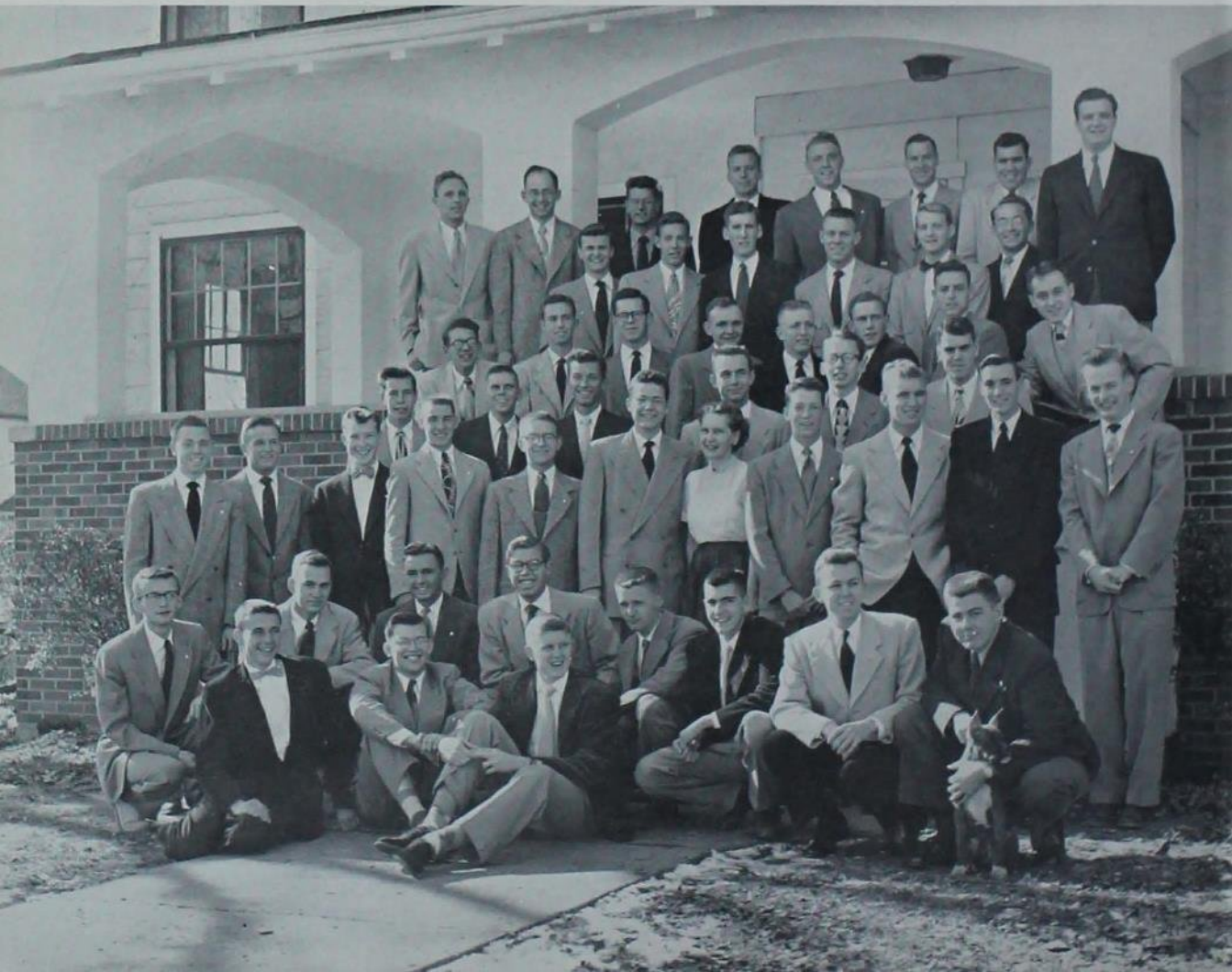
Delta Tau Delta "Conquereth All"

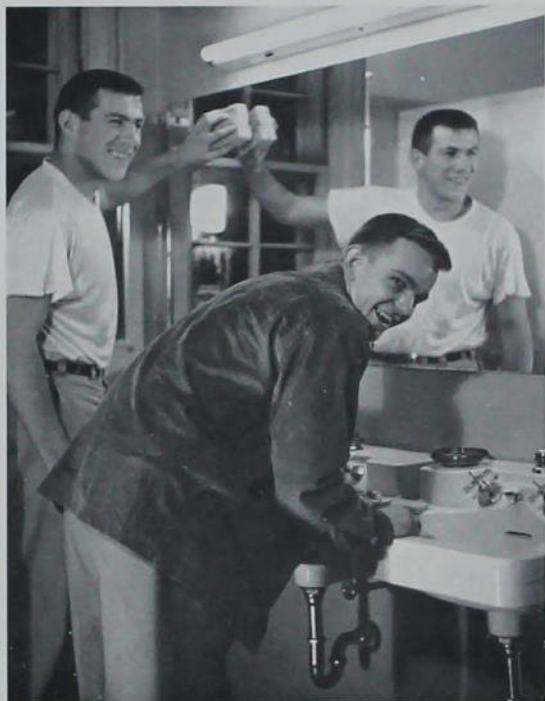

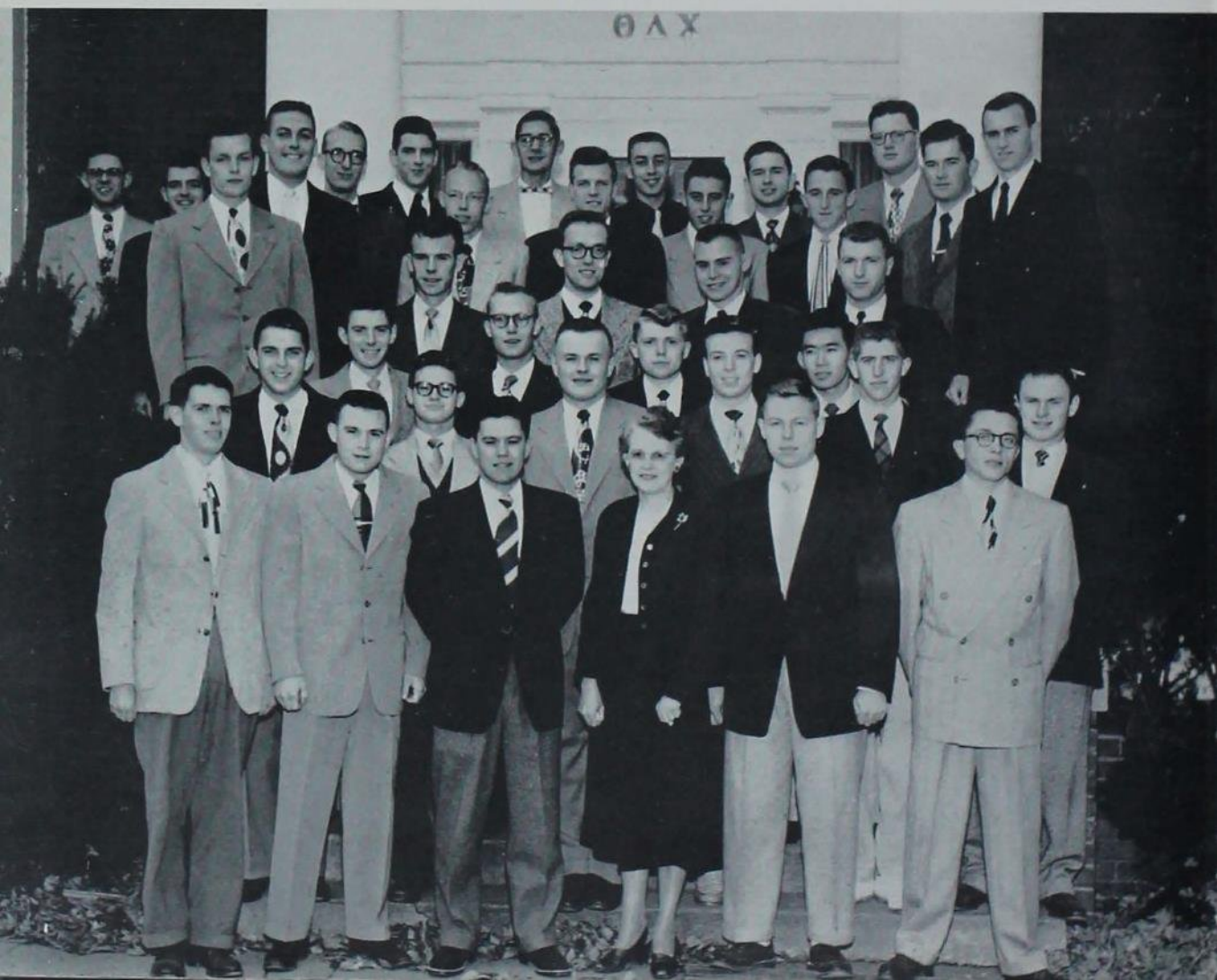


Theta Delts . . . Terrific Travel Twirl

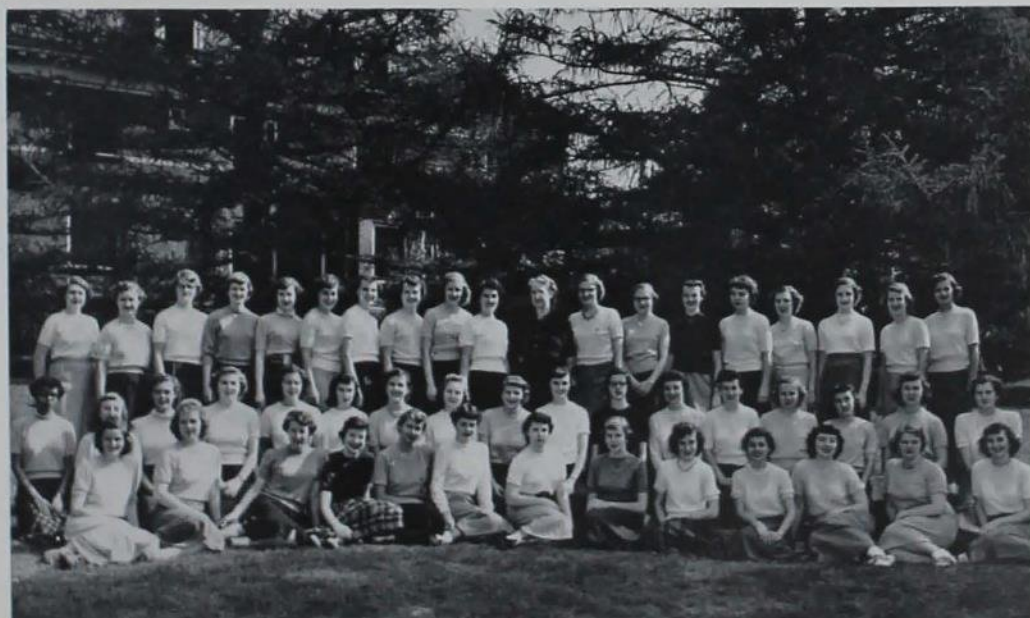

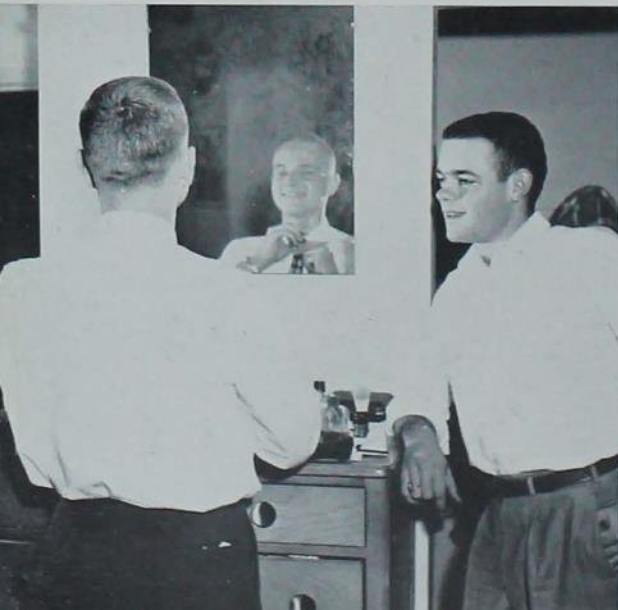

And Pearson House Won Again!

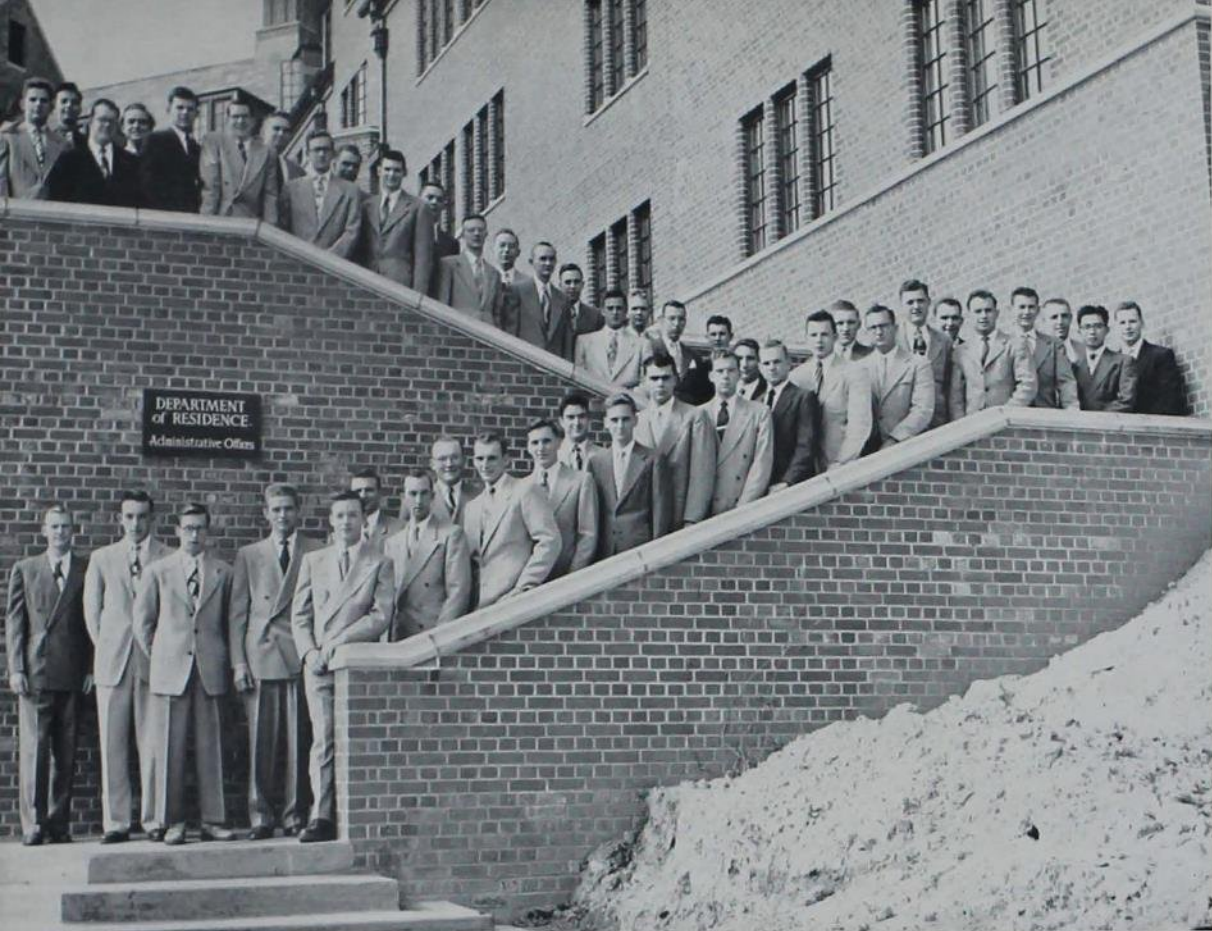
