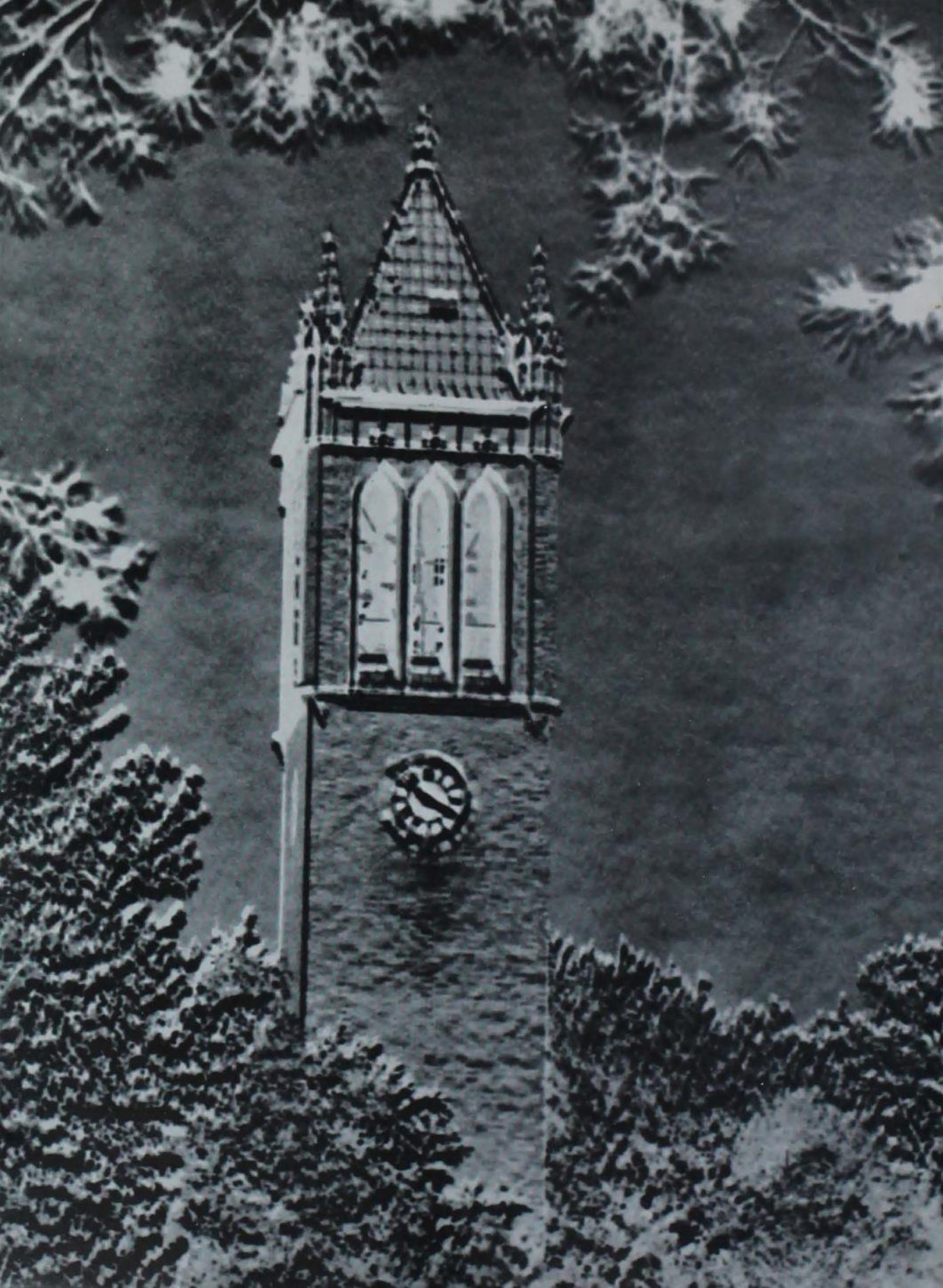

"Lo! . . . I come to the sacred planting . . .
Lo! . . . The tender shoot breaks through the
ground . . . Lo! . . . I reap the bountiful harvest
. . . Lo! . . . There is joy in my house."

This saga chant of the Osage Indian is symbolized in the four seasons which Christian Petersen has portrayed in the Memorial Union fountain. Its Indian women are showing the maize which is America's original bread-corn. The first woman lays the kernel in the soil. The second woman cultivates the new plant during summer. The third Indian woman is reaping the harvest and the fourth rests with her child in her arms and her song is full of the thought in the last line of Osage chant.

These Indian women gracing the Memorial Union fountain make up one of the many works created by Iowa State's sculptor-in-residence, Christian Petersen.

Mr. Petersen first came to Iowa State College in 1934 after his design for the Dairy Industry court was accepted. His work was so enthusiastically

received that he was asked to remain at Iowa State as a faculty member.

Born in Dyybol, Bank., N. Sleevig, Denmark on February 25, 1885, Mr. Petersen came to the United States with his parents at the age of nine. The family migrated to America partly because of the compulsory four-year military program there. Denmark was then under German domination.

Mr. Petersen was fond of drawing as a boy and after he had finished his education, he worked days and attended several art night schools in eastern United States. Before he was thirty, the sculptor was reputedly one of the top three steel engravers in the country. The well-known engraver and designer of medals and medallions left his profession to turn sculptor. Many of his works in both engraving and sculpturing have, since then, been exhibited and sold in the East and Midwest.

Listed in "Who's Who in Art," Iowa State's sculptor believes that art is the subject of understanding and enlightenment. Mr. Petersen's grasp

The 1937 Veishea presented the pool part of the present fountain. It was enhanced by three plumes of water—one at each end as now and one in the middle.

When Mr. Petersen saw this for the first time, he was struck with the need for a different treatment of the pool. After much thought and discussion with interested men on campus, he slowly formed an idea of presenting a study of corn using Indians as the human interest in the group. He wanted to show these native American products in combination.

A friend of Mr. Petersen's while doing some bibliography work came across the Osage chant telling of the seasons. It fitted the different ideas perfectly and formed the thought of the group. The four Indian women show the different seasons and the work done in each as told in the chant. It was concerned with the life cycle of the corn plant and its relationship to the Indians—and on a broader level—how man's actions are governed by the the cyclic passage of time.

The four seasons shown in the Union Fountain occur year after year regardless of man's desire. Tied to student life here at Iowa State, the four Indians are symbolic in a double way. They may stand for the four levels of learning most students pass through during their stay at Iowa State. Again the four seem to symbolize the passage of the quarters of a school year as we have shown them in this book.

of reality instills the expression of life in each piece so simply that it can be understood by all. Critics have often said that he expresses what he thinks and sees in the most direct way.

Nearly all of his works are a result of personal experience. He sees emotion and interprets it in a way that is understandable to anyone. The unpretentious sculptor cares little about personal affairs where his work is concerned. He enjoys this type of work because of its constant challenge. Sculpturing is his way of expressing life.

Christian Petersen enjoys creating sculptures that show the different facets of life as he sees them. A study of his art will prove he plans a pleasing design as well as one that expresses an idea or thought or emotion.

The quiet, hard working sculptor's opinion of art is that it must be honest. Mr. Petersen says, "There's no room for anything but truth since it's a reflection of life itself to a degree and especially a reflection of contemporary life."

Mr. Petersen's first commissioned work on the

Iowa State campus was the Dairy Industry Court. He has sculptured his campus works during times when he was not busy teaching his full classes in sculpturing.

The two students carved in stone in the Iowa State Library lobby are his second pieces in stone on the campus, the Memorial Union fountain being the first. He is now completing new figures to be used on Beech Avenue on the east side of the college entrance. Says Mr. Petersen, "These will be used to create an invitation to enter the college grounds. To me this is far better than a gate, for a gate excludes and offers no invitation." This group is his latest in stone. Most of the other works on campus are in terra cotta.

When asked which of his many works he considers the best, Mr. Petersen usually answers with, "My next piece."

Never too busy to see or speak with anyone, you'll always get a smile in greeting from the tall, impressive, Christian Petersen. The man with the sincere, "I'm glad to see you back again."

An invitation to knowledge seems to be the message of Mr. Petersen's host and hostess at the stairway entrance in the lobby of the library. Originally there were to have been ornate ironwork lamps in the spots where this tasteful pair of stone students are seated.

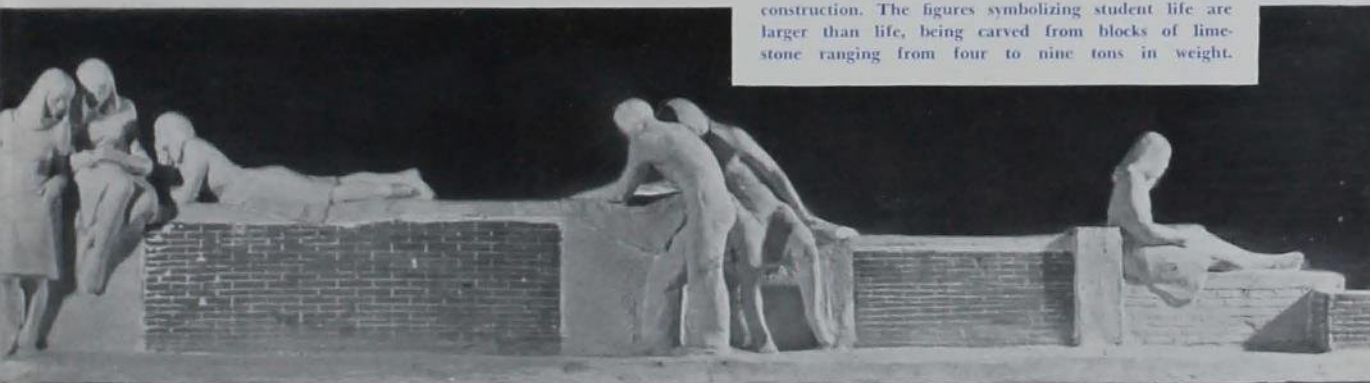
In Veterinary Court, Mr. Petersen shows the sympathetic feeling of the veterinarian as he helps sick animals and the confidence and faith generated in animals by the good veterinarian. The panel shows the relationship between work of veterinarians and human health either through protecting food sources or in the production of vaccines and serums from many animals.

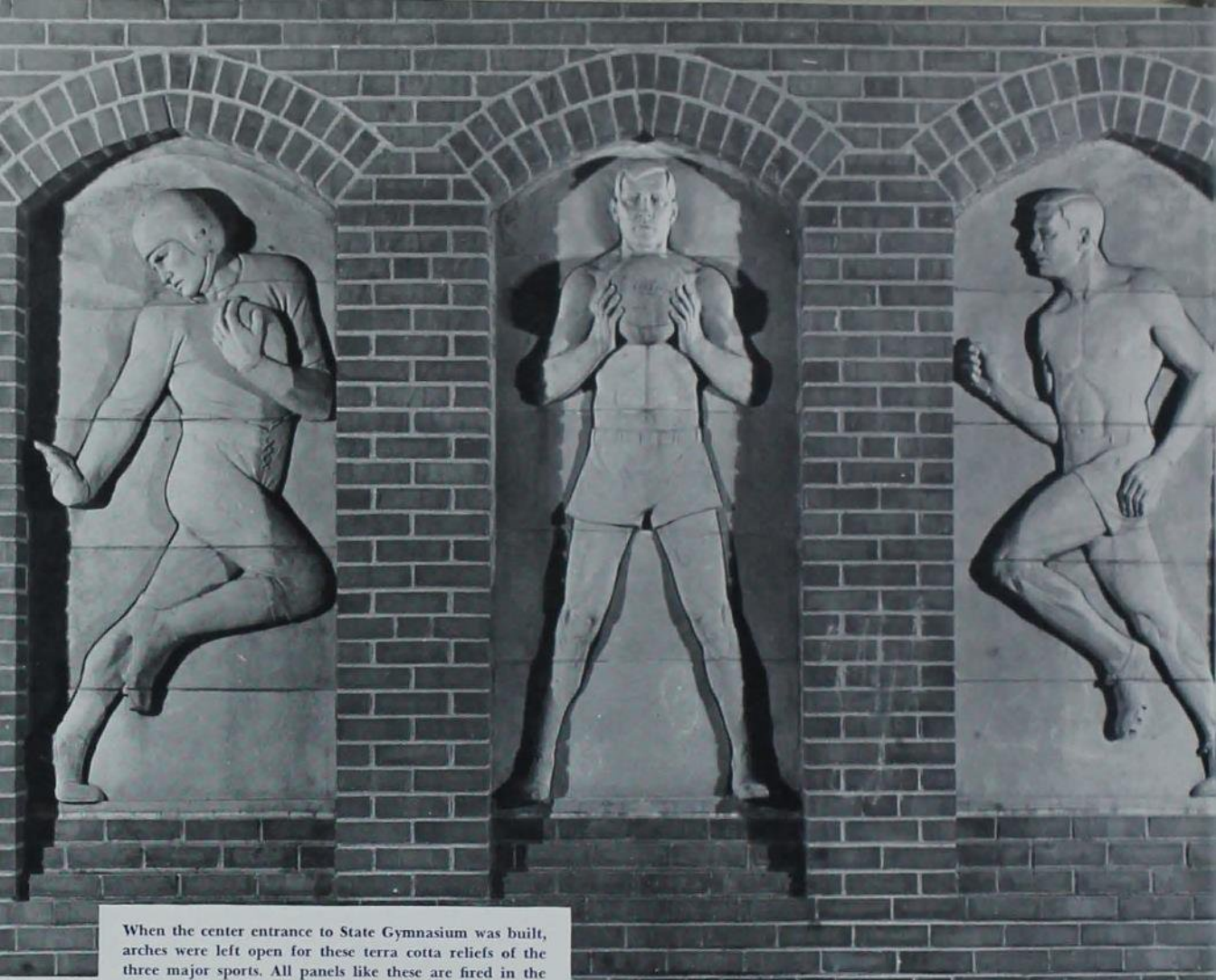




Here is the central part of the fountain and pool panel of the Dairy Industry court. In addition to this panel there are flanking ones telling different phases in dairy industry. These are in terra cotta fired without glaze to the point of vitrification, making them harder and longer-lived than most brick in buildings.

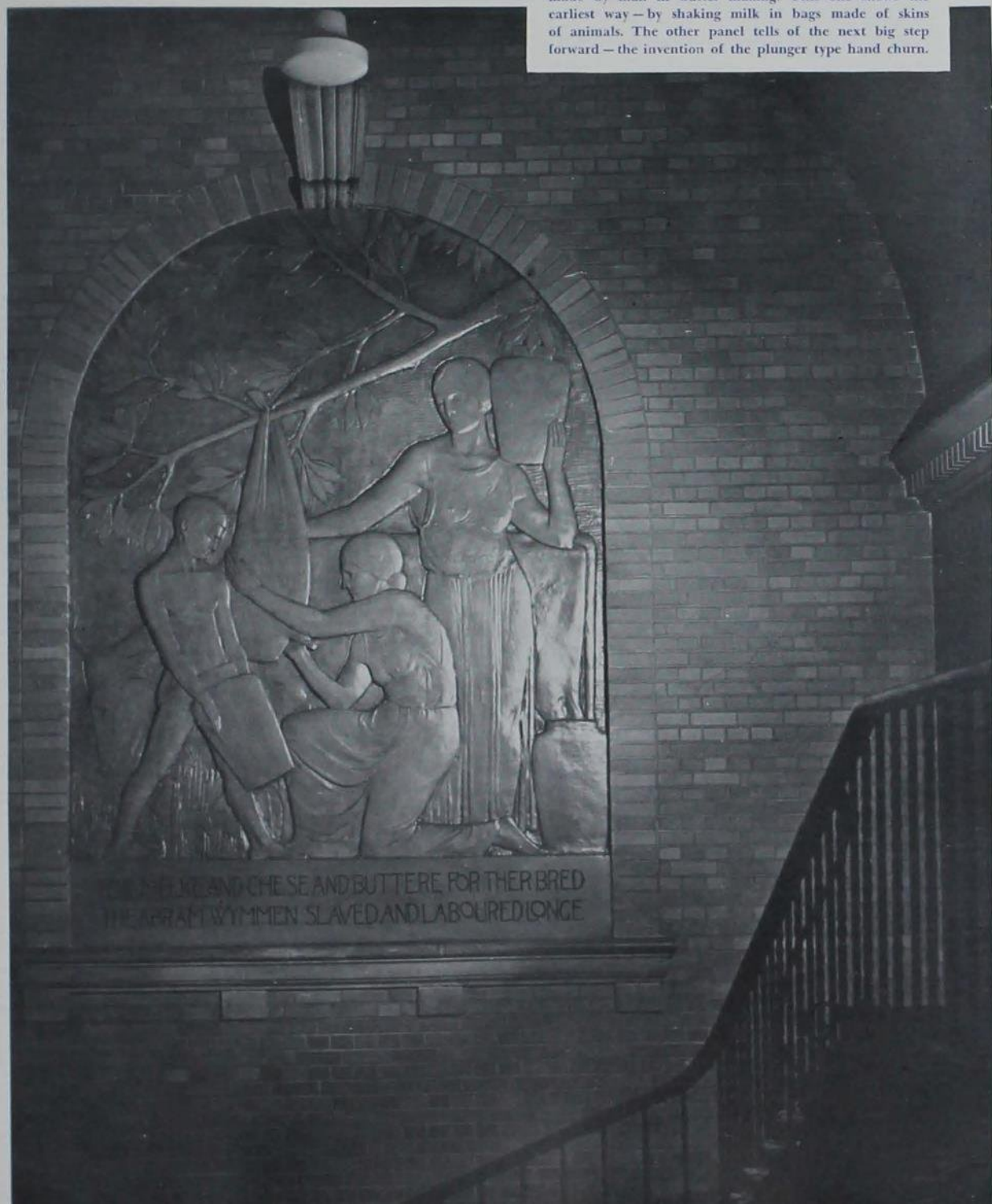
This plaster model of the group to be placed on the west side of Beech Avenue at its entrance to the college grounds, shows the combination stone and brick construction. The figures symbolizing student life are larger than life, being carved from blocks of limestone ranging from four to nine tons in weight.

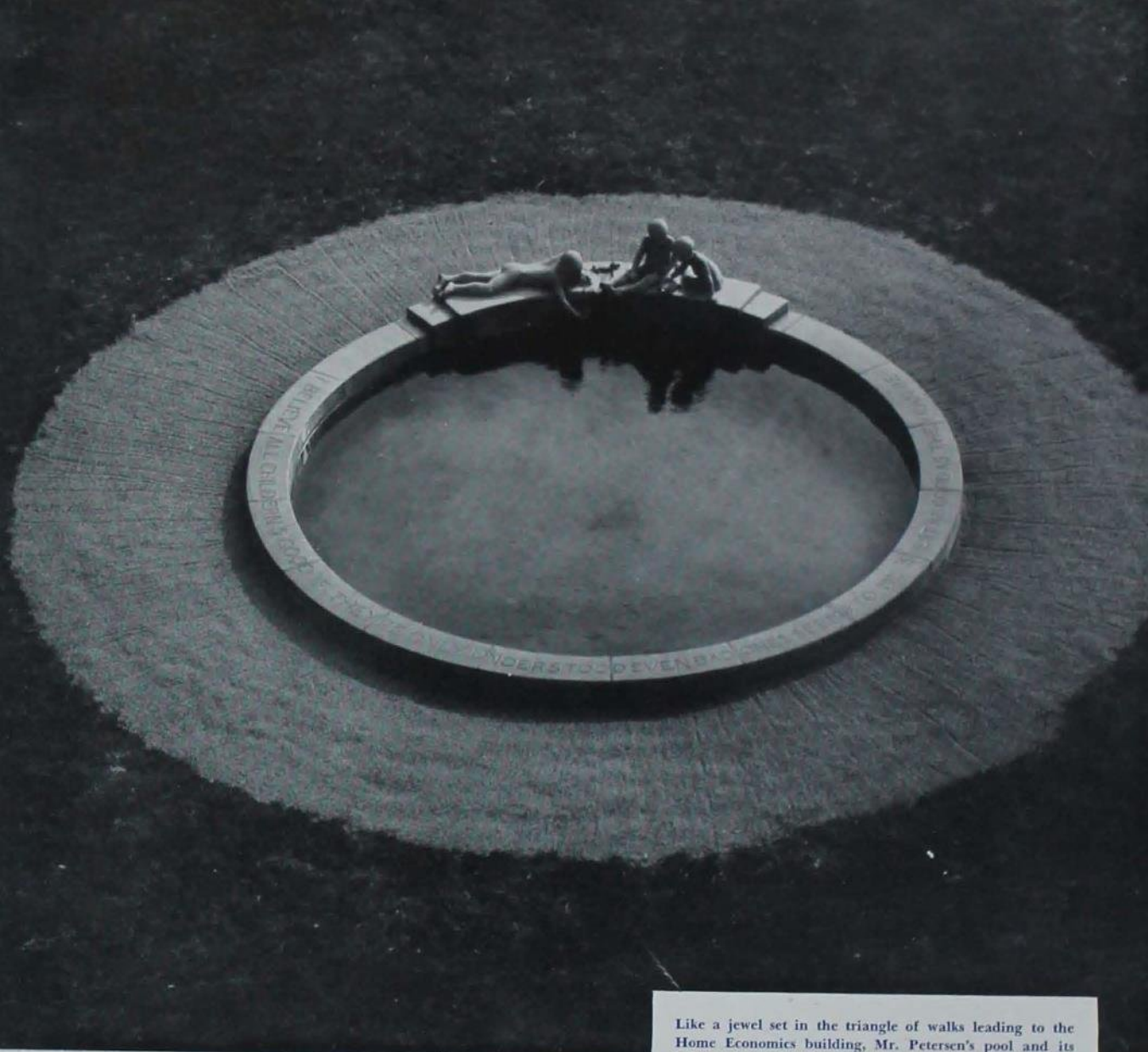




When the center entrance to State Gymnasium was built, arches were left open for these terra cotta reliefs of the three major sports. All panels like these are fired in the small kilns of the Ceramic Department. This accounts for the lines or cuts in the panels. Mr. Petersen has to cut his clay in sections in order to fit his work in the kilns.

Inside the entrance of the Dairy Industry building are two large plaster panels showing the two early steps made by man in butter making. This one shows the earliest way — by shaking milk in bags made of skins of animals. The other panel tells of the next big step forward — the invention of the plunger type hand churn.





Like a jewel set in the triangle of walks leading to the Home Economics building, Mr. Petersen's pool and its playing children attract all who see it. Of terra cotta and surrounded with flowers and turf, this small work lets people know how Mr. Petersen feels one should approach the subject of child development and guidance.

Floods of applications . . . long evening meetings . . . many a headache . . . cooperation. Added up with 100,000 visitors, it was Iowa State's 1950 Mid-Century Veishea.

Off to a roaring start with the firing of five aerial bombs, one for each division, Veishea was officially opened at noon, Thursday, May 11.

Crowds gathered on the lawn east of Beardshear to view the opening ceremonies. The long awaited moment came. The Queen of Queens was revealed and crowned by Governor William S. Beardsley. She was brown-haired Joan Ary. Her court consisted of Rosalie Fritz, Barbara Krueger, Marjorie Moore and Patricia Wren.

While the campanile played, the crowd dispersed to various parts of the campus. They had a choice of attending the horse show or the four-act melodrama, "Rags to Riches."

Spectators at the horse show watched the keen competition in the eight classes of the show. The rough riding cowboys in the cow pony class drew special applause.

A concert Thursday night under the stars at Clyde Williams Field opened Jimmy Dorsey and his orchestra's three night stand at Iowa State. The first of the Veishea dances was held in Great Hall, Memorial Union, Thursday evening following the concert.

More than 2,000 spectators lined the banks of Lake La Verne by 9 a.m., Friday to see the canoe races. As the water ceased churning, Kappa Alpha Theta, Roberts Hall, Eta Ward, and the Science faculty teams emerged wet but winners in each of their divisions.

One of the main purposes of Veishea is to show visitors the work done at Iowa State. Each college department displayed its talents at open houses Friday and Saturday.

Meanwhile, burning brightly, the Veisheathon flame was trying to appease the rain gods. United States President Harry S. Truman lit the torch in Ottumwa. The torch, a symbol of higher education, was carried to Des Moines by Don Ferguson via fast con-

vertible. A relay team of 127 students ran it from the steps of the state capitol to Ames.

Taking double precautions against rain, a "Mulathon" was staged between Des Moines and Ames. Four men took turns riding Francis, the mule. Here the torch was carried in the form of "canned heat."

Four vodvil skits were presented Friday and Saturday afternoons. Kappa Kappa Gamma walked off with the Veishea Vodvil trophy with their skit, "Mrs. Murphy vs. the State of Ireland."

"Report to the Nation," the Stars Over Veishea musical review, made its debut Friday evening in a performance under the stars. One hundred students danced and sang songs written by Bill Schall and Bob Morris.

Early Saturday morning thousands of people thronged the parade route on the campus to view the colorful parade. A procession of 76 floats and 12 high school bands made its way through campus exhibiting the efforts of many who had worked most of Friday night on them.

Sigma Nu fraternity won the sweepstakes. Gamma Phi Beta won first place in the

women's residence division. Phi Delta Theta and Alumni Hall took first places in their men's residence groups. An aluminum rocket half way through a hoop was constructed by Alumni Hall men. The Horticulture Club received the first place honors in the departmental division. Top place among the organizations went to the NROTC float.

Mid-Century Veishea was enjoyed by more than those who were there in actual attendance. Many watched the various activities in their own homes through the medium of television. This was the first Veishea to be televised. Thus, it was possible for many more to witness the largest student-managed festival in the nation.

Brilliant sprays of fireworks were the finale at both performances of the "Stars Over Veishea" program.

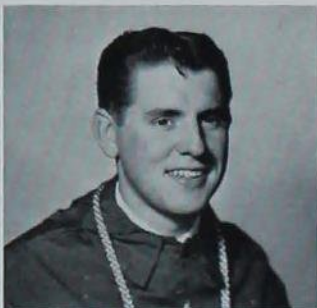

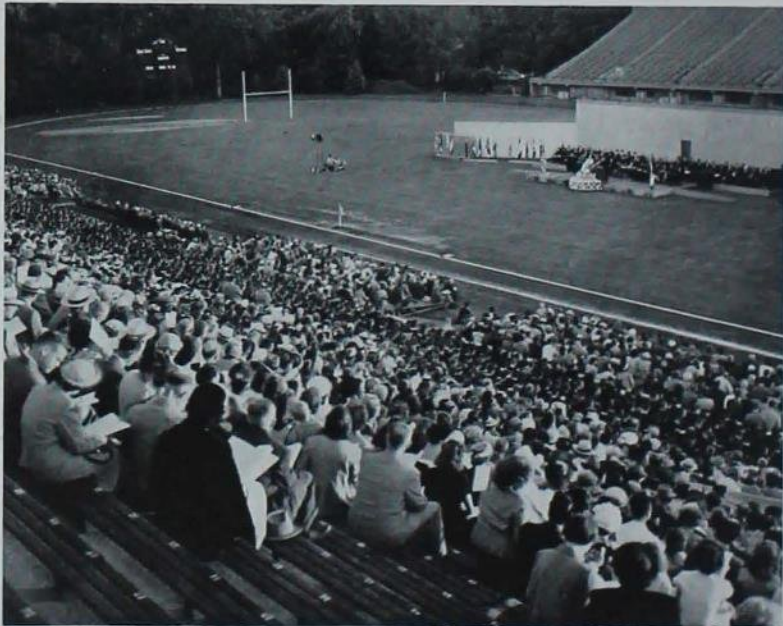

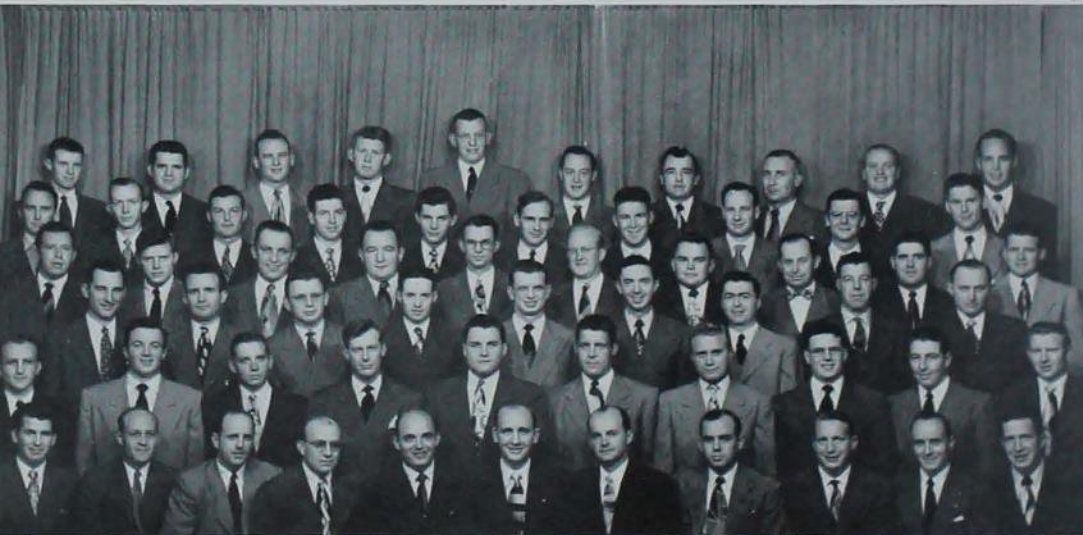

Butter, cheese, or ice cream maker; milk plant operator or manager of a dairy plant — four quarters of study in the Dairy Plant Operation program plus 6 months' work in commercial plants qualify scores of students annually for all of these positions.

Students enrolled in the course, since they are on campus only 4 quarters, may be less well-known than others, but they are busy nevertheless. Their schedules consist of both class and laboratory work, the latter including the manufacture of the various milk products and handling of market milk. "Ice Cream and Ices" and "Testing Milk and Milk Products" are two examples of the courses they take.

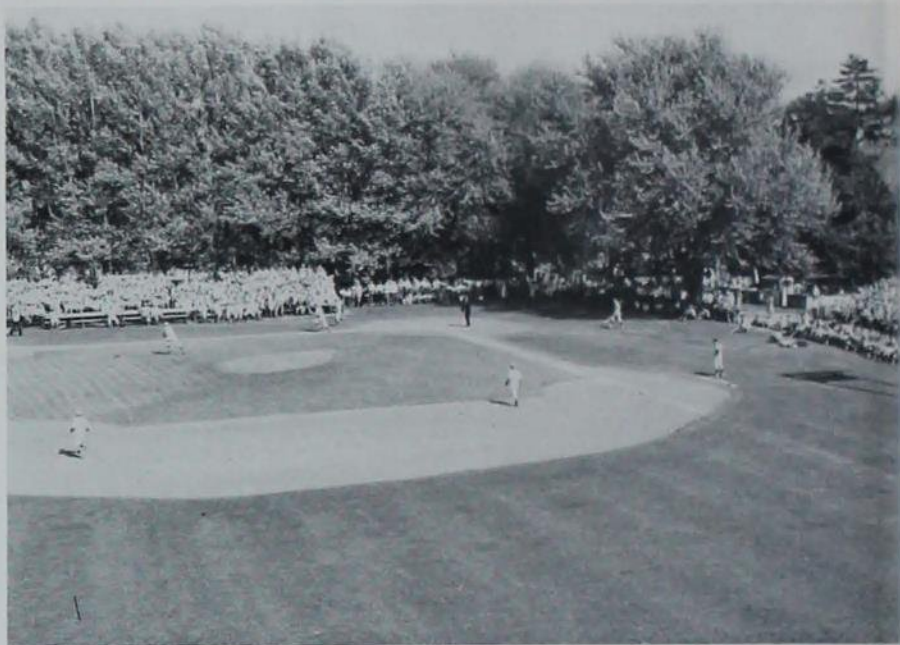

Track

The spring track season saw the end of one of the most brilliant coaching careers at Iowa State in quite some years. Coach George Brettnall terminated his coaching career after producing five Big Seven track champions. The 1944, '45, '46 teams won indoor titles while the 1944, '45 cindermen stole the outdoor crown.

Highlighting a rather dull season were Gene Shaver, Mac Verner, John Dickinson and the mile relay team.

For the first dual meet of the season our team managed to slip by a strong Drake team with a margin of eight points. A week later a record-breaking festival was witnessed when Kansas State came to town. Eight meet records had fallen when the meet ended. For the underdog Cyclones, Gerry Broshar tied

the 880 meet record. Gene Shaver beat his old 2-mile record by $9\frac{1}{2}$ seconds.

Outstanding in freshman competition was Jim Robertson who set records with the discus and the shotput.

Stepping in to fill the shoes of Coach Brettnell is coach Burl Berry. No newcomer to Iowa State or Iowa high school and college activities, Burl feels that the Cyclones have a chance of being "more than just fair" in the 1951 track season.

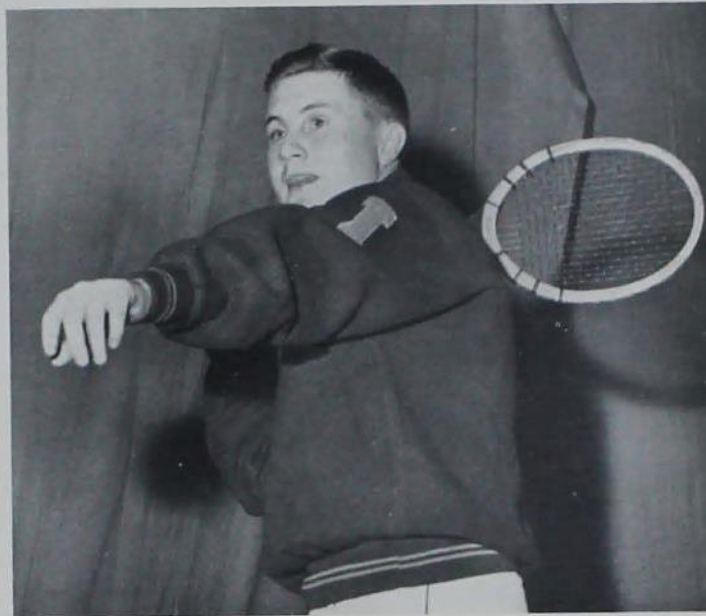

A constant threat at singles and a deadly combination at doubles were Terry Smith and Bill Hukill. Usually they brought the best we had to offer against a field of strong opponents.

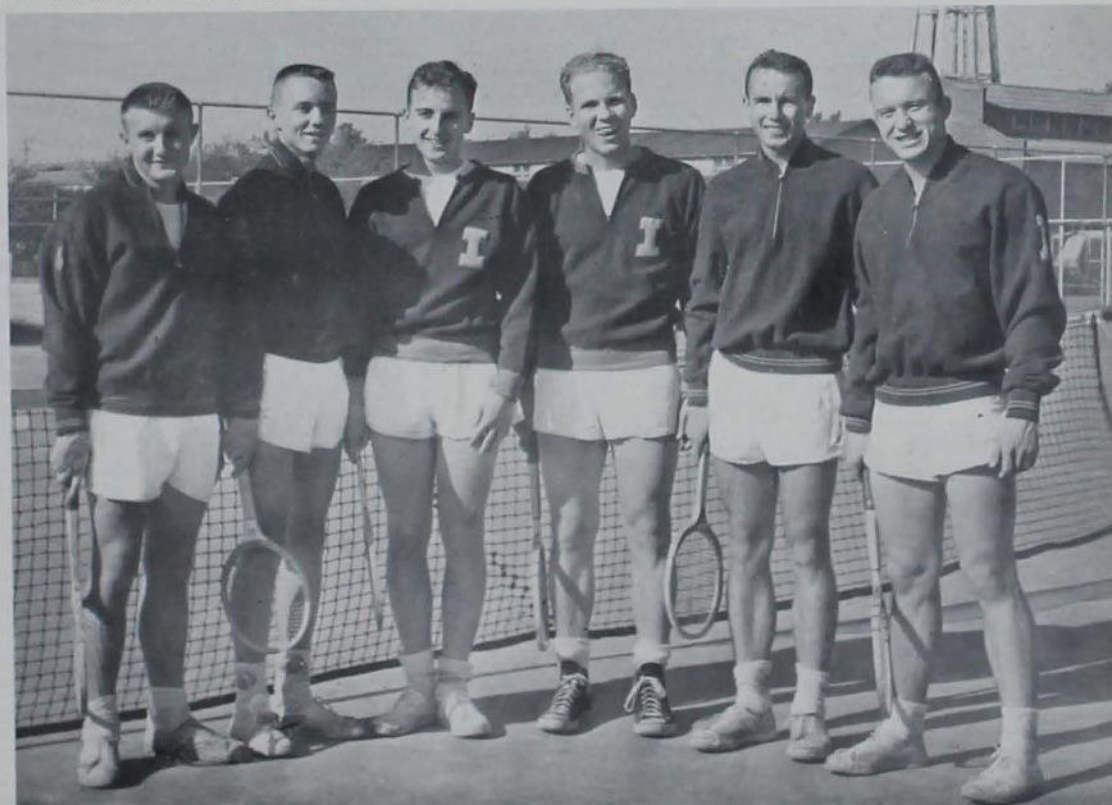

During the spring competition of 1950 Phi Kappa Psi copped the fraternity class honors. Pearson and the Delta Devastators were dorm and ward champions respectively.

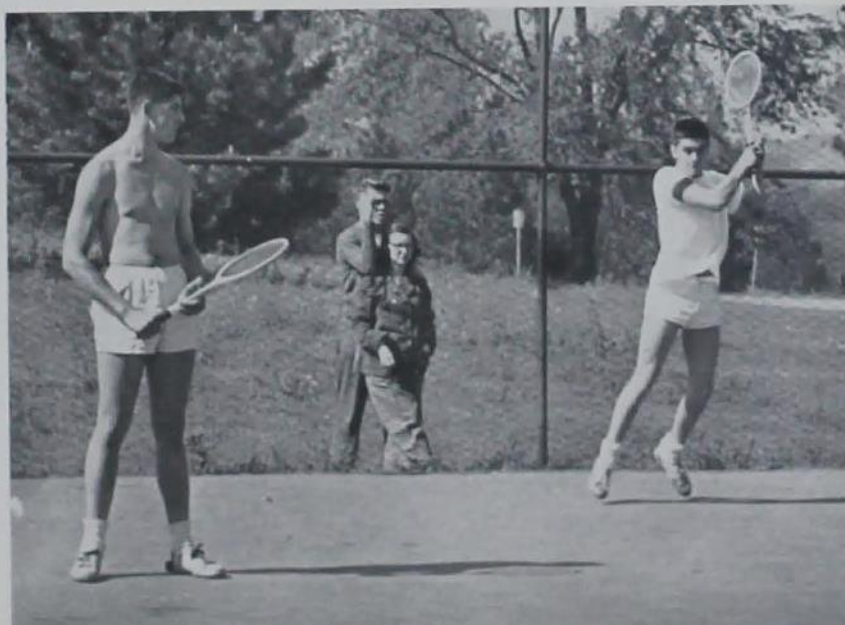

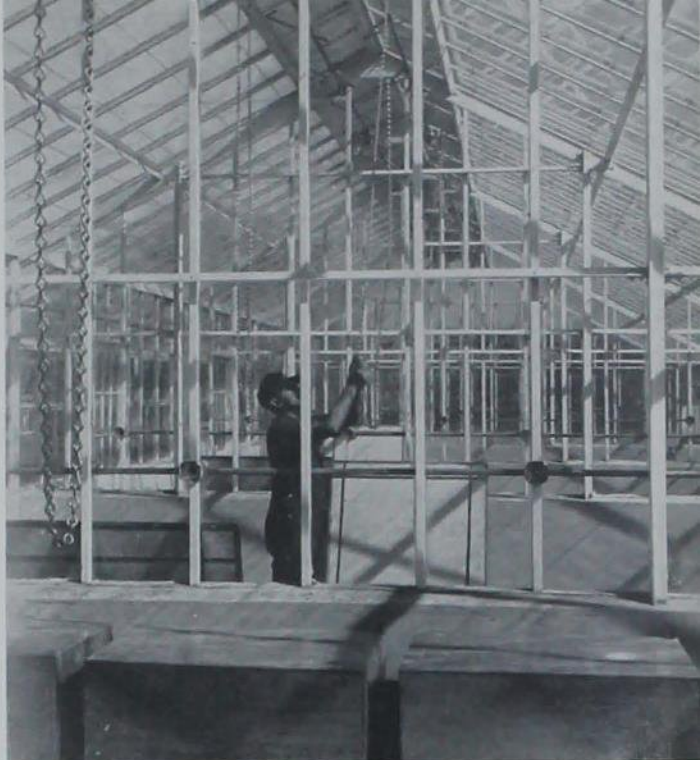

New Buildings

Iowa State's building program was operating in the eight-figure bracket, not only in the 12 million dollar total cost but also in the amounts of construction materials.

Over a million and a half bricks, or a line stretching six times between Ames and Des Moines, would equal the carloads of this material used for the Agronomy, Friley Hall addition, Electrical Engineering, Chemistry-Physics Link and the Power Plant projects.

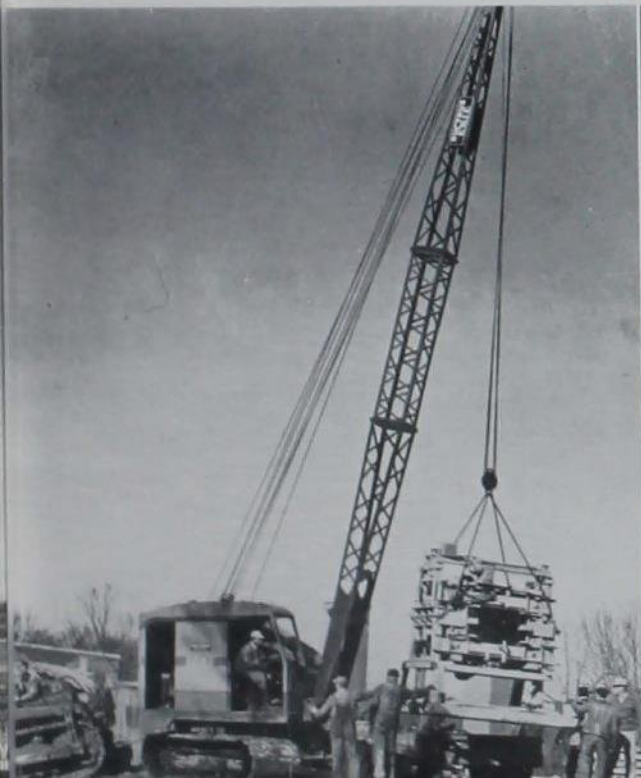
For the greenhouses near Botany and Agronomy Buildings, 23,400 square feet of glass — over one-half an acre — was needed. Workmen poured approximately 70,000 sacks of cement into the foundations and structures of all the buildings. Sixty-one miles of electric wire and about 13 miles of water, gas, waste and heating piping were installed. Work was started on the new sections of the Memorial Union that should be ready by 1952.



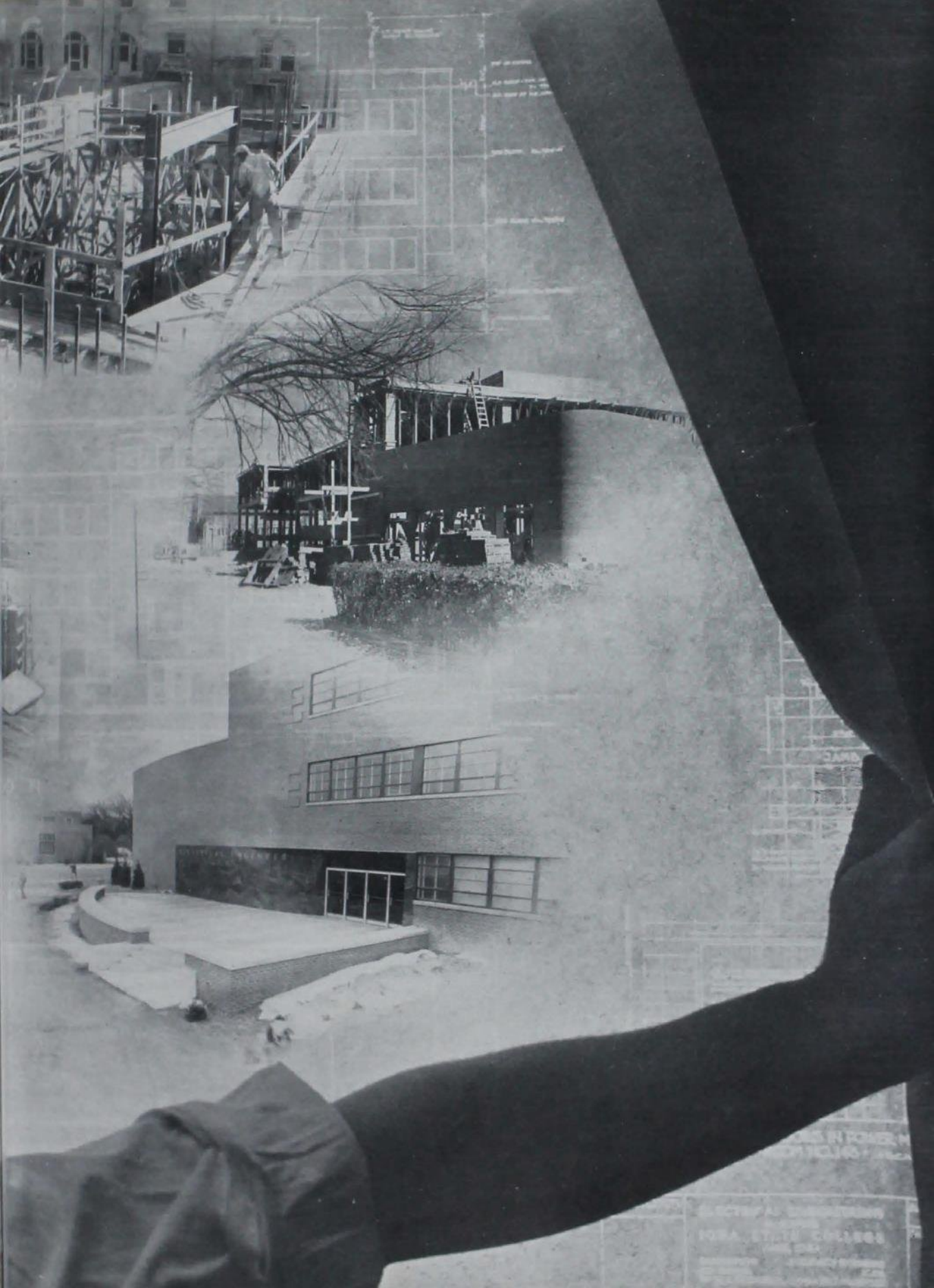
A workman adjusts a skylight completing a greenhouse.

With his sixteenth year at Iowa State, President Charles E. Friley typifies college progress — looking ahead.

Many Iowa State students think of their college administrators as "some men over in Beardshear." But actually these officials are much closer to students than that. Each person is represented when President Charles E. Friley calls his Administrative Board to a meeting in Room 114, Beardshear.

Deans from each division, directors of extension and research, the registrar, business manager, and directors of student health, library and physical plant attend these meetings. What is decided here affects every student—the 12-million-dollar budget on which the school operates each year, graduation approvals, scholarship and personnel problems.

Examination schedules, building programs like the one going on right now are all governed by these administrators. WOI-TV proudly celebrated its first birthday this year. The station is the only educational TV station operating in the United States. This "first" for Iowa State is due largely to the foresight of President Friley, who requested a license before the war when TV was being perfected. The station here is also the first in central Iowa.

Next fall will see the completion of the Friley Hall addition and the Agronomy Building. Farther in the future are plans for new home management houses for senior home economics women.

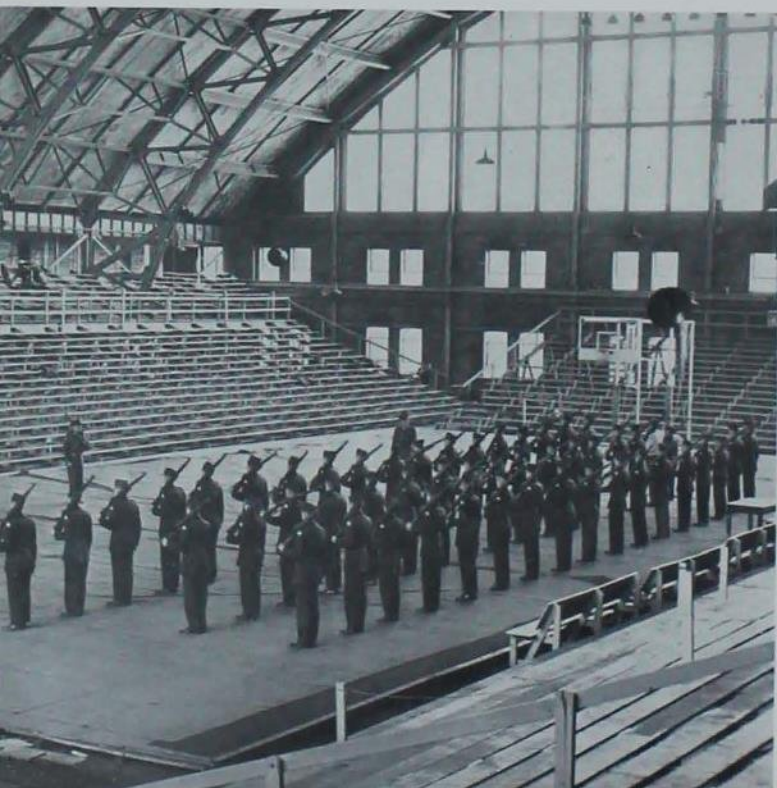

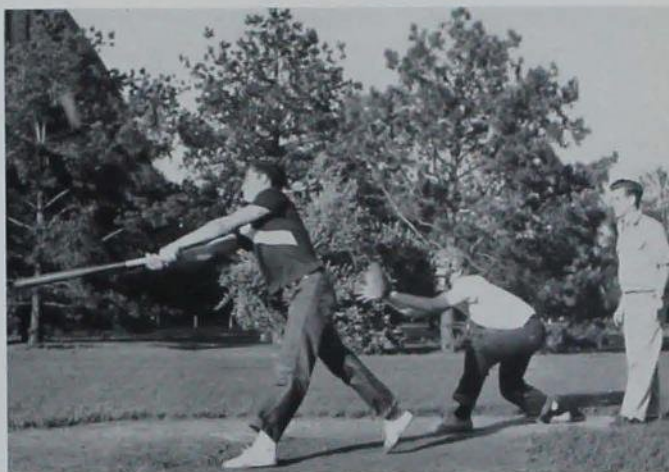


Summer Sports

while endless lines of checkers marched up and down the aisles.

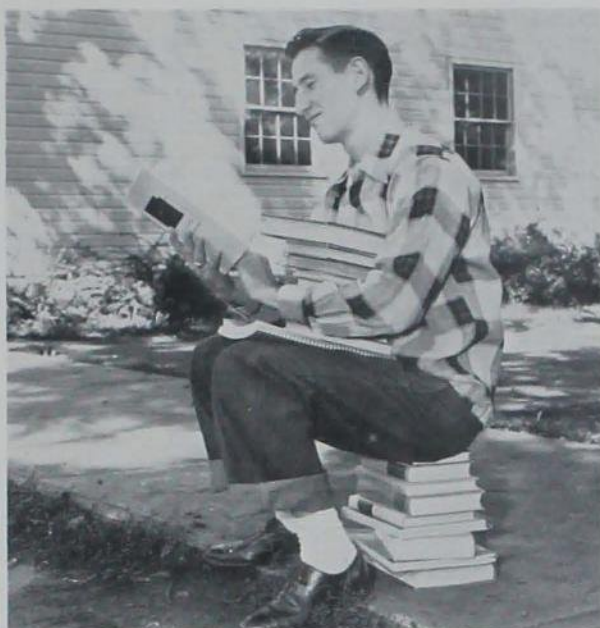
Physical check-ups were accomplished army style with rows of young people parading past the doctors. Tuberculin skin tests and X-rays were part of the routine.

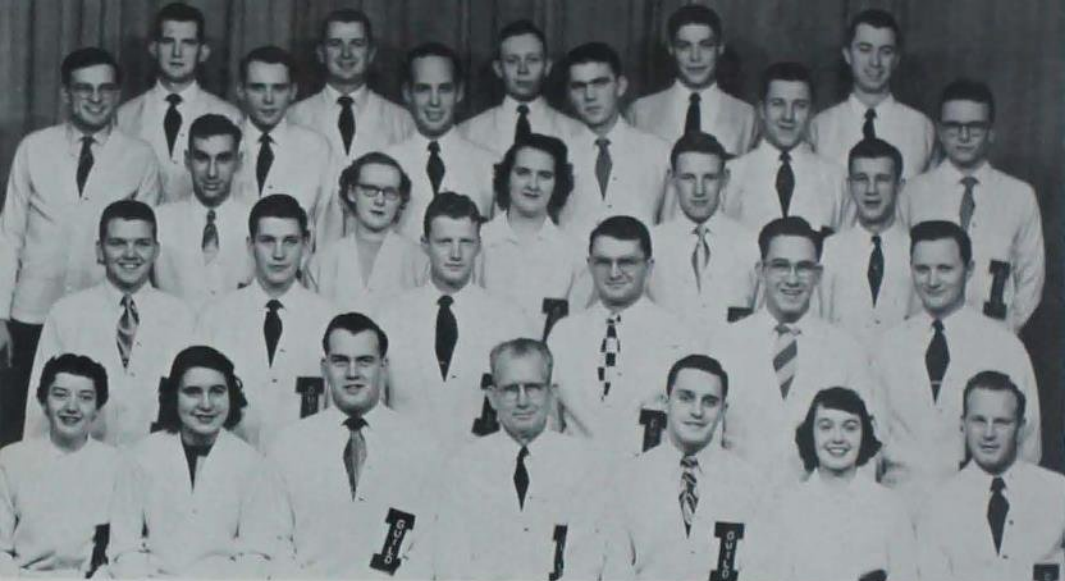
It was April, 1950, and all-college election time at Iowa State. Many were the hours spent in heated discussion—but no open debate, please—over platforms and candidates.

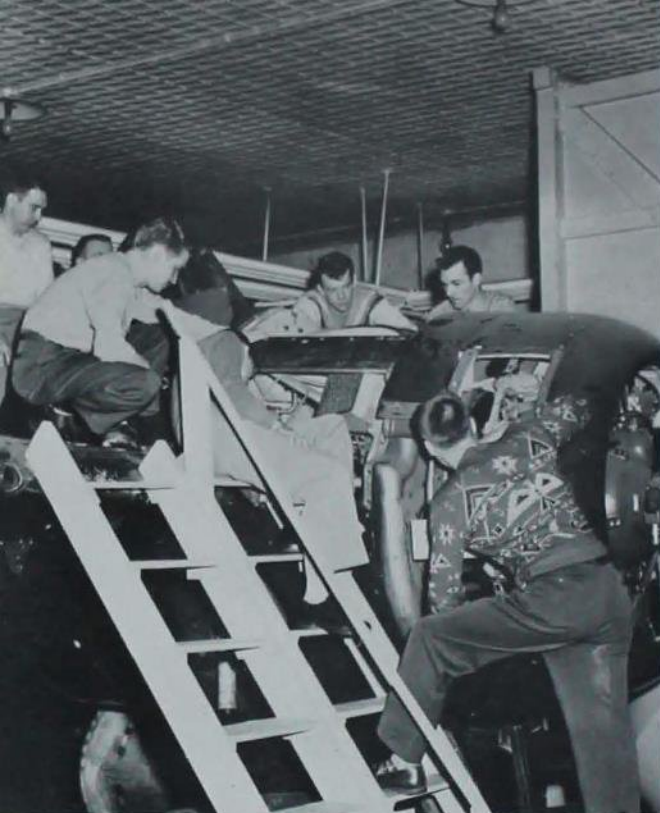

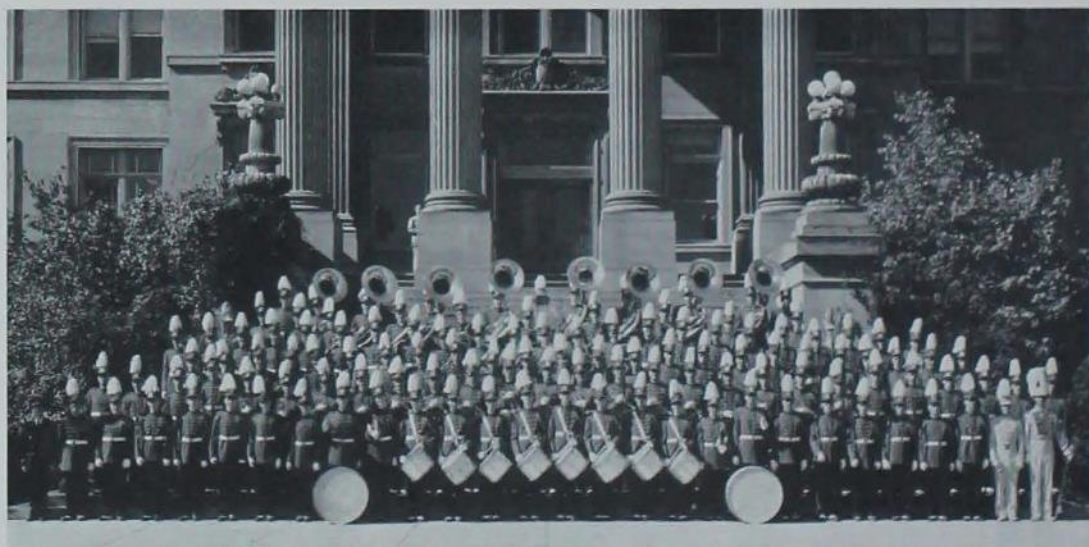

ISC - 13, Northwestern - 23

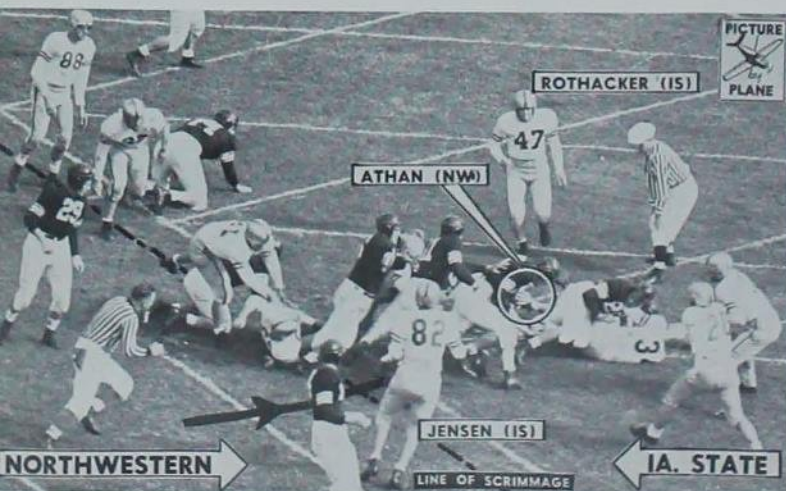

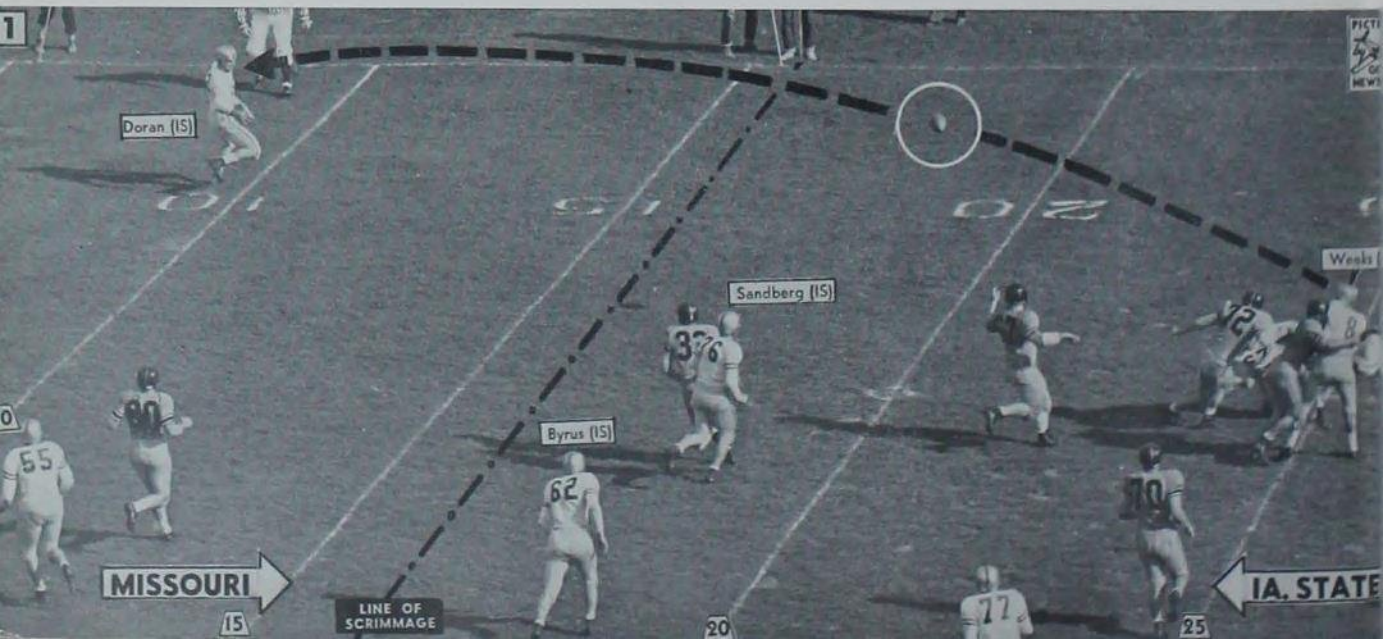
Missouri

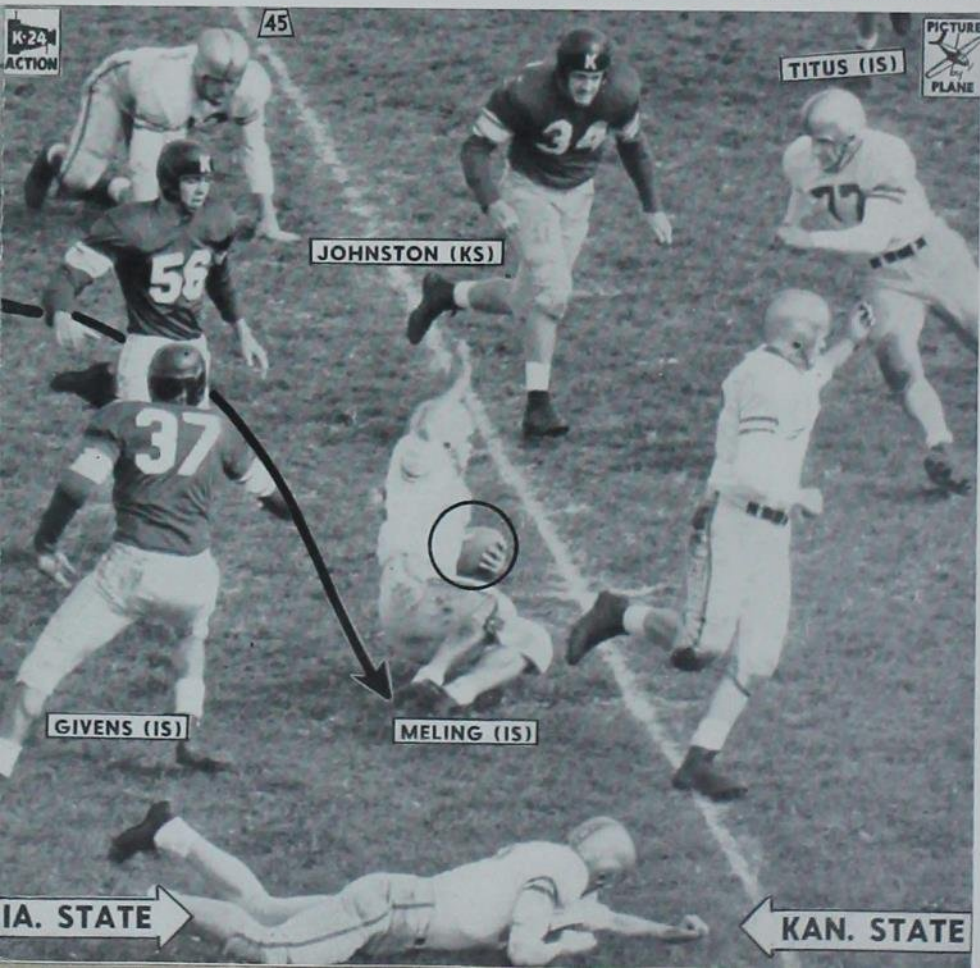

The annual classic game with Drake this year was interesting in more ways than one. Not only was each team trying to come out victorious but various individuals on both teams were striving for individual laurels.

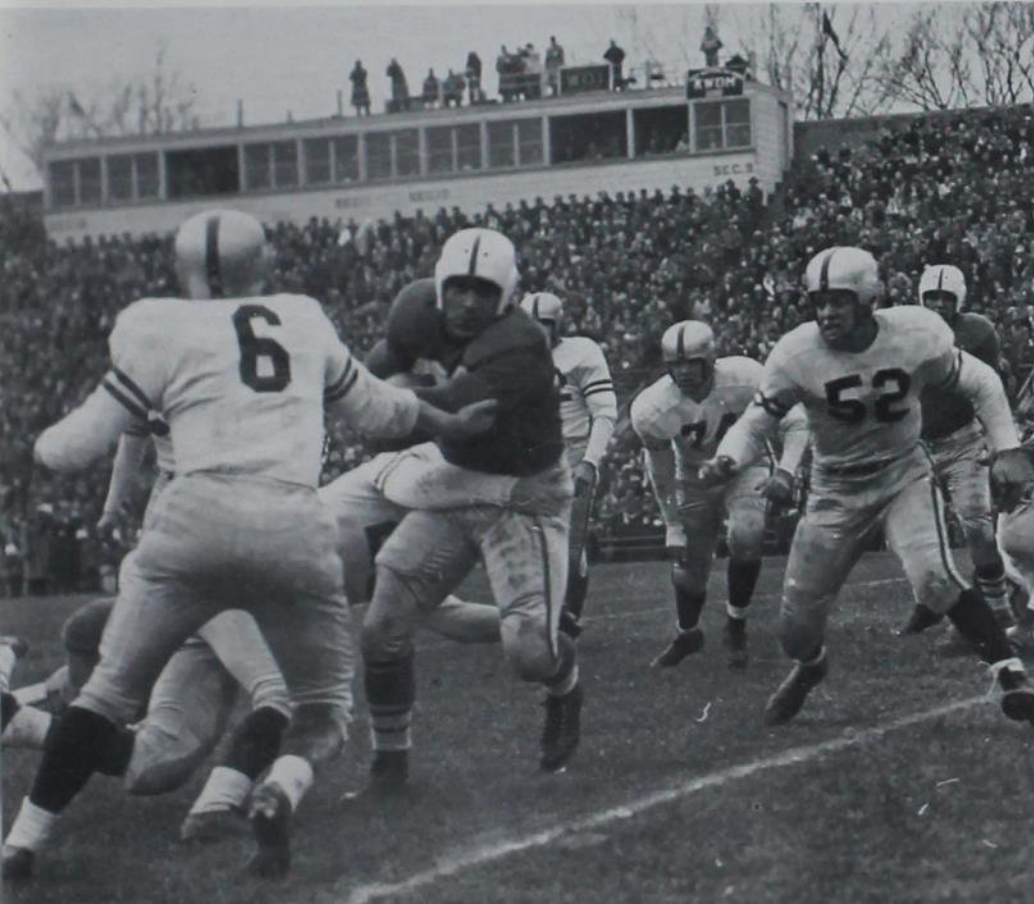

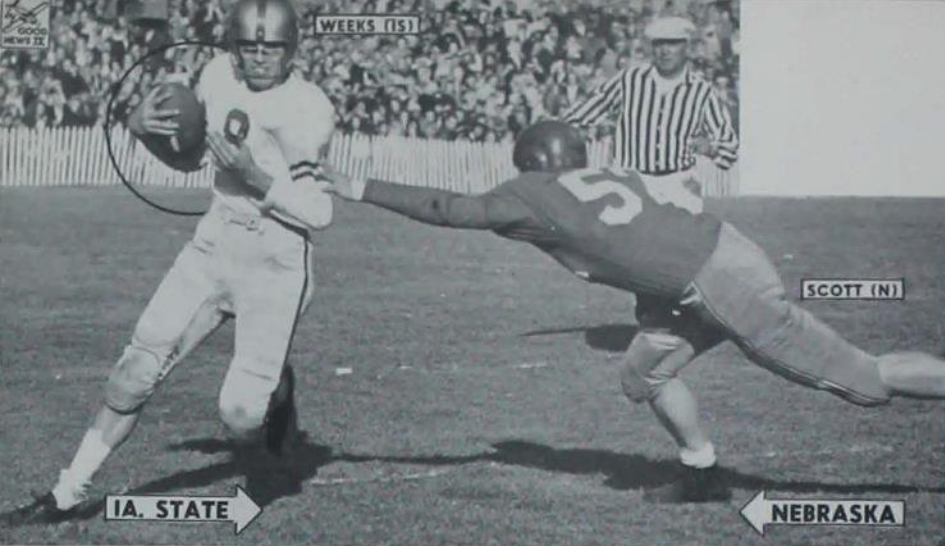

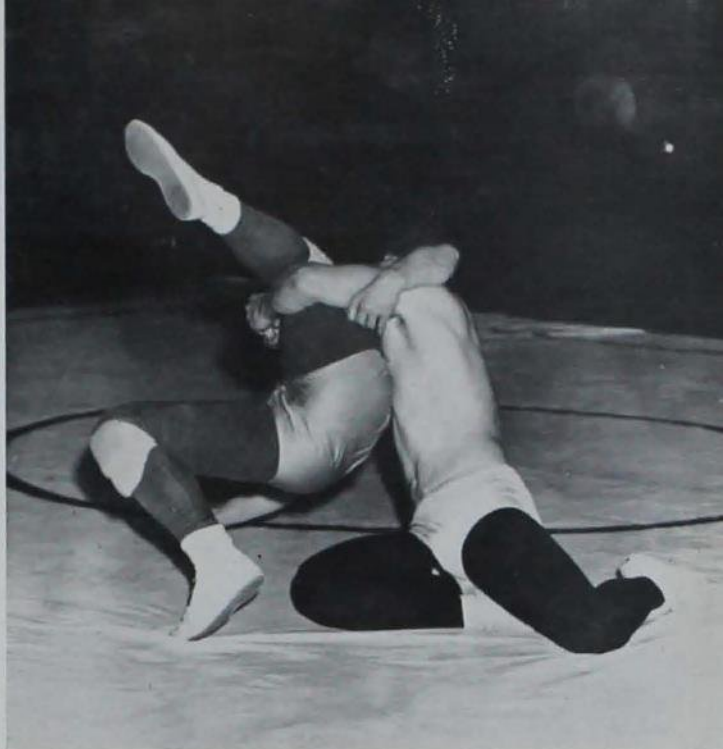


Coach Otopalik points out the finer holds of the game.

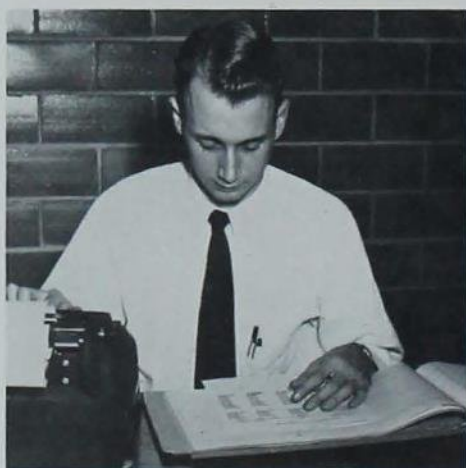
The business staff kept plenty of secretaries at work.

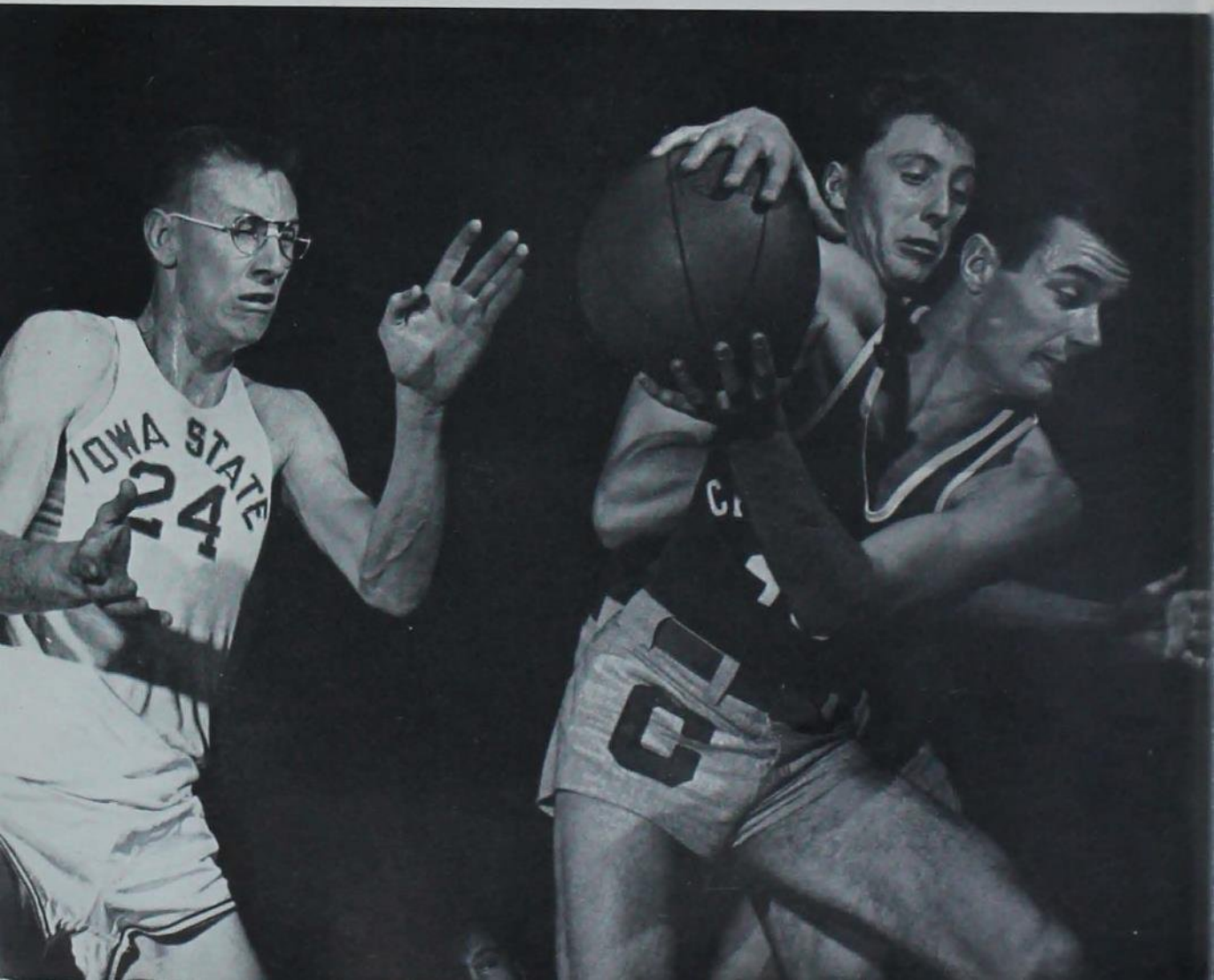

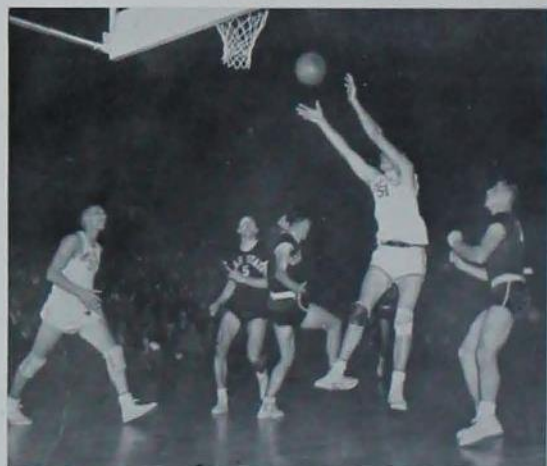

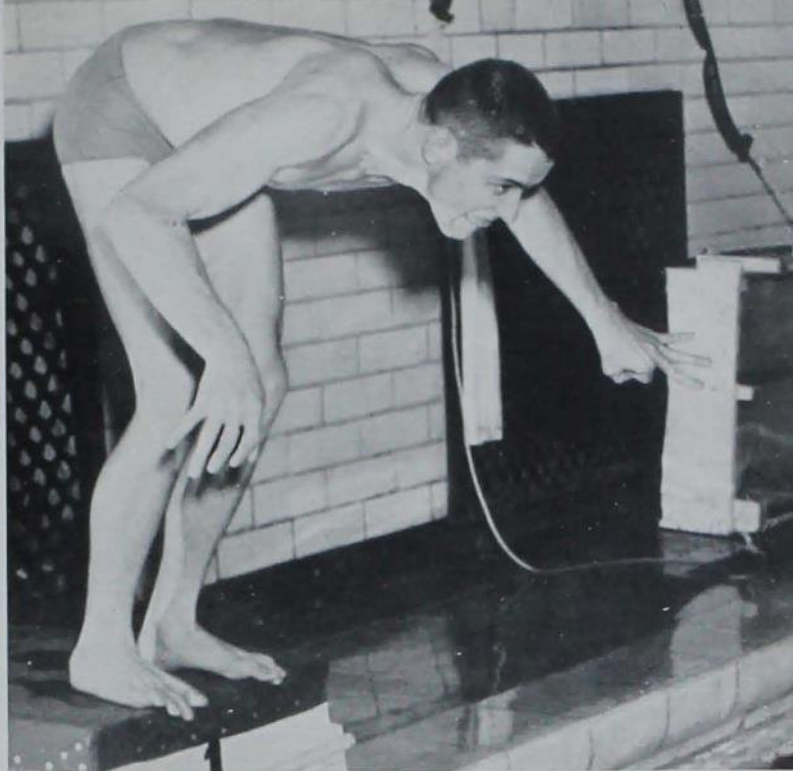

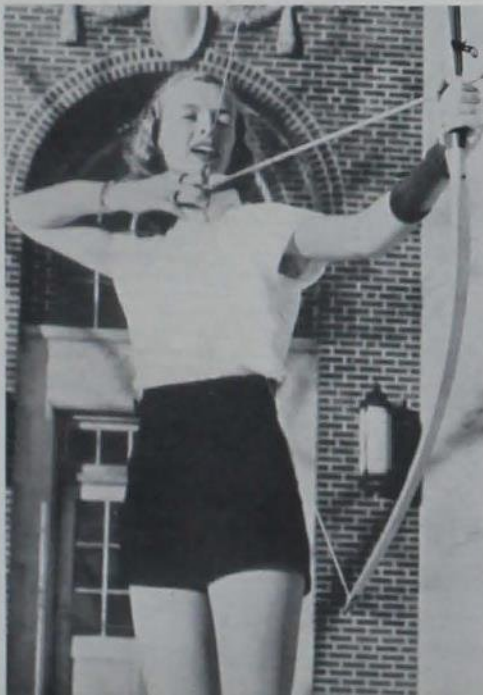

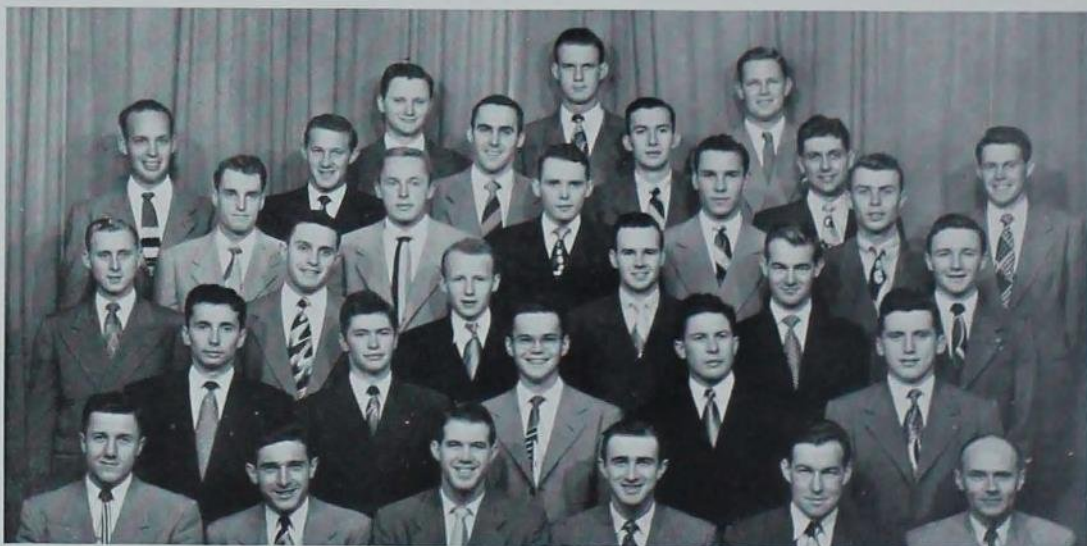
Decisions of this year's Council included the re-adoption of the last-war rule whereby

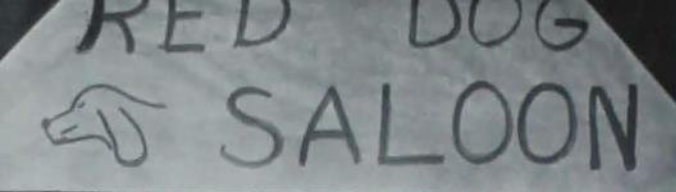

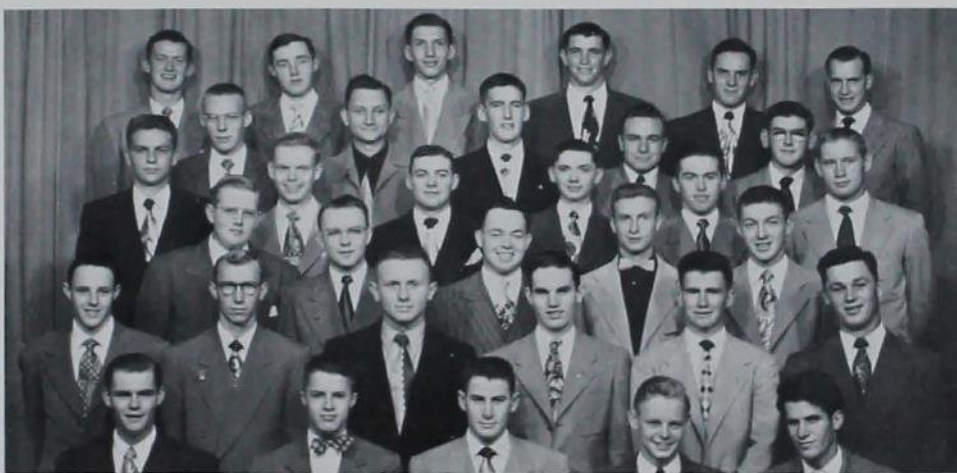

One of the outstanding features of Wednesday night chow in the Friley Hall Dining Room is the weekly distribution of the MRA newspaper, the *Independent*. Happenings and functions held for the men of the MRA and views of the men expressed in letters to the editor appear each week.

The MRA had no paper of its own until in the fall of 1947. Leonard Cohn established a weekly paper which he called the *Residence Rag*. The popularity of the paper required the establishment of a full staff, and the MRA had a weekly paper.

A special headquarters for the gathering of news had been established — an extra-large room for the assimilation of news and the setting up of the layout and publishing of the paper.

The publication board is made up of four men who have had experience in the field of

journalism, and excellent critiques are offered on each issue. The editor is responsible for getting the news assembled and typed up on stencils. His biggest help in this job is the managing editor, who sometimes is even found on the end of the crank of an old battered mimeographing machine.

Recently, however, the most modern electric-operated mimeograph machine was purchased by the MRA for the use of the *Independent* for publishing its paper.

Reporters visit each house and gather news for the paper. A column which tells the proceedings of the MRA Main Cabinet appears each week.

A cartoonist fills the back page with a humor which encompasses college life in a manner which appeals to the student.

Rolf Frankfurter is editor of the *Independent*, Lynn Millard is managing editor.

Agriculture Dean Floyd Andre is never far from his division in body or spirit at his home across from the Dairy Industry building. However, his work as dean doesn't end with the college boundaries or even the Ames city limits. The extension and experiment stations which he directs in addition to supervising undergraduate work have effect on agricultural interests everywhere.

More than 2,000 men were enrolled in the division continuing the highest enrollment since the college was founded. The impending war stir brought uncertainty to the enrollment outlook next fall. The faculty hopes legislators may be changing their attitudes to make agriculture study just as essential as any war-effort work. Using all of the basic sciences, agriculture students have the added job of interpreting and applying their science to worldwide problems of food productions.

Thompson is new head of the Farm Operations curriculum; George Browning is new associate head of the experiment station; and Roy Kottman became dean's assistant during the year.

Engineering Division

In line with other engineering colleges in the country, the total enrollment in the Engineering Division has been decreasing here at Iowa State for more than 3 years.

Dean J. F. Downie Smith expressed his concern over the fact that before very long there will be a serious shortage of engineering graduates, which will grow worse for many years to come.

Engineering research activities have been stepped up and the trend should continue. A notable project begun this year was the cooperative program with the Iowa Highway Commission. Iowa State representatives served on the Iowa Highway Research Board and money was allocated by the Commission through the Board to the Experiment Station here for research in the general field of highway construction.

Dean Smith also expected an increase in demand for research by the armed services by next year.

The close cooperation in the Engineering Division is shown by the integration of the three main sections under Dean Smith. The Engineering Extension Service is now working closely with Resident Instruction and the Engineering Experiment Station, so that each is being helped by contact with the others.

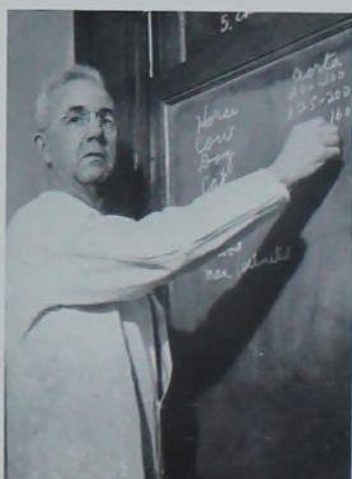

Veterinary Division

It may be the smallest division on campus, but the close-knit Veterinary Medicine Division uses limited numbers to advantage by graduating skilled professional men.

Veterinary Council

Veterinary Council members have a three-fold contact job — with students, faculty and alumni, and the national AVMA chapter.
