



of '36 were to pay a visit to his college home, it is likely he would wonder what impressive new college had grown up in place of the ISC he knew. Upon second glance he would see the source of his confusion to be the numerous new buildings constructed in his absence. He would marvel at the massive addition to Friley Hall making it one of the largest men's dormitories in the world. The modern architecture of the Electrical Engineering and Agronomy buildings would leave him breathless with their beauty. And a trip to the Atomic Research Institute would convince the student his alma mater was still among the leaders in the field.

The first educationally owned and operated television station, WOI-TV, with its special new building, would interest our visitor. He would be told the foresight of Dr. Friley had made this venture into the field of educational entertainment possible. Included on our guest's tour would be the two new duplex Home Management houses where Home Economics students learn the most efficient ways to manage and care for a family. He would want to see the modern new Foods and Nutrition kitchens where potential homemakers and professional home economists are trained. Also attracting the attention of our visitor would be the numerous temporary buildings constructed during the post-war years to handle the influx of homecoming veterans. Before our guest's departure, he would be convinced that under Dr. Friley Iowa State has become one of the foremost leaders in the field of technical education and research.








Veishea

"The greatest Veishea ever!" This statement has been made annually for the last 30 years when speaking of I S C's traditional spring festival. Each year Veishea gets bigger and better — and the Veishea of '52 was no exception. At this point an explanation is in order to those unfamiliar with Veishea. Some may ask whether it's an educational open house, a dance, or perhaps a parade and jubilee. The answer is that Veishea is all of these. The first Veishea, in 1922, was primarily a departmental display of student work for visitors. But each year the students have added something new to the event until it has grown to be the largest student-managed festival in the world. This year over 3500 students took an active part in the Veishea presentation — starting work on the project as far as eight months in advance. Iowa State was given an opportunity to "show her colors" and they couldn't have been shown more brilliantly.

Cecil B. DeMille, distinguished Hollywood movie producer, made the trip to Ames by plane to get Veishea officially underway with a talk at Opening Ceremonies.

DeMille took time from his busy schedule on the coast to discuss higher education in conjunction with the Veishea theme, "Spirit of Leadership." The speaker was introduced by President Charles E. Friley, who presented him with a scroll from Tau Sigma Delta, honorary fraternity in architecture and landscape design.

The presentation to DeMille of a plaque made in his likeness by Prof. Christian Petersen, noted Iowa State sculptor, was a special honor accorded the guest.

Another distingushed guest was Governor William S. Beardsley, who crowned Garol Fisher as Veishea Queen of Queens. The queen and her attendants were announced by a fanfare of trumpets and escorted to their thrones by members of Scabbard and Blade.

As DeMille set affame the 1952 Torch of Higher Education, an aerial bomb was set off on central campus, announcing the formal opening of Veishea to the surrounding area.

Stars Over Veishea and Veishea Vodvil





The 1952 Homecoming celebration was off to a chilly but spectacular start as over 4,000 students, alumni, and guests witnessed an array of song and dance routines, quartets, hillbilly bands, and pajama relays at the annual Pep Barbecue Friday night. The climax of the event was the coronation of the 1952 Pep Queen, Sue Moore, and her attendants, Mary Weatherhead and Mariann Schonemann. Gib Stanek had the honor of being the first Pep King crowned at Iowa State. The King and Queen were again introduced that night during intermission of the opening dance in the combined ballrooms of Memorial Union, Ralph Marterie and his band providing musical accompaniment.

The weatherman had a change of heart on Saturday as he offered a beautiful day composed of warm temperatures and sunny skies. Many of the 16,000 spectators at the football game came away with sunburned noses, obtained as they watched the Cyclones bow to the weight, speed, and maneuverability of the Colorado Buffaloes.

Alums were entertained at planned functions over the week-end. They were addressed by Coach Abe Stuber and Athletic Director Louis Menze at a pre-game luncheon and following the game were guests at a reception for faculty and alums in the state gym. Class reunions were held where members could turn back the calendar and "remember when" with former classmates. Teas were given by sororities and fraternities to give alums a chance to relax in their former college homes.







Union Activities




The student women elected Delores Bauman President of Woman's Day. She presided over the convocation and was main speaker.



Thousands of friends and relatives of graduating seniors fill the Armory, engrossed in the speaker and eagerly awaiting diploma-time.


Graduation






Louis Menze, Athletic Director, observed his silver anniversary in ISC athletics this year. He was appointed Director in '45.



Record Books Fail To Tell Entire Grid Story

With three wins stacked up against six defeats, ISC's football season appears to have been mediocre. However, often matched against superior odds, and plagued with injuries throughout the campaign, the Cyclones always gave the fans what they paid to see — hard, rugged football.

A disheartening note was struck early in the season when a Big Seven eligibility committee ruled transfer Jack Erickson ineligible for future conference competition. Later the rule which terminated the rugged tackle's career was revoked, but not made retroactive.

The ability of the Cyclones to bounce back from a loss with a spirited determination won them the respect of conference opponents. This indomitable spirit was reflected in the last two games of the season. Rebounding from a humilating 41-0 defeat at the hands of Oklahoma, the Cyclones rolled up a record total of points against Drake the following Saturday. The score was 55-7. Then they went on to post an impressive 27-0 victory over Kansas State, clinching sixth spot in the conference standings.

ISC, 57-So. Dak. State, 19

Opening the season in royal style, ISC blasted the South Dakota Jackrabbits 57-19. The Cyclones calmly opened the scoring with a safety, then slammed their offense into high speed, and rammed home eight TD's.

Quarterback Dick Mann kept the Jackrabbits in a state of complete confusion as he cleverly mixed his effective passing (good for three TD's) with a smooth and well-coordinated ground attack.

The big gun in the Cyclone ground game was halfback Stan Cozzi who smashed his way across the double markers three times.

Illinois, 33-ISC, 7

Illinois started early in the season to establish itself as a football power in the Midwest by defeating Iowa State, 33-7. Departing from Big Seven play and venturing into Big Ten competition, the Cyclones were unable to cope with Illinois' potent passing attack and stellar pass defense. However, statistics proved that the inspired Cyclones outgained the Big Ten team on the ground.

ISC's lone tally came late in the fourth quarter. An 18-yard pass from Plantan to Congiardo placed the ball on the 2-yard line and Burkett smashed over for the TD.

A limping but defiant Iowa State crew went down before Nebraska, 16-0, lacking needed punch when touchdowns were within reach. Iowa State stopped fancy Bob Reynolds, all-American in '51, but George Cifra took up the slack with his 8-yard rushing average.

Barney Alleman's timely punting and Max Burkett's sayage linebacking checked the spirited Cornhusker offense. A big gap in the forward wall was caused when a conference committee ruled standout tackle, Jack Erickson ineligible, for the rest of the season.

Kansas, 46-ISC, 0

Fumbles and erratic passing, fused with a powerful Kansas football machine, proved to be too big a combination for the injury-riddled Cyclones. Iowa State bowed to K.U. 46-0.

ISC showed its only offensive spark of the game in the second half when the team rammed, sliced, and passed 80 yards to the Jayhawk 4-yard line — only to lose the ball by fumbling.

Bill Wilson, Keith Hemingway, and Stan Cozzi, along with Alleman's reliable punting toe, partially halted KU's scoring assault.

Colorado, 21-ISC, 12

What started out to be a rout completely reversed itself, as ISC came back from a scoreless half determined to win. Sophomore Bill Plantan quarterbacked his mates across the double stripes twice in the second half, causing the final tally to read 21-12. It appeared to be a different squad Coach Abe Stuber fielded for the second thirty against the powerful invaders. As a result the visitors had their hands full proving they belonged on the same turf with the inspired Cyclones.

ISC led in statistics, but games are still decided by points, and another loss was added.

Missouri, 19-ISC, 0

In an attempt to thwart conference-leading Missouri, Coach Abe Stuber molded together a powerful Iowa State defense. The stubborn Cyclones held the driving Tigers scoreless for nearly three quarters before finally yielding. In the first half Missouri repeatedly hammered at the ISC line, twice driving within the 10-yard stripe, but the mulish Cyclones held.

It wasn't until late in the third quarter that mighty Mizzou broke the ice, with two consecutive long marches ending in TD's. Adding another in the final period, MU went on to wrap up the game, 19-0.

Oklahoma, 41—ISC, 0


"Hold that line," was the chant that echoed across the stadium all afternoon as powerful Oklahoma flexed its unbeaten muscles and posted its 33rd straight conference win, 41-0.

Recovering from a three-touchdown barrage in the initial quarter, the Cyclones came surging back in the opening of the second fifteen with a sustained march of 78 yards which was halted just one short yard from pay-dirt. Bill Plantan, Paul Shupe, and Dick Cherpinsky sparked the only offensive threat the Cyclones could muster. Plantan took over as generalissimo after Dick Mann was viciously blocked and sidelined for the season with a broken leg.

Led by a pair of All-Americans, halfback Billy Vessels and fullback Buck McPhail, the Sooners from the South proved why they deserved the ranking as the number three teamin the nation.



ISC, 55—Drake, 7

Iowa State closed its home schedule in booming fashion by crushing Drake, 55-7. The Cyclones rolled up a record total of points in handing the Bulldogs the worst beating in the history of the long series.

Capitalizing on fumbles and stolen passes, the Cyclones wasted little time in tallying three times in the initial quarter, first on a short slant by Cherpinsky, and then on two Plantan passes; one to Alleman and the other to Hemingway. Plunges by Eichorn and Cherpinsky added two more in the second period, leaving a 34-7 half-time margin.

The second half was repetition of the first, with the exception of the manner of scoring. Sprints replaced aerials and plunges, and the scoring rolls kept moving. Eichorn sprinted 40 yards for one; Cozzi galloped 60 for another; and Cherpinsky bulled his way over from 11 yards out for his third.

ISC, 27 - K-State, 0

Iowa State climbed out of the cellar spot in the Big Seven with a 27-0 walk over the boys from K-State. Relying mainly upon a ground attack, the Cyclones came through with their best game of the season.


Eichorn climaxed a 71-yard drive when he smashed over for the first Cyclone TD of the afternoon. A Plantan pass was good for the extra point. Number two was set up when Shupe hauled back a punt to the Wildcats' 27. ISC battered near the goal and Plantan slipped over. The 3rd seven found Spence falling on a K-State fumble behind the goal, and Clendening booting the conversion.

Going into the second half, K-State made its sole bid with a series of long passes. However, the threat ended with an Iowa State interception. To add the finishing touches, Congiardo sneaked away from Wildcat tacklers, and pranced 50 yards for the final TD.

Offensive minded, basketball team sets record


Iowa State's 1952-53 basketball team was termed as the "best scoring team we ever had," by Coach Clayton (Chick) Sutherland. The Cyclones had an offense average of 71.5 points per game and set a new scoring record in the Armory for ISC basketball squads to shoot for in the future.

The cagers ran up a grand total of 93 points for the record in their last home game of the season on March 2. They beat rugged Nebraska 93-66.

The Cyclones finished the season with 10 wins and 11 losses in one of the toughest conference battles of recent years. Iowa State had some difficulty in winning games on its home floor, as did other Big Seven teams, and the season saw most of the league wins on "away" courts for the Cardinal and Gold.

ISC ended the season in a fourth-place tie in the conference with Oklahoma. Both clubs owned a league record of 5 wins and 7 losses.

The Cyclones had the usual disappointments and the good games of any season. The cagers stood out when they battled to an 81-79 loss to a great Kansas State basketball team.

Basketball

Although Iowa State's cage quintet had an almost even record for the season, the fans were treated to some of the best basketball playing in the Midwest. Cyclones Delmar Diercks and Sammy Long put on some outstanding exhibitions during the season.

"Del" proved to be invaluable to the Cyclones as he set a new scoring record for the school. He rang up a total of 371 points during the season and tucked away 21 ISC scoring records in the process. Senior Sammy Long set a scoring record for a guard by splitting the nets for 247 points. Long was the standout for the Cyclones, not because of his scoring, but for his great ballhandling and dribbling. Carl Van-Cleave also broke the guard scoring record, taking second place.

The Cardinal and Gold fared well in non-conference competition by winning 4 of the 6 games. The Cyclones lost to Drake in the first meeting of the two clubs, but revenged that loss to the arch rival by beating the Bulldogs on their home floor later in the season.

Center Delmar Diercks was named to the United Press all-Big Seven conference first team and guard Sammy Long was placed on the second team. Iowa State was awarded the annual Sportmanship Basketball award this year. The award is presented each year by the conference.



Cyclone tankers once again successfully defended ISC's swimming reputation, notching a 5-2 dual-meet record and clinching second place in conference rankings.





Lee Anderson took advantage of the first televised ISC swimming meet, and clipped 4/10 of a second from his own NCAA 200-yard back stroke record.

The Cyclones faced their toughest competition of the season when they met a trio of teams from Michigan in mid-season. The road-trip resulted in the only dual-meet losses of the year, as the tankers bowed to Michigan and Michigan State, two of the outstanding collegiate swimming teams in the country. However, Wayne U. felt the full force of ISC swimming power, as Cyclone swimmers swept every event.





Mighty matmen strongest in ISC's history

The Cyclones of 1953 presented one of the strongest and most spirited mat teams in ISC's history. The grapplers won nine out of ten dual meets and came in second in the conference meet.

The matmen's only dual meet loss was to the defending national collegiate champs from Oklahoma. The aggressive ISC wrestlers put up a valiant battle, going down in defeat against the well-balanced southern team that boasted five individual loop champs.

Bob Wirds, outstanding 177-pounder for the Cyclones, was noted throughout the nation as being the best in his weight. He was the only Cardinal and Gold wrestler to win a Big Seven individual crown. Mel Waldon, Don Larsen, and Capt. Sam Ruzic took Big Seven seconds.

The Sooners were again dominant in the loop meet, but the ISC matmen placed four men in the finals. The Cyclones gain some consolation in the fact that six varsity men will be returning for next year. Wirds, a senior, was wrestling for his last year, and Lou Oscarson, 130-pounder, was lost to the armed services at the end of the season.

The Iowa State wrestlers made one of their best showings of the season when they defeated Oklahoma A&M 16-11. This was the second time in a long rivalry that the Cyclones had been able to overpower the Aggies.



Baseball

The Cyclone baseball squad wound up season's play with a 6-6 conference record, good for a .500 average and number four spot in the Big Seven standings. However, outside the Big Seven, the diamond men met with less success, ending the season with a 9-10 record.

Dropping five straight at the start of the season, the Cyclones shook off opening season jitters and settled down to play heads-up conference ball. At times their play was quite erratic, reflected in the season's statistics. The Iowa State nine won five out of eight contests with upper division teams and lost three out of four against clubs in the bottom half of the league.

Although the squad posted only an average record, their spirit and hustle demanded respect from each of their opponents.

With the return of seven lettermen, ISC's prospects for next year's season look bright. Although next year's club will lack an experienced mound staff, all-around speed and power at the plate should compensate for it.

Iowa State's indoor track squad, coached by Burl Berry, finished the 1953 season with a record of one win and two defeats in dual meet competition. The lone victory was over Minnesota, while the losses came at the hands of Missouri and Drake.

The team placed third in a triangular meet with Kansas State and Colorado, and seventh in the conference meet at Kansas City. Although the Cyclones were last in the Big Seven, they were only one point away from fifth.

The squad was severely hampered with injuries and sickness throughout the season, every man on the squad being on the sick list at least once during the year.

Combining this year's winning frosh squad with returning lettermen, next year's record should greatly improve. With the advent of spring and warm weather, ISC's outdoor cindermen, guided by Coach Burl Berry, moved to outdoor tracks and competed in nationally prominent meets.

Beginning with the Texas Relays at Austin, the Cyclones traveled on to the Kansas and Drake Relays, winding up the season in Norman, Oklahoma, site of the conference meet. Also included in the season's schedule were three dual meets: Drake, Colorado, and Kansas State.

The thinclads lost the trio of dual meets, but received some consolation in the K-State meet when Harold Rhode beat the Big Seven dash champ, Thane Baker. No school awards were presented at the Relays, excepting the Big Seven meet, because all three featured individual competition. At the conference meet, muscular Jim Robertson successfully defended his discus title, and Harold Rhode took second in the 100. Twelve returning lettermen brighten next year's prospects.

Led by Captain Dan McEachran, the squad developed rapidly as the season wore on, emphasized by their one-point loss to Nebraska for the final dual match of the season.





Time Spells Intramural Expansion at ISC

Iowa State's intramural program had its origin before the turn of the century, when student groups (despite faculty opposition) issued challenges for athletic contests. A party always followed, and the loser paid the bills.

Now, over 55 years later, the program has grown so large that it is recognized as one of the outstanding programs in the country. Under the capable hand of Harry J. Schmidt, the system offers 20 different activities to over 5,000 participating students.

The idea of actually organizing an Iowa State intramural program was first started by the Athletic Department. However, this soon proved to be unsatisfactory when the department began using the set-up as a screen for scouting varsity material, thereby discouraging many students from participating.

After a series of experimental changes, the program evolved to the present system, that of a student-planned administration. Three intramural councils, Ward, Dorm, and Fraternity, meet with Harry Schmidt to discuss and decide the year's policies.

Growth of the ISC intramural program is reflected in last year's intramural basketball season; one hundred and ninety-four teams, involving over 2,000 students, played 464 games.

Fall Sports Program

Iowa State's well-rounded intramural program commenced with the playing of touch football. The school was divided into four classes, fraternity, dormitory, ward and Pammel Court.

Kappa Sigma took the fraternity and allcampus football honors. The fraternity sports triad which includes table tennis, golf and horseshoes was won by Tau Kappa Epsilon. Independents' basketball free throw contest was taken by Hughes Hall and Nu Ward. Volleyball provided the most exciting sport of fall intramurals as Kimball emerged victor in the dorms, Delta in the wards, and Phi Delta Theta in the fraternities.

The swimming competition was run on a dual meet basis with Alpha Tau Omega showing the best tankers. Franklin House emerged as victors in the dormitory section. Dual track, with a record number of competitors, was won by Chamberlain House and Phi Kappa Psi.

swimming title. The tankers from Delta Ward annexed the ward tank title, while Phi Delta Theta paddled its way to the fraternity class A trophy.





WAA Council




Cardinal Key





ROTC

Almost 2000 men are members of Army ROTC at Iowa State College, which offers four branches of military service — artillery, signal corps, engineering and veterinary medicine. College ROTC provides a ready reserve of capable and trained officers for the United States Army Reserve.

Each member of ROTC attends 6 weeks of summer camp in his branch before or after graduation. If attended before graduation, the commission of second lieutenant is received at graduation ceremonies. However, if summer camp is not attended until the summer following graduation, the commission is received at the end of camp.

In the 6 weeks at camp, each member goes through vigorous training for his after-graduation position in the Armed Forces. He is trained both individually and in groups and is given a chance to put his book warfare into practical application.

Military proficiency is the requirement for membership in the Pershing Rifles organization, which now has 80 men. Founded in 1894, its purpose is to further the ideals of military leadership and command which John Joseph Pershing, American general, exemplified.

The group met weekly at the Armory, sponsored the all-college Drill Meet and Pershing Rifles Dance last November. During the year, representatives have been sent to drills and conventions at Ohio State and Nebraska Universities. Spring quarter featured its annual banquet for recognition of outstanding members and the Regimental Military Ball at Nebraska in May.

Company G-2 at Iowa State is the third largest company of the 127 companies in the United States and is still growing. We mustn't forget the "military guard" of Pershing Rifles' pledges on the sorority houses during the men's week of initiation.







Block and Bridle






American Society of Mechanical Engineers

Religion in Life Week




The *Scientist* worked in a broad field; its coverage included all 21 departments of the Division of Science.

This year's band trip was to the University of Nebraska, where it performed at the Iowa State-Nebraska football game.


Membership in the 120-piece band is determined through tryouts. Skill in playing an instrument plus ability to march and follow directions are necessary.

Drama and Speech Activities




General Dramatics

Spring quarter gave the students a group of silent film classics, including the famous "The Passion of Joan of Arc." This film, produced in 1928, represents one of the most significant developments of the French film. "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" brought to the campus one of America's greatest actors, John Barrymore.

These words are taken from the 630 Club constitution and are typical of the attitude of each member.


This organization is comprised of 70 members, one representative from each residence, and it is their job to choose the Athlete of the Week during each school week and the Athlete of the Year each spring.

A 630 Club meeting is in full swing in the Memorial Union.







On the serious side, the council offered a scholastic cup to the pledge class with the highest grade average.








Kappa Alpha Theta


Alpha Chi Rho

Delta Upsilon



Reproductions of French perfume bottles decorated the house for the winter dinner-dance, Le Grande Senteure.











Phi Delta Theta


Pogo "barbecued" the Colorado Buffalo to win first place for the Phi Delts in the fraternity division for Homecoming decorations.

Winter quarter parties were climaxed by the formal Deep Purple.








Theta Chi




Theta Xi




The Ward System consists of nine wards, a total of 650 men who are living in private homes and boarding houses off campus.



"The verdict is guilty," and another case is closed on a violation of the honor code. The reviewing body is Veterinary Council which has the power to expell a student of veterinary medicine from the division for violation of the strict honor code.

The honor system requires each student to be on his honor not to give or receive help during an examination, not to purposely miss class the day an examination is given, nor to do anything that may be considered unethical in the field of veterinary medicine.

A verdict of guilty doesn't always mean the student will be expelled for the council may recommend that a student be allowed to stay in school on probation, warning the guilty one not to repeat the violation. Cases are sometimes dropped for lack of evidence. Veterinary Medicine is the only division on campus operating on the honor system.

Other duties of the council include carrying out provisions of the constitution and acting as an advisory group to the Jr. AVMA which sponsors the annual all-college dance, the Medicine Ball.

The executive council is composed of a representative from each of the four classes in addition to the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and the critic of the Junior Chapter of AVMA.




